

Now that they have tasted some degree of success I hope that knack of winning, and more importantly, the methods of how to go about winning, won't be lost. Many of these players were in the C's, who obtained a semi-final birth, our first for quite a while. To Nick Rountree and the players in the C's-well done. Let's aim to improve further on that performance next season.

As normal, Charlie Seaton's wickets were generally of excellent quality. We look forward to the introduction of the new oval and the ususal top notch Seaton production on the wicket table.

Administratively, the club has been honoured in having our hard-working Secretary of five years, Allan Mahoney, receive the Sports Administrator of the Year Award, at this year's University Blues Awards. Congratulations Allan, you have served the club faithfully and enthusiastically over a long period of timewell done.

This season also marked the first year of a D Shires side within the club's hierarchy. The job of captaining and administering the club's fourth team is always an arduous one. Larry Lambert undertook this job not only with great zeal but with tremendous efficiency. The club owes him a great deal.

Finally, let me express our congratulations to Epping, Auburn and Burwood for their respective premiership wins in each of the grades.

However, the season developed into one of unfulfilled promise. A grade, despite 3 wins, a tie, 3 draws and 6 losses, finished with the wooden spoon. Yet, after round 4, they were running 4th. B grade finished 6th, yet after round 5 they headed the table and by the end of the season had beaten four of the five teams who finished higher on the table. C grade finished a very good 3rd to be the Club's most successful side, but unfortunately were not able to go on with it in the semi-final. D grade, after a promising start, fell away to finish near the bottom of the table. The Club finished 8th in the Club Championship.

As I have written in previous reports M.U.C.C. is never going to be consistently successful unless all members commit themselves to playing and training for the full season. The Club's aim is to win the Club Championship. This would require all four teams to make the semi-finals. From there, to state the obvious, it requires two more wins to take off a premiership.

From an administrative viewpoint the Club has continued to progress. 1985/86 saw the purchase of a new cover and a super-sopper and the erection of a storage shed.

Socially, members were seen to enjoy themselves at the annual dinner, on the harbour cruise and at a couple of wine tasting and trivia evenings.

In conclusion, many thanks to my fellow committee members for their efforts during 1985/86 and to you all for your friendship. I hope to see every-body returning in 1986/87.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- 1. These financial accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values.
- 2. Interest has been brought to account as it is credited to the various accounts.
- 3. Expenses incurred but not yet invoiced have been accrued on the basis of best available information.
- 4. Funds provided by Macquarie University Sports Association for use by Macquarie University Cricket Club are accounted for on a calandar year basis.
- 5. Equipment purchased by the club is expensed in the year of purchase.
- 6. Stock on hand as at 30th April, 1985 consists of Clothing and Drink Cans.

The 1985/86 season was financially successful for the club. The surplus of \$970.63 is at a more realistic level than the 1984/85 year.

During the year the club engaged in major expenditure in that we purchased a large cover and an equipment shed on a concrete base. Both projects were paid on a half-share basis with Macquarie University Sports Association.

We must extend a thankyou to the Sports Association for the assistance they give us. They supply assistance with special projects such as covers and the equipment shed. This year's recurrent assistance totalled \$1,956. This recurrent grant only just covers the cost of cricket balls, so most of the gear replacement must be made directly from our funds. The Sports Association also provides the grounds at no charge and use of the Sports Centre where revenue can be raised and functions held. Most other clubs don't have these facilities. Special thanks should also be made to Courtney Bacon for the assistance given on Saturdays during the season and Charlie Seaton and his Ground staff for the excellent wicket he prepares for both match and social days.

While handing out thanks some criticism should also be made. The Sports Association requires all invoices to be paid within 60 days and if they aren't paid penalties are imposed. It is interesting to note that Macquarie University Sports Association still owes the club its half-share of the shed. This was invoiced in March and still not paid in mid-July, even though it has been promised twice. Surely the Sports Association could comply with its own rules.

Social profits were down this year due to a decision to be a little freer in this area. During the year such functions as the Annual General Meeting, Wine Tasting (twice), Shed Opening, the Spit, were run at no charge or minimal cost. Refreshments were also provided to workers on such things as concrete laying. Towards the middle of the year we also had "break-in" problems on Sunday mornings before events. Subsequently, alarm facilites have been installed in the Sports Centre. The charge for beer has also remained constant for five years even though the cost is approaching our charge price.

The cost of clothing used dropped dramatically during this season as we did not give T-shirts away with each subscription.

I must thank all people who helped during the year, such as Al Mahoney, Sticks Lewis, Warrick Folkard, Mark Schaafsma and Ivan Blyth who collected subs or drove to Cash and Carry or ran 7-A-Side. Thanks must also be extended to all the behind-the-bar helpers. Let's all look forward to a successful 1986/87 season.

1985-86 7-A SIDE REPORT

This season's 7-A Side competition was held on Sunday the 1st of December, and, as has been the trend in the last couple of seasons, rain fell during the week-end to hamper the running of the competition.

Again a number of Shires Clubs failed to support the day, some failing to attend after indicating they would be fielding teams.

Macquarie fielded 3 teams, including a gentleman's seven. As would be expected the gentlemen's contribution off the field was more substantial than then on-field contribution, and they bowed out in the first round.

The Macquarie 1's team scraped through their first round against Roseville with Steve O'Reilly and Ian Jessup taking 36 runs off the second last over. Most of these were in wides (4 runs for each wide) but Steve and Ian aren't telling anyone else that! Dave Craig made sure the Macquarie 2's didn't progress past the early rounds with a bowling performance similar to that of the Roseville bowler.

Macquarie 1's, capably captained by Mark Schaafsma, won through to the final with some solid performances, while Meadowbank were shock finalists after defeating Burwoood in a semi-final. Macquarie bowled and fielded very tightly, taking some good catches under pressure, to set up a convincing victory.

Highlight of the day to many was when Grizzle got the opportunity most umpires long for in their careers and signalled "two short" on one occasion.

Although the day was a success, it was not as successful as past 7-A Side competitions have been, and more effort is needed in future years in promoting the competition amoungst the Shires clubs, encouraging sides such as the Country Specials to attend and in getting Macquarie players to play and assist with catering if the competition is to remain an enjoyable and financially rewarding day on the Macquarie calendar.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT A SHIRES

At the start of the season I was very confident that we had the players to form a successful combination. At the end of the season, I had not changed my opinion.

My early confidence was justified after the first four games in which we had registered two wins, a tie against the defending premiers and a moral victory (draw). In the next game we were comprehensively and embarrassingly beaten by a far better team and it seemed to take a long time to extinguish the memory of this resounding loss.

In Rounds 5-12 the only points we received were from a washed out game. Of minor consolation is the fact that three losses occurred in the last over while a further loss was registered in the second last over. However, all good things come to those who wait, and having waited eight games, we rallied at the end of the season and chalked up three consecutive wins. Our zest in the redraws enabled us to improve our position and we had the distinction of being the last team in the Club to hang up our boots for the season.

The team suffered throughout the season because of losses in playing personnel. Macquarie University Cricket Club, by the very nature of the population from which it draws, is continually beleaguered by the loss of players at crucial times during the season. The significance of the loss of Paul Notaras after only five games is highlighted by the fact that he easily topped the batting average and still managed to come fifth in the batting aggregate. Another notable loss during the season was Trevor Norton after only two games due to work commitments (attendances at games will never be the same Trevor). Also lost during the season were Alan Davies and Andrew Harrex both of whom are more than capable of rewriting the record books if they play a full season. Losses of players do damage team morale and the departure of Brian King made our task all the more difficult.

Commitment is a word which some players could do well to heed. Other clubs do not tolerate anything less than a total commitment from their players and the same rules should apply at Macquarie. I accept as inevitable that players will usually at some stage of the season be genuinely unavailable. What I do find hard to accept is the unavailability of players for what I consider to be totally unacceptable excuses.

Our losses in playing staff during the season occurred mainly in the bowling department. This was reflected in many of our games during the drought (Rounds 5-12) where our batsmen had posted a winning score but we lacked the penetration to come away with the six points. Towards the end of the season we found the right bowling formula only to find that the standard of batting had fallen. The return of Laurie Ager to our ranks added penetration and variability to our attack and those "big in-duckers" (as one dismissed batsman was head to say) claimed no fewer than 21 victims in 6 games at an unbelievable average of 10.5. Craig Edwards worked hard all year and topped the wicket tally with 29.

Captain's Report A Shire (con't)

Indoor was often required to do a lot of work on flat Macquarie wickets and every time he was handed the ball he went about his task with keenness and determination. Trevor Lockett was always consistent and bowled without luck on many occasions. Towards the end of the season he developed the knack of nearly always achieving the early breakthroughs. Warrick bowled with guile beyond his years and emerged a better bowler for his many marathon spells. Warrick can take heart from the fact that Bob Holland did not play for Australia until he was in his late thirties.

On the whole it could be said that the batting was disappointing with only three players scoring more than 250 runs. Nevertheless there were instances where our batting was very sound and well disciplined. The batting problems stemmed from the inability to find a suitable opening pair. During the season five pairings were employed but the highest opening partnership of the season of 31 speaks for itself. Coupled with our opening partnership problem was our failure to ensure the opposition's opening partnership was cheaply broken.

Of the batsmen, Brian Jones proved to be an aggressive top order batsman and played some very useful innings in compiling 283 runs. Graham Lego scored 251 and has the potential to double this next season while Ivan Blyth (210) would agree that its hard to produce the sensational form of last season scoring 174 runs at 21.75 batting mainly down the order.

Peter Garty gave a tidy display behind the stumps and was often required to spend long afternoons in the crouching position with little if any sign of a chance coming his way. He was also quite useful with the bat and averaged 17.

Thanks to everyone who stuck at it during the season because there were times when "the going got tough". Thanks also to Ivan for his support and insights during the year. I believe that we have learned a considerable amount from our first year out of grade and we can build on this next October and become a real force in Shires cricket again.

MATCH REPORTS - A SHIRES

vs. Pennant Hills

Macquarie University 8/270 DREW with Pennant Hills 8/243.

Batting first our hopes of posting a big score took a major setback when our first wicket fell on the second ball of the season. Wickets fell steadily throughout the first session and at 6/91, shortly after tea, a disastrous start to the season was threatening. However, Paul Notaras and Brian King had other ideas and surpassed the previous club record for the 7th wicket with a partnership of 137. Paul hammered an unbeaten 118 in 124 minutes and Brian a forceful 56 with 7 boundaries. The following week saw Pennant Hills bat on an obviously well-rolled wicket with no encouragement whatsoever for our bowlers. At 1/139 the opposition was in a good position to launch an assualt on the target but through tight bowling and fielding, Pennant Hills stumbled to 8/230 before closing up shop. Brian King and Craig 'Indoor' Edwards toiled hard and were rewarded with 3 wickets each. It is not possible to comment on this game without mentioning several appalling decisions made by the Pennant Hills umpires which were largely responsible for the outcome of the game.

vs. Wenworthville.

Macquarie University 6/150 DEFEATED Wentworthville 9/146.

An extremely tidy bowling effort from all bowlers restricted Wentworthville to 146 from 52 overs, with only three of their batsmen reaching double figures. "Indoor" collected 4/32 from 15 nagging overs and his ability to beat the bat and find the outside edge could have easily produced a 6 wicket haul. Chasing a small target we started slowly but with wickets in hand the pressure was always on the fielding side. Brian Jones (38) and Paul Notaras (25 not out) gave a great exhibition of sensible and powerful hitting and the target was achieved with almost 2 over to spare. Earlier in the innings, Graham 'Legs' Lego scored 31 including, believe it or not, a lofted on drive that raced away to the boundary.

vs. Burwood.

Macquarie University 8/204 TIED with Burwood 9/204.

After losing the toss and being invited to bat on a well-grassed wicket, it was obvious that Burwood, the defending premiers, were confident of dismissing us cheaply. The field for the first over comprised 4 slips, a gully, a leg slip, 2 short legs and cover point. As our innings gained momentum it was pleasing to see the competition front-runners become more and more defensive. The main contibutors in the batting department were Ivan Blyth (46), Steve O'Reilly (84) and Brian Jones (35).

The formidable Burwood batting line-up began slowly but with wickets in hand, they were always going to give the target a shake. At 8 wickets down and needing 10 to win off the last over, the equation was the last pair at the crease. With 9 men on the boundary and in poor light, the Burwood No.9 creamed a drive and found the short boundary. The result: a relieved Burwood side, a somewaht disappointed Macquarie side but to use a well worn cliche cricket was the winner. Of our bowling, Craig Edwards (5/64) continued his good form, Brian King picked up three wickets and Paul 'Nasty' Notaras bowled with fire and beat the batsmen for pace on many occasions.

vs. Lindfield.

Macquarie University 9/160 DEFEATED Lindfield 136.

One look at the Lindfield pitch and it was obvious that low scores would be the order of the day. The low bounce made run scoring very difficult and after 55 overs, Macquarie had reached 160 for the loss of 9 wickets with Graham Lego top-scoring with 41.

Lindfield were in the game until Alan "Destroyer" Davies produced a devastating second spell capturing 4/2 from 6.4 superbly accurate overs. Alan finished with match figures 6/27 from 15.4 overs, a performance which earned him the 'Mug' on his A shires' debut.

vs. Epping

Macquarie University 95 LOST to Epping 2/169.

Althrough we hadn't been defeated in our first four games, our first loss of the season was both surprising and humiliating. We simply surrendered our first innings and were dismissed for a miserable 95. 'Sticks' Lewis was the only one to show any fight and made a determined 27 after coming to the wicket with the score at 6/32.

The Epping batsmen blazed away from the very first over and rattled up 2/169 in just two hours. Playing against his old club, Sticks was the only success-

ful bowler. The ease with which Epping tore our attack apart was just as alarming as the ease with which they routed our batting line up which, prior to this game, had not been dismissed. Fortunately for Epping the second day of the match was abandoned as we were keen to regain our lost pride with a good performance.

vs. Warringah.

Macquarie University 7/183 LOST to Warringah 7/186.

Batting first on a wicket where the ball was not quite coming on to the bat, Macquarie posted 7/183 off 55 overs. Blyth (31), O'Reilly (49) and Folkard (36) contributed the bulk of the runs.

The game seemed to be in our keeping with the Warringah top order finding the task of scoring more than 3 runs an over beyond them. Play continued as light rain fell and Warringah stumbled to 4/45 off 20 overs. However as the rain continued the ball started to skid off the pitch and come on to the bat to the liking of the late-order Warringah batsmen. Catching became difficult as evidenced by the fact that 3 chances were grassed during one Folkard over. At 7/126 the game should have been ours but an unbroken whirlwind partnership of 60 wrested victory away from us, the winning runs being hit with two balls of the last over to spare. Warrick was the pick of the bowlers with 4/68 and was supported by Big Bad B. Brian' King who snared 3 scalps.

vs. Bexley.

Macquarie University 9/203 DREW with Bexley 8/225.

In the two previous games we found difficulty in achieving an early breakthrough. In this game Brian King removed both openers very cheaply but we were unable to capitalise and the 3rd, 4th and 5th wicket partnerships realised 56, 49 and 57 runs respectively. Nevertheless our bowlers contained the Bexley batsmen for most of the day and it was only a last hour flourish that pushed their score from 140 to 225. Craig Edwards (3/55) and Brian King (2/44) were the main strikers.

The following week we had high hopes of passing Bexley's score and at 1/60 we looked to be in the box seat. However wickets started to tumble at regular intervals and at 8/148 Indoor joined Legs at the crease. Indoor, relishing his opportunity at batting number 10, kept the hostile Bexley attack at bay for a considerable time in scoring 29 with red ink. Legs scored a breezy 36 (by Legs' standards), the 9th wicket partnership boasting 53 runs. Earlier, Ivan had continued his form of the previous week by posting a well compiled 56. Perhaps the highlight of this game was that in the quick departure after the last over, poor Legs found that his transport had left without him.

vs. Canterbury.

Macquarie University 4/221 LOST to Canterbury 4/222.

After winning the toss and electing to bat, we were soon in trouble at 2/9. A third wicket partnership of 92 between Schaafsma (56 on debut) and O'Reilly (80) set the scene for 200 plus score. President Folkard chipped in for a valuable 39 not out and Brian Jones gave a fireworks display that rivalled New Years Eve in blasting 30 not out in no time at all (5 boundaries).

Canterbury commenced their innings in fine style and scored at 4 an over from the word go. One Canterbury batsman seems to score a century against us every season and this game was no exception as he carried his bat for 102. Had we held our chances we would have been able to exert more pressure on the batsmen. This was one day when the Macquarie oval proved to be too big to defend a score on, and the liberal interpretation of the one day wide rule by the umpires made our task all the more difficult.

vs. Baulkham Hill.

Macquarie University DREW with Baulkham Hills 7/257.

Batting on a Macquarie mirror it was always going to be a long afternoon. The bowlers toiled hard and on numerous occasions the opposition batsmen managed to chip wide or short of or beyond eager Macquarie fieldsmen. Warrick Folkard to be the most successful bowler in snaring 5/92 from a countless number of overs. His performance prompted the comment from a certain talkative member of the cricket club that "Warrick is really developing into a fine young all-rounder."

During the following week the heavens opened all too frequently and on Saturday the Wet Weather Committee (WWC or alternatively OLAC) felt fit to deny us another win.

vs. Strathfield.

Macquarie University 160 LOST to Strathfield 3/218.

This was only our second drubbing of the season. Being sent in on a 'strange' wicket we were always struggling and it was not until shortly before tea that the boundary was reached for the first time. The Strathfield bowlers were very ordinary but found a great ally in the wicket itself. Craig 'Runs' Anderson top scored with 32, Schaafs grafted 23 and Indoor kept intact his record of hitting a six each season in scoring 20.

At the close of the first day's play Strathfield were conservatively estimated at 1/12 and we were still in the game. The second day's play was on the following Monday and it was remarkable how the wicket had transformed into a run paradise. Rumours that the Hudson Oval curator paid his Sunday overtime money into a Swiss Bank account are yet to be confirmed. One of the Strathfield batsmen (an ex first-grader) tore the heart out of our attack and scored 150 not out. He shared in a third wicket partnership of 165 of which he contributed 130 (shades of the famous Monaghan/Folkard partnership). Brian King, playing his "farewell" game, was the pick of the bowlers with 2/27 from 16 overs.

vs. Auburn

Macquarie University 8/133 LOST to Auburn 7/135.

Batting first only three of our batsmen came to terms with the renowned Mona Park track. Brian Jones welcomed his promotion up the order and defied the Auburn attack to score 58. Craig Edwards (17) and Peter Garty (24 not out) gave our total some respectability given the conditions and frustrated the Auburn attack.

A score of more than 100 being something of a rarity at Mona Park, we thought we were in with a good chance. With Auburn at 4/18 we thought we had an excellent chance. However, the next wicket fell at 107 and although it triggered a minor collapse, crucial fielding errors let the premiership semi-finalists off the hook. Auburn were quite relieved to come away with the two points after passing our score with 8 balls to spare. Edwards charged into his bowling and was rewarded with 5/33 from 17 and Trevor Lockett worked hard to take 2/34 from 13. Another game that got away.

vs. Roseville

Macquarie University 239 LOST to Roseville 249.

This match marked the emergence of a promising young bowler by the name of Laurie Ager. He bowled with the cunning and guile of a much more experienced bowler in capturing 5/84 from 28 overs on a pitch that offered little assistance to the bowlers. Trevor also bowled well to take 3/40.

The run chase the next week began at a snail's pace with Legs making an unlikely anchor man. It is believed that he set a new Macquarie record in battling for the entire first session in scoring 18 runs. After tea the scoring picked up markedly with Legs (71) and O'Reilly (56) combining to score 93 for the fourth wicket. Needing 85 to win off the last twenty overs with six wickets in hand, it looked like the game was going to go down to the wire. At 5/208 the wheels were turning smoothly but the loss of Scotter (27) and Legs without addition to the score put the pressure on the lower order batsmen and the final wicket fell in the twentieth over.

vs. Lane Cove

Macquarie University 4/162 DEFEATED Lane Cove 153.

This game was a very satisfying way to end the competition rounds. By defeating Lane Cove so comfortably and in so doing knocking them out of the four, we turned the premiership contenders into premiership pretenders. The victory was set up on the first day through excellent bowling by Messrs. Ager, Folkard and Lockett. The Lane Cove batsmen had no answer to the swing of Ager who managed to rattle the stumps on four occasions in taking 6/50 from 24.2 overs. Folkard tied the batsmen in knots in taking 2/27 from 23 flighted overs, and Lockett once again achieved the early breakthroughs (2/25 from 13).

Resuming at 1/1 overnight, Edwards, the nightwatchman, proved to be an obstacle the Lane Cowe bowlers could not overcome until the score was 117. By this time the game for the club, shared in a partnership of 92 for the third wicket with Edwards (58). The Lane Cover captain admitted after the game that "your left hander was one of the better batsmen we've come across this season". The confidence and shot-making displayed by Edwards certainly did no harm to his claims for all-rounder status.

REDRAWS

Round 1 vs Canterbury

Macquarie University 5/136 DEFEATED Canterbury 135

The weather was so miserable for our revenge game against Canterbury that, for the first time all season, the cricket jumpers were given an airing. The Canterbury team capitulated against the tight Macquarie attack with "Teeny" Ager (4/11) and Trevor Lockett (3/21) doing the most damage.

In reply, a second wicket partnership of 60 between Ivan Blyth (34) and the Minister for the Shed Ian Jessup (55) put us on the path to victory. The responsibility of the No. 3 position was not lost on Jessup who realised that Indoor's innings at No. 3 the previous week had won us that game. Towards the end of our innings, the run rate dropped and it was left to Graham "Pinch Hitter" Lego to smash two boundaries in the second last over to seal the victory.

Round 2 vs Lane Cove

Macquarie University 9/110 DEFEATED Lane Cove 9/106.

With our annihilation of Lane Cove two weeks ago still fresh in our minds, we were keen to prove that it wasn't a fluke. After being confined to a paltry 110 the chances of repeating our earlier success looked slim. The standard of our batting was reflected in that only two batsmen reached double figures. Legs continued his big hitting of the previous week in hammering 5 sixes in scoring 32, a feat of which Roy (a batsman very much in the same mould as Legs) would have been proud. To put Legs' efforts into perspective, I must point out that, due to local rules, the two biggest sixes did not find their way into the scorebook.

The Lane Cove side were well placed at 3/77 but their run rate was a bit behind that required. A period followed where we were able to pressurise the Lane Cove batsmen into making mistakes. Indoor captured three wickets in what was easily the longest over of the season. The over took some 15 minutes to complete because, firstly, the next man in happened to be umpiring at the time, and secondly, another incoming batsman was so confident of victory that he had already changed out of his whites. It came as no surprise therefore that the allotted overs could not be completed within the allotted time, and with one over remaining, Lane Cove were saved from the embarrassment of losing their last wicket. The wickets were shared between Craig (3/23), Laurie (2/18) and Warrick (2/25).

Semi-Final vs Warringah

Macquarie University 9/94 LOST to Warringah 6/97

This was our chance to avenge our first round loss to Warringah but there's always another chance next season. Mark Schaafsma top scored with 26 and Peter Garty (16 not out) was responsible for lifting our score to anywhere near the ton.

It was a credit to the bowlers that we were able to come out of this game with our respectability intact. Another inspired four wicket spell from Ager saw the top four Warringah batsmen on their way to climb the 54 steps. Ivan bowled extremely well to take 2/9 from 6 overs and the game was into the final 5 overs before the curtain came down on the 85/86 season. Despite the loss we could take consolation from the fact that we did not have to play the following week (Easter Saturday).

CAPTAIN'S REPORT B SHIRES

The 1985/86 Season in B Shires was the most successful in six seasons, however it still fell short of expectations. From 15 games played we had seven wins, two draws and six losses. At round five we were running first on 28 points after already having played a number of the top sides. Uni. "holidays" occurred, the side was drastically changed, and we never regained the momentum of the first five rounds. We were never short of motivation against the top sides. Fine winning performances were put in against the eventual premiers, Auburn, as well as semi-finalists, Epping and Wentworthville. Other good performances against Lindfield and Burwood had the Epping and Auburn captains not wanting us in the semis. Perhaps next year a little more consistency against the lower sides and we will be there with a big show.

There were many fine performances during the year, not the least being "Sticks" Lewis record-breaking 35 wickets in a season. "Sticks" passed legends Dr "Flash" Leslie and Bob Vagg by one wicket, even though he played four games in A Shires. Richard Najdzion, with 24 wickets, could improve further with more experience, Ken Dixon, with 20 wickets, finished the season strongly showing a very mature approach to his cricket and Allan Davies with 17 wickets were the three great finds of the season. Ronnie Ait ken with 10 wickets from his 5 games gave us all a lesson in out-swing bowling and was particularly helpful to Richard. Thanks for this Ron, Richard will no doubt benefit greatly.

The batting started aggressively early in the season and started to die towards the end. The leading run getter was "Grizzle" Welsby with 327 although many averaged higher than him. Harrex with an average of 63, Folkard and Jessup 38, O'Brien 36, Schaafsma 30 and Craig 24, all averaged well, although, for one reason or another, didn't play the full season in B's. Ken Dixon averaging 23 from 187 runs showed what a good al-rounder he is. Al Mahoney, with some inspired hitting at the season's end, finished with 143 runs at 20. "Roy" Denlow, with some strong hitting early, helped with some important early wins. Richard Najdzion showed his own style (very simular to Roy's) which earned him two great 50's to average 22.

A number of wicket-keepers were used during the season. Andy Harrex finished with 5 catches and one stumping from four games and was the most productive. The general catching in the middle of the season let us down.

The side experienced many variations in wickets and opposition behaviour. We had the unpredictable wet wicket at Macquarie or the dry, hard slabs which are great for batting. Wet wickets at Warringah, Epping and Wentworthville all behaved in different ways. We also experienced a "wet" wicket at Roseville that was called off even though by match time the top had cracked!

Opposition behaviour varied greatly from say Wentworthville, who were the perfect hosts , to other less savery sides who refused to leave the cricket on the field.

The wide experience the B's had in both wickets, behaviour and umpiring should help the younger players with their future cricket. This season really was a season of many extremes.

Future seasons look rosy for the "B"'s. The current personnel are quite capable of taking out the flag particularly with the excellent facilities we play under. With larger covers and super-soppers we will have very few games washed out, where other people may not play. If every player is also on the lookout for additional players, we as a club, can only become stronger. We will be able to play on the new oval and a women's side may also not be out of the question.

The "B" Shires would like to congratulate the eventual premiers - Auburn upon winning the competition, and any other side that played in a competitive and fair spirit. Our congratulations must also go to the"C" Shires for making the semi-finals - it's a pity about the rain. My sincere thanks should go to Nick, Harry and Warrick for putting up with calls late in the week to fill "drop-outs". My thanks also go to people in the side who do all the tasks that need doing:- the scoring, kit-packing, serving behind the bar, afternoon teas, collecting the flags and stumps, statistics - all tasks which make a captain's job easier. My thanks go to each and every player in the side during the year as each player's contribution and personality made it a very enjoyable year. Finally, thanks for putting up with me for the whole season.

Let's see everyone at the pre-season trainings early in August and let's look forward to a successful 1986/87 season.
