

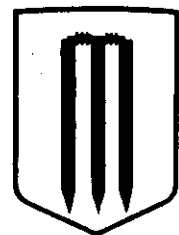

## PRESIDENT'S SOLILOQUY

Sincere congratulations to the University of N.S.W. on winning the Grade cricket competition for the first time. It is a deserved culmination to the prolonged efforts of many people who have helped to build the club to its present strength - efforts which span a quarter of a century.

This is the tenth anniversary of the Macquarie University Cricket Club and in many ways our most successful. We did not win any competitions but all teams acquitted themselves well. There is greater depth in the club now than ever before. It is very pleasing too that the strength of the club administration has reached a highly satisfactory level and shows every promise of improving further with the experience which is accumulating.

Much remains to be achieved and the challenge is always there. Cricket itself is subject to the ethos of the times. It is to be hoped that new developments will not detract from the values of the past, at either the international or local level. University clubs have specific difficulties, with changing membership, that other clubs do not always experience. They have nevertheless an added sense of responsibility to their alma mater, which can strengthen them to resist deprecation. Universities themselves do not enjoy universal approbation, and university clubs can always anticipate some inbuilt animosities which will need additional care and effort, if success is to be the result.

Our hope is for better and stronger effort, and success, in the future.

Appropriately over annual dinner, at the conclusion of the playing season, was the most successful ever. It marked the conclusion of ten seasons of cricket by the club - almost congruent with the first ten years of teaching by the university. We were delighted to have with us, Professor Barclay, Deputy Vice-Chancellor.

Great credit is due to Garry Leary for his organisation of the dinner and for arranging the magnificent cake to commemorate the occasion.

With pleasant memories of Rick McCosker and his wife, as guests at our 1976 dinner, we were disappointed that the new commercialism in cricket made it impossible for

us to have such a guest at this year's celebration.

Happily, Peter Miller gave his usual performance, as Master of Ceremonies, and filled the breach more than adequately, for which he deserves a special vote of thanks. It would appear that we must adjust, in the future, to the notion that good fellowship has a price. Hopefully we may never need to succumb - that our own membership can continue to rise to the occasion.

During the evening, occasion was taken, to recognise the coincidence of our tenth anniversary, and Peter Barclay's ten years of playing membership with the club, by presenting to him an inscribed pewter. His custodianship, as the only member eligible for the honour, places upon him the responsibility for the only tangible testimony of the occasion, which might exist into the future. Hopefully it might occupy a place of some honour at the fiftieth anniversary dinner, an event that I should dearly like to see. (humour).

Occasion was also taken to present a pewter to Graham Hargreaves, in recognition of his long and faithful service to the club.

INTER-VARSITY CRICKET

The I-V competition as it was known previously has been altered completely.

There will now be no official I-V matches between University sides. Any matches that do take place must be organised by the respective Universities more or less as social games.

The I-V competition will consist of some three day fixtures between selected teams from four regional areas throughout Australia. The team chosen from the Sydney region will comprise eligible players from Macquarie University, Sydney University, the University of New South Wales, and Wollongong University.

The result of these changes is that the I-V competition as it was played previously, and as it is still played in most other sports, has now been abolished. In its place is a high standard cricket competition for a select group of players.

The effect of this change on the Macquarie University Club is significant. It now seems unlikely that anyone who plays for our club in the Shires competition will make the Sydney representative side. This is because such a team will consist solely of 1st Grade players coming mainly from the UNSW and Sydney University Grade sides. It means also that our Blue and Half-Blue requirements will have to be changed to preclude inter- varsity representation as a requirement.

In spite of these changes we did manage to organise matches against Sydney University and UNSW on a social basis. We encountered problems in fielding a full side for the three day fixture against Sydney University, but it proved a most enjoyable experience for those who found the time. We would like to thank Sydney University for the after match activities that they provided. The limited over match against UNSW did not live up to our expectations and the shortage of players in their team made it a rather one sided affair.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - FIRST ELEVEN

Last season I accounted for our failure to make the semi-finals by writing 'We were not unlucky, we simply left our run too late'. This season one can say 'We were not unlucky, we simply couldn't maintain our early run of successes'. A mid-season slump cost us a "semis" opportunity.

Despite this, 1976-77 was a magnificent season for 'A' Shires and the club as a whole. Laurie Ager proved a great asset both on and off the field. Capturing 55 wickets including 8 for 17 against Roseville speaks for itself. His dedication to practice and personal fitness provides a lesson to many players. His efforts were rewarded with a university Half Blue, a Clubman award and the sharing of the "M.R. Gwilliam Shield" with Martin Denlow.

An aggregate of 434 runs at an average of 33.4 clearly demonstrated Martin Denlow's maturity as a batsman this season. Three scores over fifty including 91 against Roseville reinforces this view.

Next season we will be without Geoff Frankish. Geoff has played over eighty games for the club since joining in 1970. He has been a great competitor and has possessed the most admirable quality of all -sportsmanship. He will be a great loss.

Finally I wish to thank our faithful ladies for making us the envy of all our opponents.

MATCH REPORTS - FIRST ELEVEN

- vs Canterbury..... Lost 1st innings. A middle to late order batting collapse where 5 wickets were lost for only 18 runs, prevented a match winning score. Geoff Frankish batted well for 47 and Laurie Ager with 6 for 75 indicated what a force he would be in his initial season.
- vs Burwood ..... Won 1st innings. A fine display by Garry Leary (6 for 33) and a disciplined innings of 67 by Bob Scott enabled Macquarie to pass our opponents score with only 3 wickets down. (G. Frankish 4 for 23)

- vs Ryde-Balmain.... Won 1st innings. This was a poor Macquarie performance but a memorable match on two accounts - the sight of our rivals avoiding death rays during the eclipse and a magnificent match-winning partnership of 47 between Ian Graham (30) and Peter Miller (23) for the last wicket. (L. Ager 4 for 60, N. Castle 34)
- vs Bexley..... Won 1st innings. An opening partnership of 59 (N. Castle 41) and a good all-round bowling and fielding attack facilitated an easy win (G. Frankish 4 for 16, P. Miller 3 for 20, and L. Ager 3 for 20)
- vs Lane Cove..... Won 1st innings. One of our best wins. Accurate bowling by Peter Miller (3 for 24) and John Giuffre (3 for 22) dismissed Lane Cove for 108. We passed this score for the loss of only one wicket (G. Frankish 46 n.o., R. Scott 39) Lane Cove replied with 8 dec. for 129 but rain prevented any possible outright.
- vs Roseville..... Lost 1st innings. A closely contested and exciting match which saw good performances by Steve Wiblin (43 n.o. and 6 for 86) and Martin Denlow (91 stumped) A fine tenth wicket partnership of 31 by the Roseville tail-enders chasing a total of 232 put paid to our winning run.
- vs Lindfield..... Lost 1st innings. Loss of batting concentration with too many batsmen making a start but not building upon it prevented a match winning score (R. Scott 40) Lindfield overhauled our score of 165 for the loss of 7 wickets despite some good in-swing bowling by Laurie Ager (4 for 20).
- vs Auburn-Lidcombe. Lost 1st innings. Dropped catches and a disastrous batting collapse prevented what should have been a relatively easy win.
- vs Epping..... Won 1st innings. A fine win against an opposition that are always difficult to beat. A fourth wicket partnership of 102 between Martin Denlow (77) and Steve Wiblin (27) enabled Macquarie to

total 211. Spirited fielding and persistent bowling (L. Ager 4 for 49) dismissed Epping for 179 runs.

vs Pennant Hills... Drawn. After losing the toss, Macquarie batted the entire first day on a difficult scoring wicket and out-field to declare 8 down for 228 - Geoff Frankish (56) and Martin Denlow (64) doing most of the damage. Pennant Hills replied with a most frustrating display of batting under perfect conditions. Play ended with the score at 9 for 148 after 69 overs had been bowled (P. Miller 5 for 15 off 15 overs).

vs Wentworthville-  
Blacktown..... Lost outright. Poor batting resulted in Macquarie totalling a meagre 113. Wentworthville replied with 6 dec. for 119 (L. Ager 4 for 41). In an effort to secure vital competition points Macquarie's second innings closed at 7 for 110 (G. Frankish 47 n.o.), which proved all too easy a task for our opponents.

vs Roseville ..... (First Redraw) Won 1st innings. A low scoring match which was notable for only one thing - a fine match-winning spell of bowling by Laurie Ager; 5 for 12 off 11 overs.

vs Roseville ..... (Second Redraw) Lost 1 innings. This match featured two individual performances worthy of comment - a well compiled 65 runs by Nev Castle and the most outstanding display of swing bowling yet seen by Macquarie from Laurie Ager (4 for 73 off 24 overs in the 1st innings followed by 8 for 17 off 6 overs in second innings).

Congratulations to the Lindfield club on winning the 'A' shires competition.

vs Canterbury..... Lost 1st innings, caught on a wet wicket.  
Feature of the match was 9th Wicket partnership of 70 runs between Andy Hercus (43) and Ian Hargrove (28). Michael Leslie bowled well to capture 4/44.



- vs Burwood..... 1st win for the season. Batting first we declared at 9 for 243. Graeme Bleus 77, and Chris Gold 40 were the pick of the batsman, Burwood were dismissed for 71. The main destroyers were Mark Wormell 4 for 27 and Chris Gold 3 for 20. Rain prevented an outright win.
- vs Ryde-Balmain. Won 1st innings. A 77 ran fifth wicket partnership between Ed. O'Connor (41) and Brian Jones 30 helped us reach 149. Mark Wormell once again ripped through the Ryde batting with 6 for 43, ED O'Connor picked up 3 for 25 which enabled us to win by 13 runs.
- vs Bexley..... Won 1st innings. After declaring at 6 for 285. (W. Folkard 57, C. Welsby 54 and E. O'Connor 47n.o.) were the pick of the batsman, Bexley were dismissed for 183. Michael Leslie picked up 3 for 38.
- vs Lane Cove.... Another easy 1st innings win. Rain prevented an outright win. Michael Denlow top scored with a good 84, Andy Hercus a hard hit 59 and Graeme Bleus 45, which helped the score along to 255. Lane Cove were shot out for 82. Michael Leslie had the impressive figures of 6 for 38 from 18 overs.
- vs Roseville..... Won 1st innings but lost outright. Batting first we scored 156 (Ed O'Connor 34) Roseville were dismissed for 119. ED O'Connor 4 for 10 from 4.5 overs proved our best bowler. Michael Leslie picked up 4/57. Batting a second time we declared at 6 for 119 leaving Roseville 146 for Victory which they achieved.

- vs Bexley..... Won 1st innings. A magnificent unbeaten century by John Wickham was the feature of this match. John took full control of the Bexley attack and was never in trouble. Chris Welsby 52 and Ian Graham 41 also batted well. This enabled us to declare at 6 for 290. Bexley were all out for 124. Ed.
