Edo has made an amazing contribution to MUCC, with his passion and commitment to its welfare and betterment unquestionable. Committee meetings won't be the same without Edo. TREASURER'S REPORT

Report for year ended 31 December 2003

The financial statements of Macquarie University Cricket Club (MUCC), for the year ended 31 December 2003 are presented on the following pages, along with our audit report. The financial statements are summarised in the commentary below.

I report that total income and expenditure receded back to levels consistent with that of a year without an international tour, while our club's cash position strengthened.

The club's monetary responsibilities have been evolving during the year as a result of our incorporation with Macquarie University Sports Association ("MUSA"). MUSA have been implementing new methods of club accounting and governance. In short, these changes are positive for MUCC and will help strengthen our accounting procedures. The main changes for MUCC are:

- 1 <u>MUSA have remodelled the cricket club's monetary arrangements</u>. MUSA have implemented a new method for the distribution and accountability of club funds. As you can see in our financial statements, our NAB account and HSBC term deposit have been closed and all our cash reserves are now maintained in a MUSA/MUCC trust account. Going forward, MUSA will draw cheques on our behalf. This is a change that provides greater transparency for club expenditure.
- 2 <u>MUSA have formalised funding arrangements</u>. MUCC are now subject to greater accountability and analysis of expenditure as a result of changes to reporting deadlines and reporting requirements. As I write this report, we are in the process of negotiating an appropriate service level agreement between MUCC and MUSA to ensure that both parties are aware of their role and responsibilities.
- 3 <u>MUSA no longer require audited MUCC financial accounts</u>. 2003 marks the last year where MUCC are required to submit its own audited financial accounts. In the future, MUSA will perform audits on the club's financial records, which means our professional relationship with Elliott House Chartered Accountants will cease.

I believe that as a result of these changes our financial relationship with MUSA will continue to grow stronger.

<u>Cash</u>

MUCC accounts on a cash basis for all transactions. The closing cash balance for the year ended 31 December 2003 was \$27,335.70 (2002: \$26,502.06), which represents an increase of \$833.64 in our cash reserves, as detailed below:

During the year MUCC utilised \$8,473 (2002: \$33,523) of funding, represented as:

MUSA's contribution is dramatically lower than last years' grant because we utilised grant funds early (i.e. during 2002), the UK tour artificially inflated the prior year's funding, and our Project Fund was rolled forward into financial year 2004.

In addition to our funding grants, our sources of income totaling \$26,680.85 included yearly member subscriptions, sales of clothing and refreshments, interest and of course, our fundraising activities.

Many thanks are extended to all who supported our successful fundraising activities undertaken during the year. These included the Cricket World Cup Dream Team, Rugby World Cup and MUCC Fantasy League competitions - competitions that pitted knowledge and statistics against the luck of the game. Congratulations to the gentlemen who won these competitions, John Howe, Craig Edwards and Mark Fairlie. The annual auction held at our Annual Dinner was a major fundraiser. We had some high quality items, which drew some high bidding. Our fundraising helps the ongoing financial stability of the club and the club spirit.

Expenditure

Our major expenditure for the financial year included:

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE MACQUARIE UNIVERSITY CRICKET CLUB

SCOPE

I have audited the financial statements of the Macquarie University Cricket Club for the year ended 31 December 2003. The Committee is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements and the information they contain. I have conducted an independent audit of these financial statements in order to express an opinion on them to the members.

My audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. My procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial statements, and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. The club predominately trades on a cash basis, which is the normal trading basis for clubs of this kind. Therefore the audit is restricted to actual cash banked ane recorded. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion as to whether, in all material aspects, the financial statements are presented fairly in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards so as to prevent a view of the association which is consistent with my understanding of its financial position, the results of its operations and cash flows.

The audit opinion expressed in this Report has been formed on the above basis.

AUDIT OPINION

In my opinion, the financial statements do present fairly in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, the financial position of the Macquarie University Cricket Club as at 31 December 2003.



CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 1ST GRADE SHIRES

A reflection on season 2003-04 will show that First Grade defeated all the sides finishing below it and compete with the other teams except for the top three, who simply just smashed us. It was certainly and entertaining and enjoyable season with the team morale good throughout and the in-house banter always a highlight. With the "no sledging" rule to be enforced this season many of the opposition were unable to find anything other than nonsense jibber to say whereas the Macquarie boys were able to maintain their cricketing commentary humour towards the opposition.

With over 60% of the state classed as a drought area, one would certainly not anticipate the rain being a major contributor in the season's outcome. We just seemed to always be on the front foot when the rain intervened - yet couldn't dance a drop from the skies when needed. With the rain around for half the games it produced some interesting under-prepared pitches, which we found difficult to adjust to with both bat and ball. We certainly can't blame the conditions for our finish as there was always an opposition playing at the same time – funny that. There were definite turning points that shaped our season:

- Unavailability during the first two rounds and pre-season certainly put us on the back foot. The positive spin on this was that many of the younger players were given opportunities to perform at the highest level in Shires. They should now have the confidence to achieve when their next chance arises.
- A good team effort against Southern Districts on a diabolical pitch the one game where we adjusted to the conditions better than our opposition.
- A super team batting performance against Lindfield for a whole day's batting.
- A win on day 1 in the last over of the day against Holroyd-Hills before rain washed out day two.
- A solid team performance for a win against Warringah. Our only game where we played at the top of our game in all three disciplines.
- The one wicket loss to Pennant Hills. A win in this game would have placed us in the top 6 and given us momentum.
- The heroics of a last over win against Lane Cove certainly the highlight of the season, but left us with a big "What if" if we won the previous game against Pennant Hills.
- The last round debacle, which saw us bowled out for 44, which eclipsed the all-time low of 48 in First Grade.

All of the younger players coming into First Grade showed that they are capable of playing this level of cricket for many years to come. Special mention should be given to Clifty and Mark 'FB' Fairlie who took the rise to First Grade in round 1 from last year's performances in 3rd Grade with both hands. v Lindfield drew with Lindfield 8 for 325

A stinking hot day at the Roger Sheeran and unfortunately when the captain gave us the signal we were having a bowl, he wasn't kidding. Mac lacked penetration through their toporder. Giss picked up the first wicket at 67. Hale picked up two wickets in an over and Marty grabbed one to get us to 4 for 137 (after 39 overs). Marty bowled extremely well to take a bag-full, (5 for 49). Marty and Toy bowled 24 straight overs in tandem to finish HH's innings. We restricted HH to all out 178 from 44 overs, which may have been generous because we dropped a few catches. Scotty bagged 5 chances behind the stumps. Marty (20) and Toy (35) then continued their partnership and put on a solid start of 39 runs. We strolled to the end of the day and had the game in our hands. Rain on week two punished our slow chase. Our fourth draw in 6 games.

v Strathfield 9 for 210 drew with Strathfield 8 for 253

Alex Gibson (aka "Gibbo" or "MJ") made his debut for Second Grade. At Airey, Strathfield won the toss and batted. On a slow scoring day we managed the first break-through in the 13th over. The bowlers racked up over 20 maidens and made scoring difficult on the dusty Airey pitch. We had Strathfield at 6-97... and let them get away. Poor fielding and catching saw them limp to 8-215 at the end of the day. The seventh wicket yielded 102 runs and many chances. Chili (1-30), MJ (2-62), Payne a miserly (2-17), and Tunza (2-29). First change bowler MJ picked up our first wicket. Second change Muhli got the second and bowled very well - bowling his ten straight. Then the master stroke-the arrival of Marty. He bowled extremely well picking up (4 for 39 from 9 overs). Budge picked up the last wicket. Warringah restricted to 53 runs in the last 10 overs with 5 wickets in hand. CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 3RD GRADE SHIRES

Before getting to the many positives to come out of my first season as a captain at Macquarie, I want to express the frustration of my teammates at the appalling way our season came to an end. The decision by the Shires Sub-Committee to award the result of our semi-final protest to the team who was solely responsible for the condition of the pitch, and who was the only one to benefit from it being sabotaged still leaves me shaking my head and looking for something to kick. Only one team was disadvantaged by the mysterious happenings at St Luke's Oval, and for our protest to be dismissed was an extremely poor way for such a great season to end.

Now to the positives. Captaining this team packed with quality players was always going to be enjoyable, and certainly, we all had a lot of fun during the season. At almost any time, I could have turned the batting order upside down and the boys would have looked just as solid as our regular line-up (except perhaps for Gibbo!). The same applies to the bowling attack and deciding who should get the new ball... Brown (well, I was never going to get the new ball away from Brownie's hand), Gibson, Notaras, Edwards, Smith, Gracie, Gasser...

In terms of on-field results, the wet weather certainly prevented us on numerous occasions from showing our true strength. We had 6 wins, and only two losses for the year in a season where we had 7 frustrating draws (including the semi-final). Six of these draws were as a direct result of weather (or sabotage), where we were definitely the team in the stronger position. But we did get a chance to play some cricket on the odd weekend, with the highlights being the win against defending premiers South Sydney and the qualifying final victory against minor premiers Auburn. We were also undefeated against the premiers, Burwood.

Working through the squad regulars, there is no doubt that having a player of the quality and experience of Paul Notaras was a huge bonus for a first-time captain. His on field performances with bat and ball were terrific as is indicated with his batting average of 392 runs at 56. Nasty also provided me with tremendous on-field guidance over the season, and his worth to this club cannot be easily valued.

The find for the season was undoubtedly Alex Gibson, who had a tremendous first year of serious cricket. Gibbo justly deserved to pick up the inaugural Mahoney-Folkard Rookie of the Year award. Despite a few broken fingers, Gibbo was always a willing bowler, and his line, length and pace consistently worried the best batsmen in this competition. Gibbo will no doubt press for higher honours in the seasons to come.

Greg Brown-dodgy back and all- was consistent all season and never let his skipper down. Brownie's spell of bowling in the hour before stumps on day 1 and at the start of day 2 of the quarter-final all but took the opposition out of the game. Although under utilised with the bat all season, his knock in the same match helped us post what turned out to be a match-winning score.

As was the case with Browny, Clyne Fernades, never got enough opportunities to shine with the bat, but he was justly rewarded as the leading Third Grade keeper for the season. When I first started playing with Clyney, he would always let out a painful groan as he crouched down to take the first ball of the innings. Now many years on, I discovered this season that this groan now extents to about half way through the second over!

Stephen Rose was a welcome addition to this team about a third of the way through the season. After a relatively lean start, he got better and better as the season progressed. With solid defence and the hardest pull shot in the club, Steve's performances in the qualifying and semi-finals were outstanding.

Andrew Slimmon had a strong start to the season, but fell away towards the end of the summer. Slimmo's season highlight was undoubtedly his superb innings in the match against South Sydney. But with a greater focus on his concentration (with bat and in the field), and fitness, he will be able to prove to himself and his teammates that he is capable of playing at the top level. Slimmo is still one of the youngest players at the club, and as his experience grows I have no doubt his on-field results will improve.

Ross McIntyre had a season of two distinct halves-a strong start with the bat, and not a lot of bowling, but in the run up to the finals, his bowling became a huge asset to the team, while his batting fell away. Rosco will be a valuable asset to Macquarie teams in the years to come as a number 5 or 6 who can bowl a lot of overs of quality leg-spin. However, Rosco needs to think a lot harder about how he approaches his batting, so he can find the right mixture of defence and attack against the better quality attacks. It also couldn't hurt to practice nagging his captain as well to ensure he gets to see more of the ball. Rosco's figures with the ball would have been a lot better had even 50% of the chances he created been taken.

Warrick Folkard always did the job with the ball when asked. Wick picked up the vital wicket in the qualifying final when it seemed Auburn might hang in for the draw, and he bowled the ball of the year against Lane Cove. But certainly, the highlight for me was his spell against South Sydney, where we were getting pummeled until Wick picked up their best batsmen, and then helped to knock over their top-order. His spell in this match helped propel us to a victory which definitely kick-started our season.

David Gracie had a stop-start kind of a season, with unavailability and a knee injury preventing him from seeing more action. In hindsight, Gracie was under-utilised with the bat, as was evident with his quality knocks in both the qualifying and semi finals. His hitting against Burwood in the semi was certainly one of the highlights of the season, while his innings against Auburn in the qualifying final enabled us to post a match winning score. I like the way David plays his cricket, and I can see him scoring a lot of runs in the seasons to come, while still picking up valuable wickets, knee willing.

Our most valuable and consistent performer all season was Craig Edwards. With both bat and ball, Edo would regularly put in a performance of quality when it was needed most. From his terrific innings of 96 at Lane Cove, which included the shot of the season (a cover drive for 6 over cover to the longest boundary), his invaluable 71 in the semi-final, along with his happy knack of making the breakthrough with the ball, Edo had a great season. Up against some high quality competition, Edo was the deserving winner of the Third Grade Most Valuable Player for the season.

And for David Smith-well, let's just say it was great having a captain who finally recognised his ability with the bat!!

There were a number of other players who also made valuable contributions to the Third Grade team throughout the season. Warren Montford was the bowler next in line, and always did the job asked of him without a whole lot of luck. Both Muhli and Mashood put in excellent individual performances, with Muhli's 6 to win the game against South Sydney, and Mashood's power-laden 71 not out to help us hold on for a draw against Burwood early in the season being particularly memorable. The club's youngest member, 16 year-old Jason Tabrett, made an impressive Third Grade debut with both the ball and attitude. With some hard work on his bowling, and some more experience, I have no doubt Jason will make strong contributions to Macquarie teams in the seasons to come.

Steve 'Castro' Gasser came back to Third Grade towards the end of the season, and due to a miscalculation, missed out on playing in the finals. But Castro's contribution in the lead-up matches played a large part in ensuring we made the top 6. Castro's enthusiasm in the field, along with his ability with both bat and ball were of the highest standard.

Finally, I would like to thank the skippers above and below me- the quadruplet who led Second Grade at various times during the season (Toy, Sav, Budgie and Tunza); and the always enthusiastic Mark Hughes who did such a sterling job with his Fourth Grade team.

MATCH REPORTS

v Georges River 1 for 53 drew with Georges River 187

Day 2 was always going to be a tough one, with only 8 fit players ready to play - Bradley had injured his back during the week and wouldn't be able to play at all: Gibson had a nasty virus. and only managed to crawl from his deathbed to join us just before tea; while Hook was only able to leave a suddenly scheduled compulsory University commitment after tea. Slimmon and Smith got things off to a solid start, before Slimmon (8) nailed a cut shot straight to point in the 14th over. Brown then joined Smith, and for the next 29 overs the pair blunted the Burwood attack. At tea, we were 1/69 (36 overs) - victory out of range, but with a good chance of picking up a draw. Once Brown (10) went a string of wickets followed to put the game in the balance at 5/134 with 25 overs remaining. Smith (72) was one of the wickets to fall, in an impressive innings that included 12 boundaries. With the game evenly poised, Mashood Bajwa and Wick almost took it completely out of Burwood's reach, batting for 13 overs, before Wick (10) lost his wicket. 12 overs to go, 3 wickets in hand (with Bradley absent injured). 4 more overs went by before another wicket fell- things were tight - 8 overs to go and 2 wickets in hand. However, Gus and Mashood saw us home - Gus (13) unfortunately out off the last ball of the day, after a gritty knock, to leave us at 8 (effectively 9) for 232, and the match drawn. The highlight of the day was undoubtedly the innings of Mashood. Not impeded by the tenseness of the situation, Mashood (71 not out) picked the right ball and hit hard in a terrific knock which included 11 fours and 2 sixes. Mashood produced a terrific innings under great pressure, and one that saw us save the game.

v Southern Districts 58 and 0 for 45 lost to Southern Districts 146 and 120

A poor performance against a pretty average outfit, and a result which constantly came back to haunt us during the season as we chased a finals' spot. With Smith away again, along with 5 other regulars, Fernandes took on the job of skippering this inexperienced team. Things went according to plan initially, dismissing Southern Districts for 146. Gibson (3 for 43) bowled well, but the pick was certainly Folkard, who bowled a terrific spell (3 for 17 off 11 overs). Day 2 saw us quietly confident with a good-looking batting deck. However, things fell apart pretty quickly and after 28 overs, we were back in the field after being dismissed for 58 - top score being sundries with 20. Eager to put in a stronger performance second time round, we showed some of our true potential and dismissed the opposition for 120. There was some great bowling by both Gibson (6 for 63 off 15.1 overs) and Montford (4 for 42 off 12). Now, let us never speak of this match again.

v South Sydney 2 for 181 defeated South Sydney 179

It was now time for this 3rd Grade team to stand up and get its first win for the season. Playing a one-day match against the reigning premiers and a team that hadn't lost for some 23 games, we won the toss and sent the opposition in - a decision vindicated as South Sydney raced to be 1/100 after only 13 overs! I was beginning to wonder how I was going to explain a score of 400+!! The South's opening batsmen swung hard at anything loose, or anything straight - in fact, they pretty much swung at everything, and got off to an absolute flier. It was time to turn to experience- Folkard and Gracie. Having his first game for the season, Gracie (3 for 55 off 10 overs) bowled a terrific spell to dismiss 3 of their top 4 batsmen. But the turning point definitely came when Folkard (1 for 25 off 10 overs) lured the South's top-scorer into smashing him behind square for a brutal boundary- so brutal in fact, he over-balanced and fell back onto his stumps - out hit wicket! A late arriving Brown (2/16 off 6) and Smith (2/22 off 9.1) then proceeded to wrap up the lower order. All out for 179 - a tremendous fightback, with South's losing their last 9 wickets for 78 runs. The run-chase was never going to be easy, but Slimmon and Smith got things off to a solid start, putting on 81 runs from 22 overs before Smith (48) lost concentration. Kent (14) then played some nice shots before hitting a catch to cover. At this stage, we were 2/121 after 34 overs - 59 runs still to get off 16 overs. South Sydney had tightened things up in the field considerably, and all of a sudden the runs seemed to disappear. There were some anxious faces on the sideline, but Muhli (31 not out), supported by Slimmo, had things under control. Muhli played some outstanding shots, as he went to work to put the game away - and finished it in style with a great flick off his pads for 6 in the 47th over. However, special mention must go to Slimmon (64 not out), who played a terrific knock to carry his bat. After a steady start, he accelerated nicely through his innings,

and played a wide variety of shots, with his sparkling on and straight drives being highlights. In the end, a great, confidence-building win for a team which was now just starting to hit its straps.

v Lindfield 346 drew with Lindfield

Another match where MUCC were in the box seat, only to have rain on week 2 take away another great opportunity of picking up 6 points. With Edwards standing in for an absent Smith, we won the toss and had first use of a rock hard pitch. And cash in we did. After a solid start, the middle-order went to work on a scorching hot November. At tea, the score was 3/84 off 34 overs, but off the remaining 46 overs, we blasted the Lindfield attack all over the park at almost 6 an over. Notaras (58) was his usual brutal self, while Edwards (82) showed the touch that was to stay with him for most of the season. McIntyre (73) played his best innings for the club, and demonstrated the potential he has with the bat. At the end, Brown (40) and Robinson (24) hit the ball hard. Unfortunately, rain on day 2 of this match meant we were again frustrated with having to walk away with another draw.

v Holroyd-Hills 278 drew with Holroyd-Hills

The rain on week 2 was now beyond annoying. The pattern continued - a great week 1 performance by the Macquarie boys, only for the phone call on the Saturday of week 2 saying that rain had washed out play. On a lively looking pitch, we lost the toss and were sent in to bat. Both openers did a great job of weathering the early storm. With the pitch just starting to flatten out, Slimmon (24) was the first to go after a 66 run opening stand. Smith (45) went not long after as he was just starting to dominate. Useful contributions from Rose (38) and McIntyre (25) helped push the score along, but with 30 overs to go we were precariously placed at 6 for 151. And then the big guns came in. Notaras (64) and Edwards (49) were brutal as they pummeled the hapless Holroyd-Hills to all parts of the ground in a great late-innings revival. Notaras smashed 7 fours and 3 sixes, while Edwards hit 6 fours and 2 sixes to take away any initiative Holroyd-Hills may have held .The pair put on 118 valuable runs in 20 overs to put us back in control of the match. A flurry of late wickets saw us end the day at 278. As usual, rain on week 2 prevented any chance of picking up a much needed win. We were now sitting on only 6 points after one win, one loss and 4 draws from 6 rounds of cricket, and with a lot of work to do if we were to be any chance come finals' time.

v Strathfield 9 for 199 defeated Strathfield 123 and 8 for 95

Finally 2 consecutive weeks of cricket! With a month of cricket gone past without a bowl, we entered unfamiliar terrain when Strathfield elected to bat on another belter of a Northern Oval pitch. This was the match where crucial mistakes in the field were the only thing that prevented us launching a real attack on outright points- a problem that was to come back time and time again as the season went on. All of the bowlers stuck well to their task, with Notaras (3 for 16). Brown (3 for 56 off 21 overs) and Folkard (2 for 7) being the standouts. A couple of critical dropped catches meant Strathfield scrambled to 123 all out - probably around 50 runs more than we should have been chasing. With 31 overs to bat, we were half a chance of picking up first innings points week 1, but after an early collapse saw us falter at 4 for 57, and then the loss of Notaras (40) just before stumps saw us end the day at 5 for 83 with still plenty of work to do to grab the 6 points. Day 2 saw McIntyre (40) and Smith (18) take only 9 overs to overhaul the Strathfield total. McIntyre in particular was impressive with the bat, hitting the ball hard and straight to take away any glimmer Strathfield may have had. Once past the Strathfield total, we went in search of quick runs, with Edwards (14), Fernandes (28) returning to form, along with Brown (16 not out) demonstrating the depth of the batting line up. We were then able to declare with a lead of 76 runs and 51 overs left in the day. With Notaras (1 for 35) generating great pace, and Brown moving the ball both ways (1 for 21), we picked up a couple of early wickets. However, the introduction of Muhli (2 for 5), and Folkard (2 for 8) definitely brought us back into the match, and we had Strathfield struggling at 6/65 with some 20 overs remaining. However, a gritty 7th wicket partnership, and a couple of dropped catches held up our charge - and despite 2 late wickets to Smith (2 for 10), we ran out of time with Strathfield finishing 8 wickets down. A special mention to Edo who took 2 absolute classic catches - one at 1st slip where he fought off the keeper and another brilliant one-handed diving effort at point. Despite missing out on 10 points, it was nevertheless a solid victory for the 3rd grade boys.

v Epping 6 for 301 drew with Epping

There was now serious talk of a 3rd grade jinx - whenever we scored 300 or more on the first day of the match, we were invariably washed out week 2. Such was the case in the local derby against Epping. Looking at the pitch, with plenty of cracks but a good even grass cover, I was able to absorb the comments and opinions from the 6 former Macquarie University captains in the team (Nasty, Edo, Browny, Wick, Clyney, Schaafs). I now know what it would be like to captain a Pakistani team! Winning the toss, I elected to bat, and the decision was vindicated with a terrific opening partnership between Smith and Rose of 132 (38 overs). Rose (39) played some typical hard-hitting shots before being the first to go, just before tea. Smith (81) then went after the break after his best innings for the club which included 8 fours and 2 sixes. Notaras (69) then came to the crease, and he and Schaafsma consolidated well, putting on another 50 run partnership before Schaafsma (8) went to one that kept low. Edwards (51) and Notaras then kept the ball rolling, both playing some terrific shots-the highlight being a flick off the pads by Nasty over square leg for 6. Notaras, seemingly not able to get a score above 70 this year, lost his wicket after a solid 61 partnership, and Edo then went not long after for his usual half-century. Mashood (24) bashed a few around at the end, including a great straight 6 into the wind, and when stumps were called, we were in the very strong position of 6/301. An unprepared pitch following a few days of rain late in the week meant day 2 was washed out - again!

v Warringah 5 for 183 defeated Warringah 181

A solid win despite chasing probably 50 more than we would have liked. To be fair to the guys, we were now well into late January, and due to weather, had only spent minimal time in the field, so we were all pretty rusty. Winning the toss in humid conditions and with a softish pitch that would undoubtedly get better as the day went on, I had no hesitation in sending them in. With Brown (3 for 26) moving the ball both wavs from one end, and Nasty (3 for 31) bowling at terrific pace from the other, Warringah were never allowed to settle, and after 19 overs they were on the ropes at 5 for 58. Gracie (1/24) then chipped in with the 6th wicket, and it was looking like Warringah might struggle to make 100 with the score 6 for 62. But, just when a lift in intensity was required, we drifted a bit, and allowed the opposition to put together a couple of good partnerships. However, thanks to Edwards' best spell of bowling this year (2/34) we finally put Warringah away-all out 181. The catching was of a marked improvement over recent weeks, with Edwards snaring 2 good ones at slip, and Fernandes working hard behind the stumps to take 3. But 23 wides, some patchy fielding and periods where we were content to let things just drift along were disappointing for a team which set itself high standards. With storm clouds brewing, and a sky show to match any new years fireworks display, it was important we got off to a strong start and kept up with the required run-rate. After losing an early wicket, Smith (33) and Rose (15) consolidated well, taking the score to 52 off 10 overs before Rose was unluckily caught at gully - the fieldsman not seeing the ball until it hit him in the chest. With Smith going shortly after, and then McIntyre (13), who looked good before falling, we were in a precarious position of 4/84 off 20 overs. But as they did a number of times this season, Notaras and Edwards (19) then consolidated well, keeping the scoreboard ticking over with well-run 1s and 2s, and the odd boundary to keep us ahead of the run-rate in stormy and dark conditions. The pair put on 56 valuable runs before Edo lost his wicket, leaving us at 5/140 off 35 overs. 42 runs to get off 15 overs with 5 wickets in handan awkward little total with Warringah lifting in the field. However, the new man in, Fernandes (26 not out), had other ideas, and proceeded to hit the ball well in an innings which included 5 boundaries, to help get us home for our 3rd win of the season. Notaras (51not out) once again was the star with the bat, finishing the run chase with a boundary, which also saw him bring up his 4th half-century for the season.

v Pennant Hills 6 for 302 defeated Pennant Hills 205

Another impressive performance with the bat by the 3rd Grade. Winning the toss, we elected to bat on a pretty hard but well grassed wicket. Slimmon (17) and Smith (24) again got things off to a solid start, seeing off the new ball before Slimmo played at one he should have left. Smith went not long after, and at 2/68, we were looking for a solid partnership, which Rose and Notaras (33) delivered. Hitting the ball hard through-and over-the field, they took the total to 151 when Nasty edged one behind. Rose and McIntyre continued to build the score, until Rose (73) got a good one and went for his best innings of the season. Rose had been unlucky in recent weeks, but certainly delivered with a most impressive innings. With the message going out to the batsmen to 'put the foot down', the final 10 overs saw us add 76 valuable runs. McIntyre (33) built his innings nicely before being run-out. Edwards (41) also lost his wicket in the chase for quick runs, but not before he played another beautiful innings, which included a sweetly timed 6 into the crowd at mid-wicket. Gasser (20 not out) and Fernandes (24 not out) finished things off nicely with some big hitting and well-run singles, to allow us to declare and have 7 overs at the tiring Pennant Hills line-up. Although we didn't make the opposition play enough during our brief spell, we did pick up an early wicket when Brown (1 for 34) found the edge and Smith took a good, low down catch at 3rd slip. Pennant Hills 1-13 at stumps. For once, we were able to avoid any day 2 rain when a hot day and a very flat pitch greeted us. In a poor 90 minutes of cricket, when some early wickets could have really put some pressure on the Pennant Hills middle-order, some poor bowling and even poorer fielding allowed Pennant Hills to make a solid start, taking the score to 74 before the introduction of Edwards (2 for 28) started to turn things around for us. He quickly picked up 2 wickets and all of a sudden it was 3/84 and things were slowly getting back on track. However, some aggressive batting from Pennant Hills again tilted the game in their favour until Folkard (3 for 24) got rid of their top-scorer just before the break. At tea the score was 4/150-154 required off 45 overs-honours about even. McIntyre (2 for 50), who went for a few just before tea, continued after the break, quickly snaring 2 valuable wickets to put us on top. Folkard continued a fine spell of off-spin, and was well supported by Gasser (2 for 8) as they mopped up the tail nicely. Pennant Hills all out for 205, losing 5 for 55 after tea. While still below our best, it was a pretty convincing 102 run win.

v Lane Cove 282 defeated Lane Cove 189

With each game now virtually a must-win to ensure a finals' spot, we faced the wellcredentialed Lane Cove team and welcomed 16-year-old debutant Jason Tabrett to the team. On the small Longueville Oval, we were surprised to be invited to bat when Lane Cove won the toss on a slow-looking but reasonably hard pitch. The Lane Cove decision seemed to have been vindicated when the Mac Uni top order failed-we were in big trouble at 3-33 after 16 overs with Smith, Rose and McIntyre all back in the pavilion. David Gracie, promoted to opener, and Edwards, then began to right the ship, putting on 43 before Gracie fell for a well compiled (33). This saw Gasser join Edo at the crease, with a strong partnership required to get Macquarie back into the game. With a combination of hitting the ball hard over the top, and taking the quick singles, the pair added 110 in 22 overs, before Edo (96), in sight of his century, mis-hit a full toss to be caught in front of the mid-wicket boundary for (96). From the committee's point of view, a good result (one less pewter to buy), but if ever a man deserved a 100, it was Edo. Earlier in the week, Edo had confided in me that with a number of key players out, he was primed to make a big score. With 8 fours and 6 sixes - including one massive cover drive for 6 to the longest boundary on the ground, Edo hit the ball with great power, waiting until the ball was in his zone (or maybe just fairly close to his zone....) before launching his bat at it. With the fall of Edo, Gasser (69) took up the challenge, and played his best innings for the year, before being dismissed. The loss of another quick wicket (8/233) saw the two veterans-Folkard and Brown-together at the crease with a big job to do. With over 550 games for the club between them, the pair started steadily enough, and then accelerated nicely through their innings. The pair added a valuable 46 runs for the ninth wicket, with Brown (19) and Folkard, (28) last man out. Day 2 saw us walk away with a win in what must rate as our worst fielding performance for some time. Usually, creating 20+ chances in a day of cricket means that an outright win is on the cards. Unfortunately for us, creating so many chances was necessary to take 10 wickets and walk away with a hard fought victory. Without exception, all of the bowlers bowled an outstanding line and length all day. Rarely was a loose ball bowled, and the Lane Cove batsmen could only look to accelerate their scoring rate by taking risks. Gasser (1 for 17) started things nicely with the ball, picking up an early wicket. Lane Cove, then dug in and we picked up a few wickets before the introduction of leg-spin swung the game around. McIntyre (4 for 54 off 17) bowled his best spell of the season, hitting a very consistent line and length, and getting a good amount of turn. If our fielding had been better, I have no doubt he would have picked up 6 or 7 wickets. With off-spin introduced at the other end, Folkard (3 for 13 off 7), who hit the spot straight away, and without doubt bowled the ball of the season-an off-spinner that drifted nicely towards slip, before hitting the pitch and fizzing back between bat and pad to hit the top of middle stump. We were able to dismiss the Lane for 187 - a good performance let down by a substandard fielding effort.

v Roseville drew with Roseville 7 for 260

Another rain marred game with week 2 washed out after only a handful of overs. However, if the catching effort the previous week was poor, then this one was diabolical. I don't think any of us have ever experienced a day quite like this one. Electing to bowl after winning the toss with a bit of juice in the pitch, the bowlers worked hard to create chances, but like something from the Keystone Cops, we kept on dropping them and dropping them, over after over. When you hear someone say, 'we dropped 15 chances' you think they were exaggerating, but 15 distinct chances were put down during an afternoon of cricket that seemed a lot, lot, longer than 5 hours. For the most part, Roseville found scoring very hard all day-except for one batsman who pulverized our bowling for a hard-hitting century that felt like it come up in about 60 or 70 balls. Of the bowlers, Gibson (2 for 18 off 14 overs) bowled tight all day. One of the few highlights of the day was the bowling of Ross McIntyre. McIntyre (3 for 64 off 16 consecutive overs) continued his recent good form, bowling a terrific long spell, which included the vital wicket of the Roseville century-maker. Again, Rosco could easily have finished with 5 or 6 wickets for the day if we'd held our chances. Day 2 started with Roseville batting on with rain falling, and although Gibson picked up an early wicket, the rain got heavier and heavier and with only 5 overs bowled, play was called off. Yet another frustrating draw!

v Auburn 144 lost to Auburn 201

For the first time since round 3, the 3rd Grade team lost a cricket match. Competition leaders Auburn won the toss and elected to bat on a pitch with a fair bit of life. Some early solid bowling by Gibson (2 for 23 off 10) and Brown (1 for 31 off 10) had Auburn in trouble at 2/14 off 10 overs. However, as we did a couple of times during the Auburn innings, we dropped our intensity for key periods of play and we put down some chances which were to prove costly. Auburn began a mini-recovery, but some good bowling by Smith (2 for 19 off 6) and an unlucky Gracie (1 for 39 off 10) saw Macquarie get back on top with Auburn 5/72 after 26 overs. But once again, we went to sleep for what proved to be a critical period of the game, and let the Auburn batsmen off the hook with some more lapses in the field- an all too familiar pattern for this Macquarie team. Some big hitting and an extremely poor run-out decision saw Auburn reach 5/137 after 37 overs. However, after the next drinks break, Edwards (3 for 35) bought us right back into contention with Auburn 8/140 and a real chance of being dismissed for 150. But some aggression and determination by the Auburn lower-order put us on the back foot. Auburn were eventually bowled out for 201 in the 49th over, about 60 runs more than they should have got had we been on top of our game. Rose was the standout in the field taking 3 good catches and a direct hit for a run-out, a great example for the rest of us to follow. For the first time this year, our batting crumbled against some real aggression from Auburn. With only one quality fast bowler in the Auburn line-up, our top-order fell apart pretty meekly to leave us 3/9 after 9 overs. Edwards (26) and Rose (27) both got solid starts, as did Gasser (37), to give us a glimmer at various stages during the run-chase, but our poor start was too much to overcome, and we were dismissed for 144, to go down by 57 runs. A disappointing effort, but one we knew we could improve on with Auburn again our opposition the following week for the qualifying final.

Qualifying Final

v Auburn 194 defeated Auburn 97

A fantastic result from a team who seem to have put aside some recent disappointing performances to lift when it really counted. As we had finished 6th, we were up against the Minor Premiers and the team which had beaten us 7 days before- Auburn. Playing at their home ground, and only needing a draw to go through to the semi-final, I lost the toss and was a little surprised to be sent in on a hard, grassless wicket. However, the decision was vindicated when Auburn claimed 2 early wickets to have us in trouble at 2/15. Then the first of our recoveries started, with Rose and Notaras picking up the pace of the pitch well and putting together a great little partnership. At lunch, honours were probably slightly in our favour, with the score at 2/92 off 32 overs. However, after the break, we were quickly put on the back foot by some solid Auburn bowling and some disappointing batting. From 2/92, Auburn had us reeling at 7/129. Rose went not long after lunch for a determined (30). Then a steady procession started, which included Notaras (63)- another quality knock from this batsmen who seems to have some phobia about scoring above 70....5 fifties, but no score above 69 this season. With the team in trouble, we were looking for our lower order to put a bit of respectability into our score- and that's exactly what Gracie and Brown did. Both displaying a great deal of patience, and with a little luck, they were able to defend well and wait for the loose ball to come along before dispatching it. The pair took our score to 192 before Gracie (49) fell after a terrific innings- an intelligent knock just when it was really needed. Not long after, Brown (21) lost his wicket after making an invaluable contribution. We were soon all out for 194- not a bad recovery from 7/129, but still a long way short of what we thought would be a solid target for Auburn. But we now at least had a reasonable total to bowl to. We now had a nasty 40 minutes or so to bowl to the confident Auburn top-order. The last 15 overs of day 1 certainly proved to be extremely nasty for Auburn as Gibson and Brown both picked up 2 wickets each to leave Auburn reeling at stumps to be 4 for 24. Our aggressive attitude on the field definitely put Auburn off their game and demonstrated our determination to win this game. Gibbo and Browny both bowled wonderful opening spells- while Browny also grabbed a great catch at slip. After an altercation on the field following the fall of Auburn's 4th wicket, we left the ground a little apprehensively, looking at the entire Auburn team who had gathered close to the gate. Then Clyney said 'let's go off through the gate' and with heads held highand probably a little concerned for our safety-we pushed through the gate, passed the opposition and into the sheds. Certainly, one of the moments of the season! We left the wilds of Auburn on Saturday evening with the game very much in our control. Under overcast skies, day 2 started as day 1 finished. Gibson and Brown continued with the ball, with Brownie picking up an early wicket thanks to a good catch by Notaras at short-cover- Auburn were in all sorts of trouble at 5 for 24. From this position, Auburn apparently decided 194 was too far away for them to chase, and so dug in for grim life, hoping to hold on for a draw- with 92 overs left to bat in the day. For the next few hours, Auburn were content to dead bat everything we threw at them. The bowling was of a high quality, as was the fielding, but we were unable to grab another wicket before lunch. At the break, Auburn were 5 for 64 (48 overs).... with rain not too far off. After lunch, Folkard was bought into the attack and soon got one to kick, find the edge, and Brown held another catch at slip. We were back on track with Auburn 6 for 76 and still 58 overs left in the day. And then the heavens opened up. We continued bowling through it for a few overs, but with it getting heavier and heavier- and the ball now resembling a piece of soap- we made our way to the dressing sheds thinking perhaps our day (and season) was over and we wouldn't have another crack at the Auburn lower order. But after an hour or so, the rain stopped, the covers (eventually) were pulled off, and thankfully a dry pitch emerged from underneath. An early tea break was then taken, but it was definitely game on. With dark clouds still hanging around, and a water affected ball, we thought our best chances of victory would be to keep things tight until the second new ball came due, and then we'd have about 15 overs to try and blast them out. However, things ended much, much guicker

than that. In the first over after the break, the Auburn no 6 who had been batting since the previous evening nicked one off Smith for Fernandes to take a good catch behind the wicket. 7 for 94. In his next over, Smith then got one to sneak back between bat and pad to send middle stump cartwheeling. 8 for 95. Then, in the following over, Smith found the edge again for Fernandes to take a great one handed diving catch in front of 1st slip (9 for 97). Next ball, he then grabbed a ball driven back above his head for a caught and bowled- Auburn all out for 97, giving us victory by 97 runs. Smith 4 for 0 off 11 balls after the break. All of the bowlers contributed magnificently during the day, and were backed up by a tremendous all-round fielding effort- not one catch dropped! Semi-Final

v Burwood 8 for 269 drew with Burwood 7 for 164

There's not much else to say except that my 10 teammates know we were the best team in 3rd grade this season, without a doubt.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 4TH GRADE SHIRES

Fourth Grade had both an enjoyable and successful season, making the quarter finals for the first time in six seasons. After failing to reach full potential for a number of seasons, our side took advantage of the quality players who played both regularly and occasionally to challenge strongly for the title, only to fall victim to Burwood's inept covers during the finals.

We played with a consistency lacking from seasons past, winning matches against sides we were expected to win against and challenging strongly against the top teams in the competition. Had we finished with one further win, we would have secured a home final. It is worth noting that while the majority of players in our club continue to play 10 games or less in a season this will continue to haunt our lower grades, where unavailability hurts most, and even affected Third Grade with a loss to Southern Districts costing them dearly, and our season may have finished in different circumstances in both third and fourth grade had we all hands on deck more regularly during the year.

We were slow starters with no points after two rounds, with poor availability against Burwood costing us in a narrow loss, however momentum was quickly gathered securing 22 points before Christmas, despite a loss to Strathfield when we had a batting collapse. Fortunately we learned our lesson from that match and powered after Christmas, winning another four matches and suffering only one loss against Warringah, once again on an occasion where the club was under strength.

Our best wins of the season were against top six sides, and we were the only side to defeat premiers South Sydney, showing just how good we could be on our day. We were also well on top in games which finished as wash outs on day two of matches, and with a little more luck with the weather we could easily have finished with a further 22 competition points to add to our 46 secured during the year. Our match against finalists Auburn was also a highlight where we secured our finals' spot and played some of our best cricket all season in putting a finals' side to the sword leading into our appearance in the finals.

Despite the pressure we placed on ourselves to perform and make finals, we also enjoyed our cricket immensely, and the spirit within the side and the way we played the game was amongst the best I have been associated with in my time at the club. Fourth Grade did not sledge the opposition during the course of the season, sending our vocal energies into encouraging our side instead of putting off our opposition. We enjoyed having a bit of fun at our own expense instead, and had a lot of fun during the year.

Our batting showed greater consistency and improvement across the board this year. Paul Chew, Edward Aphaiwongse, who has matured as a cricketer after his stint in grade, Mark Hughes and Graham Lego (when available) gave the side the solid foundations for our strong middle-order to score competitive totals and chase down targets. Ashley Robinson was given free reign amongst our top-order to play his shots and gave us some impetus after some solid foundations.

Our middle-order was amongst the strongest in the competition with Mashood Bajwa, Paul McInnes and Shane O'Connor able to put sides away in the latter overs of matches, often at much quicker than a run-a-ball pace. Paul McInnes had a tremendous season with the bat scoring 332 runs at 36.89 at better than a run-a-ball and has developed into an invaluable all-rounder. Wayne Travers and Adrian Lulka were reliable when called upon to contribute with the bat, which was not as frequent as in seasons past. Our bowling continued to be the area in which we won and set up most of our matches again this season. We had tremendous depth in our bowling all year, and generally had seven players in our side we could call upon. Most players did not get to fulfill their full potential due to the number of options we had to take wickets. Wayne Travers (25 wickets at 14.88) took advantage of a purple patch before Christmas to finish equal leading wicket-taker with Jason Ford (25 at 12.64), who has never bowled better for the club, whilst also being economical, conceding only 2.24 per over, a tremendous effort for a leg-spinner.

Adrian Lulka continued his good form at this level, while Paul McInnes, Warren Montford, Shane O'Connor and Dan Chandler bowled with pace and some unplayable spells to demoralise our opponents and turn a match. Mashood Bajwa, when thrown the ball, often chimed in with a crucial wicket.

Our fielding was top-class and there were no games where poor fielding cost us victory. Ash Robinson set the standard behind the stumps for the rest of our fieldsmen. Paul Chew took some great grabs in the gully, Wayne Travers did well in the slips, while Shane O'Connor, Paul McInnes, Warren Montford and Daniel Chandler took some great grabs in front of the wicket. Faizal Ali showed tremendous enthusiasm in the field and lifted the standard of the team when he played in our grade.

We were also well served by guest appearances from our higher-grade players when they made an appearance in Fourth Grade this season. Brett Kent, David Knock, Mulihan Sriravindrarajah, Brendan Rounds and David Gracie all contributed when given a game in Fourth Grade and their assistance was appreciated.

We were also fortunate to have quality players in the Metro Shield team this season, which will serve the club well for the future. Newcomers Faizal Ali, Jason Tabrett, Chris Anstiss, Michael Cooke, Clay Finnemore looked very promising when they got a game for us and along with a host of others look certain to press for more permanent places in Shires next season, which bodes well for the future of the club. There were many people who made Fourth Grade a pleasure to captain this year. Thanks to Paul Chapman who side suffered when availabilities were poor, and to David Smith in his role of captain in the grade above, for allowing Fourth Grade great continuity with selections when teams were stretched for players.

The committee's support throughout the season goes without saying, and once again made both my job, and our team's, an easier one with their diligence and dedication.

Mashood Bajwa, who made such an impact when he settled into our side in the second half of the season, won the team's MVP. Whilst only playing seven games for us, his 298 runs at 49.67 and 12 wickets at 11.58 along with some excellent fielding saw him edge out Paul McInnes for the award, which was voted by the players over the course of the season. Special mention should also go to Jason Ford and Wayne Travers who were not too far behind, both lacking opportunity at times to impress their peers, such was our season.

Mark Hughes (28) and Paul Chew (16) recovered the innings after both openers went without scoring, and McInnes (39) once again showed excellent skills with the bat. Unfortunately the rest of the batting line-up failed to weather the onslaught and at 9 for 136 things were grim until an invaluable partnership between former Souths' clubman Clay Finnemore (28 not out) and Ali (23) took us to 189 giving us a total our opposition were not used to chasing. A brilliant run out off the first ball of the innings, and once again impressive bowling and fielding saw us pull off a great win against an excellent side with the standout being Travers (4/37) taking two good caught and bowleds. He was ably supported by Lulka (2/19) who bowled a good line and length, and McInnes (2/28) who bowled his best spell of the season. We were the only side to defeat the eventual premiers, which showed what a good team we had available to us this year.

The second day was not played due to rain, which was disappointing given our commanding position. Lindfield did not win another game during the season; never recovering from the pasting our batsmen gave them on day one.

The Hurricanes won the toss on the northern oval and batted and struggled against another committed performance with the ball. Robinson (25) played some shots, but an unbeaten 103 partnership from Lego (52 not out) and O'Connor (67 not out) guided us with safety to the target in an all-round impressive performance.

Pennant Hills chose to bat and struggled against our ever confident bowling attack to make a sub standard total on a good Gwilliam wicket. McInnes (2/31) and David Gracie (2/31) made the early inroads and Ford (2/13) and Bajwa (4/30) did the latter damage against another side that found our bowling too accurate. The run chase at the end of day one and start of day two saw us pass the total for the loss of two wickets with David Knock (63) the anchor and Bajwa (90) the destroyer. We pushed on for quick runs and declared just on a hundred in front at an early tea but were unable to take the wickets to press for an outright, with Travers (2/27) the pick of the bowlers.

v Lane Cove 5 (dec) for 140 defeated Lane Cove 132 and 5 for 105

In similar circumstances to our previous match, we bowled first on the Gwilliam and our opposition were not up to task against our excellent bowling. Lulka (2/31) relished the opportunity with the new ball, while Ford continued on in his excellent form with (4 for 14 off 16 overs). Travers (3/48) took the opportunity, with Ford's tight bowling at the other end, to continue his improved bowling this season. We aborted an attempt to get the runs on day one early despite McInnes' (35) run a ball innings as opener after being bowled off a no-ball without scoring. Chew (30) and Bajwa (39) saw us safely to the target against good bowling. We played what would be our finals' side for this match and the rest of the season. Their batting got off to a flying start and we were under the hammer with Roseville at 3 for 200 before we bowled with more defensive fields and reigned them in, once again through Ford's (5/59) tight bowling and a brilliant catch off his own bowling. Bajwa (2/24) also turned the game with the ball and in the field with a good catch at mid on, while McInnes (2/46) also chipped in. The run chase never got a chance to happen with rain preventing a result on the second day, although Robinson (25) played some shots in an impressive short innings while Hughes (10 not out) brought up 3000 runs for the club, much to the disappointment of Chew who was chasing the milestone in a head to head battle after Christmas.

v Auburn 5 for 267 defeated Auburn 151

Our final regular season match was a one-day fixture at Mona Park against another side in the top six. Batting first we lost early wickets before Hughes (35) joined Chew (69) in steadying the ship before a record partnership between Chew and Bajwa (90) put Auburn out of the game. Chew anchored the innings perfectly, passing 3000 runs for the club in the process, while Bajwa hammered the bowling around the park, before McInnes (27) put the nail in the Eagles' coffin in the latter overs. Auburn never looked like getting our total with everyone except captain and keeper getting a bowl. McInnes (2/25), Montford (2/31), Lulka (2/32) and Ford (2/15) doing the damage, while Aphaiwongse (1/7) picked up a wicket in a rare bowling opportunity.

Qualifying Final

v Burwood 86 lost to Burwood 206

Our first finals' appearance in Fourth Grade in six seasons saw us return to St.Lukes to take on Burwood, with both sides strengthened from their encounter earlier in the season. Burwood did the expected and chose to bat on a suitably prepared flat and lifeless wicket. What they did not expect was a tremendous first session of tight bowling and exceptional fielding that placed us right in the game, going to lunch at 6/63. Another early wicket after the break had us perilously close to breaking through their innings but steadying partnerships through sensible batting saw Burwood get to a respectable, although unthreatening total due to our good work early on. Montford (2/20) bowled brilliantly before succumbing to an ankle and calf strain that put him out of the bowling attack at 7/73, leaving Ford (2/24 off 23 overs) to carry the attack for the rest of the innings. Had Monty been able to continue with the ball, the result may well have been different. Bajwa (2/22) took wickets in the first session to put us in good position while McInnes (2/42) toiled hard and Lulka (2/15) was ultimately under utilised, getting an early breakthrough and the last wicket. With the wicket having no demons in it, we were well placed to win and advance to the semi finals. Unfortunately, by sheer fate, the Burwood covers were inadequate to prevent overnight rain from completely destroying our chances. It is history that while the square and outside edges of the pitch was bone dry, large quantities of water just happened to find its way onto the majority of the pitch in areas where the bowlers were pitching it all day, creating unplayable and dangerous conditions for the batsmen. We slumped from 0/28 to 3/40, where Hughes (14) and Bajwa (12) toiled for an hour in the hope that the wicket would get better, and from 3/71 we collapsed mainly due to the conditions to be all out for 86, with McInnes (11) putting up the only resistance. Protests and appeals were lodged mid week to no avail, with the Shires Sub Committee and NSW Cricket Board unwilling to change a decision despite Burwood being found in breach of competition rules regarding inadequate pitch coverings in a sad finish to season 2003-04. I have no doubt that foul play occurred in what happened to the wicket, such was the incredible nature of the water on the wicket. It was not leakage but more like water dumped off the covers. We were unable use this as a reason for protest and our season was cut short of a satisfactory conclusion. We had our chances during the match to put Burwood to the sword, and hopefully the lessons learned from this season will stand us in good stead for an assault on the title next season.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – METROPOLITAN SHIELD

MUCC fielded a highly competitive team in the Metropolitan Shield Competition in 2003/04. Our record was 3 wins, 3 losses and 6 draws (all rain affected). Given fine weather I have no doubt that we would have played finals. We comprehensively defeated premiers South Sydney and semi finalist UTS Balmain, and of the six draws we were in winning position in at least three of those.

There were a lot of new faces with Chris Anstiss, Ryan and Michael Cooke, Clay Finnemore, Faizal Ali and Jason Tabrett playing their first season for the club. All made impressive contributions and showed plenty of promise for future seasons. Ralph Amerasinghe and Ash Singh were big improvers, while Phil Erskine batted consistently well in the second half of the season.

Our season never really got off the ground due to regular washouts in the first half of the season. The three matches prior to Christmas (2 draws, 1 loss) were particularly telling. Coming off a strong win against UTS Balmain we expected to gain at least 12 points against the two bottom ranked teams. Instead we came away empty handed with two second day washouts. In the final round before Christmas we lost the first day to rain and the match became a one-dayer against Burwood. Two players didn't show up for the game. In spite of this we bowled Burwood out for 139. In reply we could only manage 81 although it has to be said that the pitch was in very poor condition and probably not fit for play. Burwood finished the season in sixth place with 36 points and we finished in eighth with 28 points. So we can't really blame the weather for missing the finals – we had our chance against Burwood but didn't take it.

We showed throughout the season that we would not have been out of place in the semi-finals. We only lost three matches, a huge improvement on the previous season, and recorded comprehensive victories over competition front-runners. With the talent base that presently exists in Fifth Grade we should definitely be looking at semi-finals next season. Of course, a number of players should be looking at Fourth Grade or higher over the next few seasons so the future looks bright for the club's lower grades.

Player unavailability in all grades again plagued Fifth Grade this year. This year the problem seemed to be particularly severe in the early part of the season. Players in the higher grades need to be conscious of the fact that their decision not to play affects the club as a whole and not just their particular grade. The Committee should look at re-introducing a formal selection policy, which penalises players who pull out on short notice without proper justification or who are repeatedly unavailable.

Cricket is a team sport and there was certainly an excellent team spirit in Fifth Grade. However, there were also many remarkable individual performances. Ryan Cooke's century, 110 not out, against UTS Balmain was undoubtedly the highlight of the season. Ryan's innings lasted 16 overs and included 7 sixes and 11 fours. Other notable individual performances include Chris Anstiss' five dismissals in an innings against his old club Blacktown, Michael Cooke's 68 against Southern Districts, Warren Montford's 6/29 against Georges River Navy and Al Mahoney's 6 dismissals in the same match.

Chris Anstiss had an outstanding season with the gloves, capturing 19 dismissals (13 catches and 6 stumpings). This is a record for most dismissals in a season for MUCC in Metropolitan Cup/Shield. Ash Singh was our most consistent bowler, relishing the opportunity to spearhead the attack, taking 18 wickets at 18.67 with a best of 5/39. Both deserved the MVP award based on performances on the field however it was Chris' off-field involvement, including attendance at training, helping with covers and getting to the game on time, which tipped the balance in his favour.

Thanks to those who were willing to help out when we were short, particularly Eric "super-sub" Anstiss, Al Mahoney, Paul Batten and Gus Hook, who captained the side in difficult circumstances in my absence.

MATCH REPORTS

v Lindfield 188 drew with Lindfield 3/107

On a flat looking Northern Oval pitch, our total of 188 against an understrength Lindfield bowling attack was about 60 runs under par. Huang (15) and Chapman (28) put on 42 for the first wicket before we slumped to 5/80. Anstiss (12) and Amerasinghe (24) made useful contributions in the middle order before Latto (42 not out) lifted us to a semi-respectable total. Due to Lindfield's slow over rate, we were forced to bowl the remaining 20 overs in rapidly dissipating light. Nelson (2/37) snared two early wickets before giving up easy runs in his latter overs. Tabrett (0/17) bowled well with the new ball and was unlucky not to have a wicket with his first ball for the club. Whilst Chapman (1/13) kept it tight at one end we bled runs at the other. In no time Lindfield racked up 3/107. The wash out on day two saved us from a probable first innings loss.

v Blacktown 9 for 179 drew with Blacktown 266

In typically hot, dry conditions Blacktown had first use of the flat, slow Whalan pitch. Ash Singh toiled hard (2/74 from 23 overs) including 6 maidens and Adam Rush produced the best figures (3/59 from 18). Chapman also collected three wickets (3/62) but the highlight was Chris Anstiss' five dismissals (3 catches, 2 stumpings) in his first match against his former club. Blacktown eventually reached 266 after a last wicket partnership of 46. The openers successfully negotiated the close of play on day one. MUCC lower grade sides have traditionally found batting difficult on the slow and dusty Whalan pitches. This was no exception and we soon found ourselves in trouble at 5/70 shortly before tea. Then Anstiss (33) and Dunkerley (33) combined for a 48 run sixth wicket partnership. From 8/124, Anstiss and Rush (20 not out) continued to frustrate the bowlers. The pair added 48 for the ninth wicket as a storm swept over the ground. The Blacktown skipper refused to accept that conditions were too dangerous to continue. The match was ultimately abandoned due to nearby lightning strikes ten overs from stumps. Blacktown were the better side, however, this was a courageous effort, particularly from Anstiss, Dunkerley and Rush to keep a quality bowling attack at bay in such difficult conditions.

v Auburn 9 for 117 drew with Auburn 256

This turned into a very ugly game. The first week was called off because of overnight rain affecting the pitch square (but not the pitch itself). Week two and Auburn had first use of a pretty flat track. We took early wickets but soon lost our grip on the match when the eventual top scorer refused to walk after smashing the ball straight into Anstiss' gloves. Thereafter we became frustrated and Auburn got away to post 256 from 57 overs. Ash Singh was again the pick of the bowlers with (3/54). Three overs into our innings the rain came and we lost about an hour's play. Unfortunately water got onto the pitch. In difficult conditions, Amerasinghe (35) and Travers (18) provided the chief resistance, but ultimately we hung on in the dark with one wicket to spare to deny Auburn the points. Things became quite heated, as Auburn was desperate for the win. Even after we batted out the required number of overs, play continued beyond 7.30pm, we had the ridiculous situation of the captain accusing us of cheating.

v UTS Balmain 272 defeated UTS Balmain 223

With this one-day match we were a good chance of getting our first result of the season. On picturesque Goddard Park, we won the toss and batted. Chapman (48) and Amerasinghe (38) got off to a brisk start putting on 79 for the first wicket in 17 overs. After consolidating to 1/111 in the 24th over we lost 6 for 36 in the next 10 overs. Anstiss was joined by debutante, Ryan Cooke at 6/147 in the 34th over. Cooke (110 not out) survived a tentative start before smashing an awesome century which included 7 sixes and 11 fours. Anstiss (18 not out) played an excellent supporting role as the pair added a club record, an unbeaten 125 for the eighth wicket. Whilst Balmain started their innings solidly, we were always in control of the game. Nelson (1/33 from 8.2) and Singh (2/36 from 8) bowled tightly and Ford (2/32 from 10) was also difficult to get away. Our fielding was of a high standard, underlined by a magnificent, running outfield catch by Sullivan and a stunning, one-handed reflex catch to Chapman at slip. Balmain kept wickets in hand but fell behind the required run rate. Chapman (4/55) cashed in as the batsmen tried to lift the run rate. Balmain weren't up to the task and we bowled them out in the 47th over. (Balmain's final score of 223 included 5 penalty extras courtesy of a deflection off the helmet placed behind the 'keeper). Apart from the result this was an excellent game of cricket, played in good spirit and in excellent conditions. What a contrast to the previous game!

v Southern Districts 216 drew with Southern Districts 0 for 6

This was the first match in Jock's re-laid Gwilliam Oval square and to be honest the pitch was a bit underdone. The ball carried through very slowly, making stroke play difficult. Southern Districts' bowling attack was very ordinary, with the exception of one opening bowler, but we generally lacked the patience necessary to take full toll. Huang was the exception to the rule, compiling a patient (25) before being run out with the score on 94, after adding 64 for the third wicket with Michael Cooke (68). We were again in trouble at 5/107 before Anstiss (14), Sullivan (14) and Latto (21) combined with Cooke to take the score past 200. The rain came and washed out the remainder of play on day one before we even completed our first over. The scorebook records play as being abandoned at 5.08pm, with a total of 49 overs bowled in the day! Yet another second day washout deprived us of a likely victory.

v Georges River Royal 1 for 51 drew with Georges River Royal 223

With a sudden flood of players available in higher grades, 5th grade fielded its strongest side in several years, including the likes of Mashood, Lloyd and Chew. Unfortunately this batting talent went to waste thanks to yet another second day washout. Georges River won the toss and elected to bat on a Ron Routley pitch which had taken a bit of rain during the week. Nelson and Singh (1/18) each struck early and when Anstiss affected a brilliant stumping off Lulka (4/43) the match was evenly poised at 4/79. Then a few dropped catches later Georges River were 4/210. It took a Vautin-like outfield catch from Finnemore to break the partnership. Thereafter Lulka wrapped up the innings for 223. Had we restricted Georges River to something in the order of 150 to 160, we may have had a crack at winning the match on day one. As it happened we were required to bat 22 overs - not enough to make significant inroads on the target. Chapman (28) and debutante Kunal Gupta, aka Trent (as in Trent Nathan) (20) were traveling comfortably at 0/51 before the former was tragically run out in the second last over. However, the greater tragedy was that the rain deprived use of the abovementioned batting talent. I have no doubt that, given fair weather, we would have, to quote the famous last words of a former Prime Minister, "romped it in". Whilst we remained unbeaten after six rounds, coming away with zero points against the two bottom sides ultimately cost us a semi-finals' berth.

v Burwood 81 lost to Burwood 139

Ultimately, this loss cost us a place in the semi-finals. Had we won this match we would have finished in sixth place ahead of Burwood. Gus Hook stepped up to captain the side in my absence. Unfortunately he and the rest of the team were let down by a couple of no-shows. Those who turned up did tremendously well to bowl Burwood out for 139. Singh (4/47) and Amerasinghe (3/44) were the leading wicket takers. They were well supported by Chandler (1/18 from 7) and Faizal Ali (1/8 from 5). The openers got off to a steady start but 0/25 soon became 3/25. Wickets fell at regular intervals and we were dismissed for 81. Hook top scored with (14) and Chandler (10) was the only other to reach double figures. Some say that the pitch was in very poor condition whereas others suggested that the batsmen from both sides contributed to their own demise through bad shot selection. The stitches above Ryan Cooke's left eye suggest that the Gwilliam pitch was somewhat under-prepared.

v South Sydney (1) 219 defeated South Sydney (1) 82

Souths paid the price for not taking us seriously and the victory demonstrated that we would have been genuine finals' contenders. After slow start, a series of solid partnerships lifted us to 4/140 in the 35th over. Michael Cooke (35), Amerasinghe (27), Al Mahoney (26), Erskine (26) batted well in the middle order and Ryan Cooke added (43) in quick time. Ryan's innings included three 6s, one of which cleared the light tower on the eastern side of the Gwilliam Oval by at least two metres. Chris Anstiss (15 not out) played another fine supporting innings. Singh (1/13) struck in the first over and it was downhill from there for the competition front-runners. Finnemore (4/22) relished the opportunity to sink the boot into his former club. Jason Ford (2/24) and Ryan Cooke (2/18) each collected two wickets as Souths crashed to be all out for 82 in the 23rd over.

v South Sydney (2) 164 and 3 for 124 lost to South Sydney (2) 266

The principle benefits of playing Shires cricket are that, firstly, you don't have to play Blacktown at Whalan and secondly, you don't have to play against South Sydney twice in one year (let alone twice in two rounds). We're not that lucky in Metro Shield, but at least Clay Finnemore enjoyed the South Sydney double header. After being sent in on what looked to be a good track, we made a disappointing 164. Erskine (41) and Finnemore (30) were the standouts. Expecting to be a number of players short on day two, Souths had a dash at the target and managed 3/91 in the 13 overs remaining on day one. Souths passed our score early on day two, but instead of setting up the match for an outright result, plodded along for another 30 overs before being bowled out for 266. Finnemore was the best with (4/65) and Jason Tabrett (2/33) also bowled very well. We tried to set up an improbable outright result but in the end there weren't enough overs left. Finnemore (43 not out), Chapman (37 not out) and Erskine (24) availed themselves of the opportunity for some batting practice.

v Georges River Navy 8 dec. 239 defeated Georges River Navy 110 and 66

I found myself drastically short on numbers generally and without a keeper in particular going into this game. Warren Montford, Paul Batten and Al Mahoney answered the SOS. Montford (6/29) picked up a pewter for his afternoon's work and Paul Batten (2/30) completed the demolition. Chasing 110 was not going to be easy on this slow turning dustbowl (the pitch was shaped like a bowl too!) at Bland. Erskine (16) and Ryan Cooke (26) began positively, knocking off half the runs in 10 overs. We then lost 3/17 in the next 8 overs and things were looking shaky at 5/70. Glenn Jackson (35) and Victor Chung (24) batted superbly in the conditions to add 61 for the seventh wicket –

the match winning partnership. We gained first innings points in the second last over of day one. Faizal Ali (40 not out) and Amerasinghe (38 not out) set up the outright victory early on day two with a demoralising partnership, which added 70 runs in fewer than 7 overs. Our day one ring-ins were not required as Singh (14.4 overs, 7 maidens, 5/39) and Faizal Ali (14 overs, 4 maidens, 4/27) bowled unchanged to secure the ten points. Al Mahoney had an outstanding match with the gloves, taking 5 catches and 1 stumping (fortunately for the club's bank balance, he spread these dismissals evenly over two innings).

v Lindfield 207 drew with Lindfield 1 for 34

For the second year running the Lindfield club managed to double book Acron Oval and once again we were forced onto another ground. Two venue changes later we found ourselves playing at the uncovered Koola Park. Amerasinghe (16) and Erskine (34) added 56 for the first wicket, but when Michael Cooke (39) departed we were again in trouble at 6/119. Singh (38) combined with Anstiss (23) and Tabrett (12) to lift the score beyond 200. Tabrett (1/7) bowled an excellent short, fiery spell late on day one. There was no play on day two due to, you guessed it, rain. In fact the match was called off on the Saturday afternoon because there were no covers on the pitch. Perhaps if it hadn't rained on the Sunday as well (i.e. game day) we may have got up on our protest over the change of venue. Anyway, the washout ended our chances of making the semi finals.

v Blacktown 9 for 153 lost to Blacktown 3 for 156

Whilst we were out of contention for the semis, a win here would secure us the Metropolitan Plate. By way of background, the Metropolitan Shield and Plate divisions merged in 2002-03 with the Plate being awarded to the team finishing 7th in the merged Shield/Plate division. Going into this round we were in 7th with Auburn 4 points behind and playing Georges River. The Blacktown bowlers bowled an immaculate length, making scoring very difficult. Latto (35) top scored and was well assisted by Amerasinghe (21) and Dunkerley (17 not out). Some late hitting by Faizal Ali (18) helped lift the score to 9/153 from our 50 overs. Blacktown took their time reaching the target in the 46th over for the loss of three wickets. Chapman (2/34) and Latto (1/18) were the wicket takers. Unfortunately Georges River were not good enough to hold out Auburn and we were denied the consolation silverware.

In May Macquarie hosted the Annual Masters Dinner in the refurbished SAM building. It was a very successful function attended by a 100 cricket tragics. Ken Dixon brought back memories of Dinners past with a sublime performance as MC.

My sincere thanks go to the Committee for their hard work and in particular a huge thank you and congratulations to Craig Edwards for his work as President over the past several years. I truly value Craig's friendship and contribution to the Club over the past 20 plus years.

My thanks to everyone who played Masters this season. I continue to play cricket for two reasons; the thrill of the game and most particularly the joy of the company of friends.

You will find several references to beer in the following report, I guess that is how we celebrate what we do. Let's do it all again next season!

MATCH REPORTS

v Burwood 6 for 205 defeated Burwood 133

Great game this cricket; well it is when you go to Rothwell, get sent in on a pitch wet at one end and come away with a solid win. The skipper continued the previous season's poor calling form and we were invited to bat following a delayed start. The side included three Masters debutantes O'Reilly, Lego, and Pavlov. Kendall and Hort got us off to a good start before Hort holed out to sub fielder McVey. Danny came to be fielding after Kendall had top edged the ball into the keeper's chin and he went off to have six stitches inserted. The first ball that Danny was on the field, Hort hit straight to him. O'Reilly played a mixture of the glorious and rusty for 40 not out. After Kendall's retirement for 40 not out, Lego followed in the same manner for 43 not out. A total of 205 on a slow wicket playing at two heights was a strong effort. The fellow with the stitches returned from the Medical Centre and opened for Burwood. He took a fondness to Dixon with (0-30) off 4 including 2 very long sixes. Once he retired wickets fell steadily under the pressure of good bowling and fielding. McVey continued last seasons fine form (4/16), Brown was tidy (2/25), Hort bowled up the hill into the wind (1/36) and Dixon returned to finish off (2/36). Pavlov showed promise for the future with two good overs. A most enjoyable day.

v Castle Hill 3 for 211 defeated Castle Hill 83

Won the toss and had no hesitation batting on a Northern Oval road. A beautiful day for cricket, blue sky and a gentle breeze. All the batters delighted in playing confidently through the ball and a sizable total was never in doubt. Hort, O'Reilly and Lego all retired with 40 not out. Castle Hill were dismissed in the 24th over for 83, Brown was the pick of the bowlers (4/27). Pavlov (1/13) continued to show promise. Whilst Castle Hill was not the strongest team we faced during the season, we played a solid all round game.

v Central Coast 116 lost to Central Coast 8 for 133

The vagaries of the Masters draw saw Macquarie tour for a second consecutive year to scenic Doyalson on the Central Coast. We were invited to field after losing the toss. Brown (3 for 20) off 10 and Hort (1 for 17) off 5 ensured we started well. With the 5th wicket falling to a run out in the 17th over and the score 41 we were well on top. However, some patient batting, good running between the wickets and some poor catching saw Central Coast to a competitive total. McVey (3 for 31) off his 10 was again reliable. The outfield was lush and boundaries very hard to score. We started solidly, 0 for 33 off 10. However we lost Kendall and O'Reilly at that score. Tidy bowling meant the run rate rose and we were put under pressure. A variety of rash shots saw us lose 6 for 28 in the final 10 overs. All out for 116. Brown, batting at number 4 was the last man out for (42) ; unfortunately no one from the middle or late order could build a partnership with him. A disappointing loss that put a dent in our aspirations for the year.

v Epping 3 for 149 defeated Epping 8 for 148

After Christmas, a 10 man Macquarie team made the short journey up Epping Rd to North Epping Oval which has been prepared Sunday morning after Saturday's 3rd Grade washout. As usual the skipper lost the toss and Epping had no hesitation batting. Pavlov, returning to the scene of 1979 final glories (two wickets in the opening over of the final, Wick are there any other survivors from that team?) took the new ball with Brown. Both were tight, but not supported by the fielders. We dropped catches all over the place and fielded like a team that had not seen a cricket ball for weeks on end. Pavlov finished with (0/12) off 5 and Brown (1/25) off 10. Mahoney made a rare bowling appearance and bowled the opener after he had offered half a dozen run out chances and catches that we failed to take. McVey, (3/39) off 10 and Howlett (0/32) off 8 both bowled well to the end of 40 overs. The ground fielding picked up and we got three run outs as Epping struggled to push the score along. Hobbs made a lightning fast stumping after a few practice goes. Out batting was a mix of excellent and woeful, the 3 wickets to fall all got ducks. The others were all not out, Kendall and Burchett opened and both retired for (40), Howlett (38 not out) and McVey (22 not out). In the end the victory was comprehensive with 5 overs to spare. Epping were excellent hosts and a couple of quiet beers were had after the game.

v Manly 7 for 155 defeated Manly 144

This was a much-anticipated clash against last year's Premiers who had not been defeated in one and a half seasons of Masters cricket. Dixon took over the tossing duties given the skipper's woeful record and the Manly skipper called incorrectly. We batted on a grassy Gwilliam deck that seamed all day. Burchett ran Kendall out in the 2nd over which brought O'Reilly to the crease. He and Burchett proceeded cautiously against a moving ball before Burchett was run out taking a 3rd, 2 for 41 in the 16th. There is a story circulating that Kendall, who had to make the umpiring call on Simon's run out, had his finger raised before the stumps were broken and the appeal made. Howlett joined O'Reilly and they pushed the score to 86 when they both lost their wickets for (35) and (32) respectively. Brown held the lower order together with a fine 40 not out. 155 for 7 was a reasonable tally given the very slow outfield but we needed early wickets to put pressure on our opponents. Quality opposition brings out the best in players and both Dixon and Brown bowled superbly. In the 10th over Kendall ran out Manly's best bat with a powerful return from the point boundary. The other Manly opener, under pressure not to be the 4th opener run out on the day, let an off cutter from Brown go and was bowled. Brown bowled out his 10 overs straight to finish with (1 for 21). McVey replaced Brown and hit his usual impeccable length and troubled all batmen. A slice of luck went our way when their number three popped a calf muscle and retired hurt. A skied catch to Hobbs had Manly 3 for 70. A partnership formed and at 3 for 117, 39 were needed to win with 9 overs left. The game was up for grabs. Danny's perseverance finally paid off and wickets started to fall. Hobbs picked up two stumpings after having one denied to a poor piece of umpiring which led to display of temper from Hobbs and the skipper. The batsman was actually walking when he saw that he had been given not out and strolled back to the crease, Hobbs destroyed the stumps a second time, the umpire then gave him out, but changed his mind when he realised that Hobbs had not removed a stump to complete the second play. So, with his finger in the air he tells the batman he is not out. One of the strangest non-dismissals any of us have seen. Dixon came back to bowl out his final four overs, picked up a wicket first ball of the new spell and conceded 1 run in 3 overs to finish with (1 for 13) off 9. Danny did the rest and finished with (5 for 38). In the end this was a game with a bit of everything; some quality batting from both sides, tight bowling, good fielding, a slice of controversy and a most satisfying win. At the end of the day all of the Manly lads stayed for a couple of beers to celebrate why we play the game in the first place. Great fun.

v Barker Old Boys 5 for 170 defeated Barker Old Boys 99

On a sweltering day and a team with some last minute changes, Dixon, the Team Tosser, earned his keep, lured the BOB captain into an incorrect call and sent the 9 man BOB Team into the field. A seaming Gwilliam deck presented some early challenges and both openers went cheaply, However, O'Reilly and Hort batted well and retired with 40s. Terry Luckman, in a welcome return to Masters as a last minute call up, hit some nice shots for (19) and Mahoney hung around for (22 not out). BOB got away to a brisk start but a couple of soft dismissals, both caught by the very, very late call up Payne, put the bowlers on top. Wickets then fell regularly and BOB were dismissed in the 31st over well short of the target. Pavlov bowled ten overs straight in display of stamina and finished with (4 for 31). Dixon, Hort and McVey all picked up a wicket. The game was hard going in trying conditions. Valuable points were picked up as Masters continued their climb up the ladder. My thanks to both Terry and Marty for agreeing to play when sitting at home watching the ODI may have been a more comfortable option.

v Kenthurst 155 tied with Kenthurst 155

On a sweltering day we made the long journey to Kenthurst. The skipper won the toss and batted on a hard dry deck. Mahoney and Hort began cautiously and the first wicket fell at the end of the 10th over with the score on 27. Over 11 through 20 saw the addition of only 32 runs and the loss of 3 more wickets. Brown was run out shortly after with a direct hit from side on. O'Reilly was solid and was joined by McVey who hit the ball sweetly for 23. O'Reilly got to 40 and was compelled to retire. Wickets continued to fall and at 9 for 130 in the 35th over O'Reilly came back in to join Dixon who had not batted since October. Ken struck the ball hard and finished with (16 not out) and O'Reilly, continuing excellent recent form, finished with (45 not out). We struggled to build partnerships and had no answer to the bowling of Kenthurst's 75-year-old slow bowler who finished with 5 for 45 off 9 overs. Kenthurst's fielding was excellent by any standard, even more so considering the oppressive conditions. Still, 155 was a competitive score. We opened as usual with Dixon (2 for 34) and Brown (3 for 27) who both bowled with great control. Kenthurst's form bat had been dismissed as wickets fell regularly and at 5 for 72 in the 22nd over we seemed to be on track for a win. However, a solid partnership formed between 2 left handers, our fielding dropped off a bit in the heat and the Kenthurst' lads were back in the game supported by vigorous barracking from their team mates. The pendulum swung, with 3 more wickets, and at 8 for 123 in 33rd over we fancied our chances again, but one of the hard-hitting left-handers was still there. A combination of slogs, snicks and fabulous strokes saw Kenthurst get to 8 for 146 with 2 overs to go. McVey (1 for 46 off 9) was replaced and Payne bowled an excellent 2nd last over for 3 runs. To add another twist the left-hander had to retire 40 not out at the end of the 39th over. Dixon has to bowl the final over, Kenthurst are 8 down for 149, 10 and 11 at the crease, one a new batman, with a retiree to come back in if needed. They need 7 to win, 6 to tie, we either need two wickets or keep their scoring to 5 or less. Final over pans out; 1, 1 and a run out and the left-hander comes back in, dot, 2, dot. Last ball, left-hander on strike, they need 3 to win, 2 to tie, we need to restrict the scoring to a single or get a wicket. You play cricket (or sport for that matter) for moments like this, a great build up to the last ball of the day, result in the balance. Whichever way it goes, it has been a great game. What happens? You could not have scripted it, the Kenthurst umpire calls Dixon for a no ball, batsmen scurry through for a single, fail to keep their wits about them, think about a 2nd and number 11 is thankfully run out. Game tied. The spell is broken; to a man we are seething. Dixon, who can tell you the details of the only no ball he has bowled for MUCC in 20 plus seasons, threatens the ump and we all storm off. Now, of course, it is possible Ken bowled a no ball, but in my view the probability is so low that one rapidly discards the idea. No one was looking, so it is up to the ump. If it clearly was a no ball, well, a good and gutsy call. If not, why bother playing? When you get to our age one of the reasons you play is to uphold the honour and traditions of the game on both a personal and team level. I saw no

evidence of that in the way this game was concluded. So, instead of sharing a beer with the Kenthurst lads, and recounting what a fiercely contested and good spirited game had been played, we went home. We should have been celebrating O'Reilly's knock, their left-handers' knocks, and the joy of watching an old stager, passionate about the game, weaving his magic. Pity it was not so, how disappointing. PS. In his speech at the Masters Dinner in May to accept their share of the premiership, Bruce Fraser, the Kenthurst skipper, began by saying the team is dealing with its embarrassment and the ump (who I won't name) is still under treatment. I thanked him for his honesty. Whilst the result ultimately did not affect our position in the comp, it was the most bizarre end to a game in my experience.

v Parramatta 4 for 106 defeated Parramatta 105

This was a game rescheduled from a November wash out. With 10 men we took on Parramatta who we had failed to defeat in two previous encounters. The skipper lost the toss and Parra batted on an unused deck. They got off to a good start and were 0 for 27 after 7. Dixon picked up one opener with a well thought out piece of bowling caught sharply by Howlett in the gully and three balls later bowled number 3. McVey picked up the skipper with his second ball and wickets fell regularly, Parra 6 for 104 in the 31st. Danny picked up 3 for none in his last over and Howlett the last wicket in the next over after an inspired piece of field placement by Luckman. Parra had collapsed to be all out 105. Dixon (2/14), Hort (1/22), Mahoney (1/11), Howlett (1/50 and McVey again outstanding (4/21). Chasing a modest total we began poorly losing Hort cheaply, Kendall (21), Howlett (35), Mahoney (23) and McVey (18 not out) saw us home in 28 overs to a comfortable victory. Parramatta stayed and enjoyed a beer afterwards. A nice change following the unpleasantness the previous week against Kenthurst.

v Hornsby 129 lost to Hornsby 6 for 130

We travelled to Berowra and having won the toss elected to make first use a rock hard deck. Started well with both Hort and Kendall looking solid. Lost Kendall and then O'Reilly quickly, Hort was dismissed just short of 40. We failed to form a partnership of any note and eventually panicked. We were dismissed for a very ordinary 129. Hornsby batted well, in particular their number 3 who retired with 40 not out. Try as we might this was not a game for us. It was a loss that cost us a lot in the final wash up.

v Warringah 3 for 135 defeated Warringah 9 for 133

At home again the captain maintained his impeccable record of losing the toss and Warringah had no hesitation batting. We went into this game with three regular bowlers missing. However others filled the gap and got the job done. Payne (2/21) off 10 opened and generated good pace, he picked up the first wicket early with a fine one handed grab by Hobbs. Fellow opener Hort (0/14) off 5 swung the ball considerably and was unlucky not to pick up a wicket or two. First change Pete Clark (1/24) off 5, filling in after an absence of two years got the other opener lbw after a long and emotional appeal. Payne bowled number three and we were on top at 3 for 48. A partnership developed until McVey came on in the 21st over. In his second over he picked up the dangerous number 3 for 39, one short of the retirement score, well caught by O'Reilly at mid-off. Danny mesmerised the following batmen, two lobs to mid-wicket caught by Payne, a well-struck full toss grabbed by a diving Mahoney at mid-wicket. A skied catch behind slip to Hort. Howlett chipped in with a wicket in his first over and Warringah were 9 for 111 in the 33rd over. Danny needed one more wicket for 6 for and a pewter (the Club won't give him one for 5 for in 10 overs). Try as we might 10 and 11 could not be dismissed and put on an unbroken 22 for the last wicket. Danny finished with (5 for 22), his second 5-wicket haul for the season. Warringah's bowling in the first 20 overs was either tight or down the leg-side. Burchett went early lbw, (Simon unhappy, some things never change). O'Reilly went in the 19th over and we had progressed slowly to 2 for 43. Mahoney and Hort pushed the run rate up, Hort very focussed after Mahoney had nearly run him out twice. Bruce retired with a strong (41). Mahoney (37 not out) and Howlett (16 not out) saw us to a win in the 36th over. A good win that saw us still in contention.

v Penrith 89 lost to Penrith 3 for 90

Hosting Penrith, our final game of the year, saw us presented with a simple proposition; a win would see us as Premiers in the Masters' first-past-the-post format. The skipper won his second toss of the season and we batted on a hard deck with some grass and a very, very slow outfield. Penrith, who were one of four teams still in contention, bowled straight, hit the deck hard and fielded well. We lost our first wicket at 15 and were 6 for 44 at one stage, the only partnership of note was 37 for the 8th wicket by Mahoney and Chris Luckman. We were dismissed for 89 in the 40th over. Mahoney batting at 3 grafted (36 not out), of the rest only Luckman and O'Reilly got double figures. Only one 4 was hit. Payne and Dixon opened and bowled well but were not supported by the field; we dropped half a dozen mostly difficult chances. As a consequence we could not put any pressure on their batters and they passed us comfortably in the 30th over. A disappointing effort considering what was in prospect; we never really got into the game at any stage. We had a BBQ afterwards and a few beers to reflect on what had been a most enjoyable season with a great bunch of blokes.
