TREASURER'S REPORT

The Cricket Club's finances continue to remain healthy however, a few items are worth a mention as we proceed into season 1995/96.

- The increasing 'professionalism' of Shires cricket requires Macquarie University Cricket Club to play smarter, both on the field and financially, to succeed into the future.
- The Club's funds have been decreasing over the past few seasons due to a number of factors. They are:
 - 1. Decreased income from after match drinks and functions costed, not to make a profit, but to try to increase acceptance of the new facilities.
 - 2. Failure to obtain the normal SCA annual grant.
 - 3. Maintenance of the roller.
 - 4. Strongly subsidising our women's team.
 - 5. Not increasing Club fees for the past two years.
 - 6. Increased general expenses ie, equipment.

This can be reflected by our balance of funds shown below.

Macquarie University's success last season can be seen in its commitment to the above, and in ensuring its stars of the future, particularly its student members of the future, are looked after and are not tempted to look at other clubs by recognising our facilities are first class as is our support from MUSA.

While recognising the above, we need to ensure our future by looking to other areas of income, particularly sponsorship from the local community, in order that the good work of the past years is not wasted and it is a priority for the 1995/96 committee to address.

My thanks go to those on committee last year, especially the two Davids, Budgie and Dermie, for their efforts and to those who helped bring in the little bit of extra income, in particular Craig Anderson for his contributions to raffles.

COACH'S REPORT

Congratulations to Ken and Janine for their 3rd Grade and Women's 4th Grade premierships. And thanks to Amanda for her wonderful efforts with the Women's team - our loss is Melbourne's gain.

We can feel pleased with 1st Grade, and "just OK" about our middle of the road finish in the Club Championship.

As coach, my view is most clearly on the development of all players, and the club championship is the expression of our success. I invite any player to approach me for support this year.

Looking back we can say we *done good*. But I have to confess, middle of the road finishes make me nervous. What can you say about them? It's not bad,.... but it's not good? We're a few games away from a great season,.... or a terrible one,.... or more frustratingly, another average one.

Average seasons tend to get average responses. When you're winning, its easy to stay fired up - it feels great. When you're losing, you know you have to, or else you just keep hurting. In between is the deadly comfort zone, like anaesthetic - doing just enough to keep the grim reaper from our door and not feeling a thing!

If we review our performances last season, two obvious opportunities to pick up Club championship points appear: 2nd Grade and U24s. This is not criticism, but a recognition that we should support our mates. We all struggle from time to time. All players carry the burden to improve.

- A serious concern is the widening gap between 1st and 2nd grade. Few 2nd graders are seriously pressuring higher players for spots. For us to compete aggressively with other clubs, we have to lift our personal standards on the field and at practice.
- U24s have been neglected by the club and largely unsupported by anyone other than those who play. It is a matter of pride with other clubs. We have a poor winning record in spite of the talent that turns out. It costs us valuable club championship points (on a par with 3rd grade points). Commitment and pride must be restored to this team's performances.

Proposed improvements:

- > that we form a coaching panel to assist/drive the practices. We need to agree on the right way to keep the winning momentum going through the use of our training. This should include players from all grades. We commit to coming, and practice till dark.
- > that we announce an U24s Frank Gray Shield squad at the start of the season, include about 15 players in the squad and arrange squad practice sessions to build up skills, teamwork and spirit.
- ▶ fielding must become an obsession. The Australian catching in the West Indies demonstrates what can be achieved by taking every chance. Our own examples of players, such as Il Duce practising his slips catching, and Dover in the outfield, are our legends with the 3rd grade premiership to prove it. What more motivation and direction do we need.

Ask the men's 3rd grade and women's 4th grade: winning is worth it!! Good luck this season!

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - '1ST GRADE' SHIRES

Congratulations to Ken's 3rds and to Janine and Amanda's 4th grade wins (especially back to back now). Also to Budgie, Dermie and the Committee for their work this year.

We can be proud of the 1st grade effort this year. We made the semi-finals, played better cricket overall than the previous year, and enjoyed it more. The result of the final, and the way in which Canterbury won indicate how close we were to winning it ourselves.

We started the season poorly with two losses. But we stood up and made our season count after Warringah. We did not lose again until the last round. Getting out in the teens and twenties consistently is simply lack of concentration. Mind you, maintaining waterproof concentration is the hardest part of the game! The Australian win and Steve Waugh in the West Indies showed us the value of it! That is how we will win next year.

A few comments about individual performances, (remembering of course that it remains a team game). Linus had his best year behind the stumps, Budgie and Murph were a great pair, and Wick used his experience well.

Peter Saliba is a great acquisition for our club; for batting, for fielding and for enthusiasm - an attribute that led to several gutsy and match-winning digs.

Brownie re-invented himself this year, opened the bowling superbly and added an extra level of maturity and commitment to the team.

MATCH REPORTS - '1ST GRADE' SHIRES

v Lane Cove 220 lost to Lane Cove 239.

In a mirror image of the first game last season, the team batting first (us on this occasion) set a modest total, only to see LC pass us 8 down. Only Webby (85) and Edgo (64) did themselves credit with the bat. Their club-record partnership took us to 3/178, whence we collapsed, losing 7/42.

Our bowlers did well to have them battling at 5/93, and from there we ought to have won. However, two partnerships got them to the edge of victory. Limitations in the field hampered our attack, a legacy from last year. Budgie 3/62, Webby 2/53, Murph 2/45. A disappointing start to the season.

v Warringah 5 dec. 289 lost to Warringah 303.

This loss was soul destroying. The dressing room grieving afterwards ran deep. In hindsight, this was the loss we had to have.

Won the toss, batted and did really well. Edgo, Legs, Hort all 20s, Mono 151 and Webby 58x. Even had them 1/20 overnight. Invincible, we all thought! First of all, in spite of our loss, our bowlers didn't bowl badly! They consistently created chances and took wickets, but remained unable to control the scoring rate. Had them 5/143 at one stage, but they went to tea at 5/180 (160 off the 40 overs before tea!). Catches dropped, easy catches dropped, misfielding, and that sick feeling of watching ourselves get beaten, unable to save ourselves. Even got them to 7/213, with their main man gone. Dermie 4/63, Toy 2/20 late in the game gave us a hint of hope.

All in all, just very, very sad.

v Lindfield 1/24 drew with Lindfield 239.

Rain destroyed the second week, and with it our chances to affect an immediate turn around. Won the toss, bowled on a good deck, and were delighted to end the day needing only 220 the

second week to win. Not a perfect performance, but definitely better. Brownie 3/56 and Wick 3/60.

v Burwood 8/146 defeated Burwood 109.

Won the toss and bowled on a moist pitch that suited us perfectly - "Hail Marys" all round. Burwood all out in 58.3 overs. Budgie and Murph each bowled 20 overs straight to tie Burwood in knots: 3/37 and 3/24, respectively, Webby 2/15. At the crease and at 3/8, we actually had not started all that well. Mono (84) and Webby (19) almost saw us through to the end. History tells that this was the first win over Burwood in 1sts for 20 years. Our first points of the season! What an omen!

v Holroyd 6/175 defeated Holroyd 171.

Elected to bowl first. An inspiring first over saw Webby take a wicket off the first ball and get hit for 6 off the last. Consistently took wickets to have them 6/86 off 27 overs. Took the 7th wicket at 163, as the last 4 fell for 8 runs: 171 off 58 overs. Webby starred with the ball: 18-2-69-6. Dermie and Murph chipped in with 2 each. Edgo (39) and Legs (27) played courageously for us to reach 0/44 overnight.

The second week was a much tighter contest, with us stumbling to 6/125 against some useful pace bowling. Saliba (53x) and Murph (15x) nursed us home. Match-winning performances by Webby and Saliba. 2 wins now and on the road again!

v Baulkham Hills 5/181 defeated Baulkham Hills 9/180.

Elected to bowl again in a one day game reduced to 56 overs each. Off to a great start again with Brownie getting a wicket in the second over and took our advantage to 5/48. Butterworth's 82 saved them from embarrassment. All the bowlers got some: Webby 2/39, Brownie 3/41, Murph 2/49, Budgie 2/45.

Began the chase shakily (2/6) needing 3.22 per over. Mono (72) and Saliba (41) reestablished some momentum, but at 5/132 off 40 overs, the match was alive. Toy (39x) and Brownie (6x) won through, with a memorable 18 runs off the 48th over to turn the tide our way. A great result against a very good bowling side - 3 in a row!

v South East Sydney 8 dec. 173 & 0/4 defeated South East Sydney outright 87 & 86. They chose to bat but weren't up to it on a placid Uni deck. Yet another 1st over wicket got us rolling, and from 2/37, Murph (4/10) and Budgie (5/43) cleaned them up in 42 overs. This included a super, one-handed, overhead catch from Edgo at fine leg off a Budgie (ahem!) bouncer.

We reached 8/173 in 41 overs for an overnight lead of 86. Mono 59, Webby 31, Legs 25, Murph 21x and Wick 6x.

Declared overnight, and took wickets in the first 2 overs this time. Took their last 5 wickets for 4 runs - all out 86 off 36 overs and scores tied! (the skipper declared too early). Brownie did the early damage with 4/24, Murph 3/3, Budgie 2/24, Webby 1/35.

Enter the new opening pair of Budgie and Wick for the one run required: and bless our collective souls to see Budgie (off the first and only ball) play the best, spanking off-drive for 4 that you could ever wish to see (glorious shot, that!): timed to perfection, between the bowler and mid-off, along the ground all the way and up the hill at the tennis court end....(Wick 0x).

A bowler's game though, with Budgie's and Murph's match figures of 24.3-8-67-7 and 20-13-13-7 respectively; just sensational.

This win really marked a lift in our self-confidence and a more relaxed approach to our play. 4 wins in a row now, 28 points and all of a sudden, equal third. Bexley next, one win behind us!

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - '3RD GRADE' SHIRES

After losing the final by a handful of runs in season 1993-94, it was a great relief for 6 of last season's finalists to be playing when we beat Roseville to win the competition. It is amazing in all sports, how often teams seem to lose a final, learn from the experience and win the competition in the following year.

Whilst our final's performance was stronger this season, our pre-final's performance was not nearly as good. We lost three games chasing very "gettable" scores. Two of those targets being below 170 on plum batting decks. While I don't want to dwell on our poor performances it was those games that were our most important in terms of winning the competition. I think thirds this year and last year expected to win every game and when a loss did occur everyone took it personally.

That feeling is the one thing I noticed change when we won the club championship in 1990-91. This flowed on to premierships in B-Grade, D-Grade and this year's thirds. The club now expects success in each game and when it is not achieved; **it hurts!** That does not mean sulking after a game but it means carrying this "I'm not going to let that happen again" attitude all week. It was amazing how many phone calls I received from players after losses compared to a minimal number after victories - interesting.

I'm determined however not to get carried away with our premiership this season because it will mean nothing if the current group of players do not firstly come back to progress to higher grades and, secondly, go on to take leadership roles in the Club.

Leadership means getting on the committee, helping junior players, making suggestions, attending all social functions or just taking the initiative to get to games or practice early and help with setting up. As Al Mahoney has mentioned on many occasions, the running of the Club and higher grade teams are very dependant on the over 30's group and we are only a season or two away from losing a great percentage of those players.

Keeping with the theme of not getting carried away, our win this year is very much a result of 1st grade fielding, 2nd grade bowling and 3rd grade batting. What I mean by that is we had as good a fielding side as I have ever seen at Macquarie. The bowling this year would have been very competitive in 2nds but our batting was comparable to an average Third Grade Team. There is simply no reason why this should be the case when you look at the fact that a majority of our top eight batsmen have been successful in A-Grade teams and are still young enough to be playing there. Our most successful batsman was Paul Chew (Good on ya Paul!) who incidentally has never played A's and only one game in B's. Paul scored at an average of 30 opening the batting. Paul's efforts in the field were incredible and at last count he had 8 run-outs for the season.

In summary, if 2nd grade next year are relying on thirds for a better batting season it could be another disappointing year.

The bowling was a completely different story with Pedavoli, Roberts, Bateman, Lenard, and the writer all getting wickets. There is no reason, with the exception of Carlo Pedavoli, who I hope is considering captaincy, that all those players won't be playing higher grades at some

stage next year. In summary, an excellent year for our bowlers with Pedavoli moving the ball about, Roberts bowling immaculate line and length, Lenard tantalising batsman with flight and spin, Bateman bowling with great pace and Dixon once again benefiting from the new ball and a huge number of overs. Special mention must go to our wicket-keeper Ashley Stanwell who kept very well all year and has a big future at this club, both keeping and perhaps captaining in years to come. Also thanks to my vice captain Phil Lenard, who many times took over captaining. There is no way we would have had the success over the last two seasons without him.

Thanks also to the committee, particularly David Budge and the other grade captains Tony Monaghan, Al Mahoney, Doug Latto, Mark Hughes and Sam Herps. Also thanks to Lego and Hort for fitting into thirds so easily and helping steady the ship - particularly Lego in the final. Bruce Hort did not have the batting success he would have hoped for but his slip catching, which took hours of practice, was as good as I've seen,.

Congratulations to all the Thirds' players and in particular the squad of 12 who played in the semi and final.

MATCH REPORTS - 'UNDER 24s'

v Lane Cove 167 lost to Lane Cove 8/216.

Lane Cove won the toss and decided to bat first on a wicket that would provide little assistance to the bowlers. However, Paul Batten defied the conditions to take 3 for 22 off 12 overs. He was well supported by Paul "Cracker" Sweeney (0/41 from 12), Simon Wolfe (1/37), Kandon Venkatraman (0/25) and in particular Damian "Soc" Roberts (2/46). The team's lack-lustre performance in the field, made it particularly difficult for these bowlers to apply the constant pressure required to get on top of the opposition in conditions so favourable to the batsmen. After 60 overs, Lane Cove were 8 for 216.

We started the chase horrendously, losing our first 4 wickets for 28. However, for a while it seemed possible that either Ben Bradley (29, including 6 four's) or Ashley Stanwell, who compiled a very classy 50, would rescue the team.

Unfortunately, this was not to be, with Macquarie being bowled out in the 55th over for 167.

v Roseville 227 defeated Roseville 219.

After winning the toss, I decided to bat first. Mark Hughes and Ben Bradley got us away to a flying start, each hitting boundaries in the first couple of overs. Mark was dismissed first (16) followed by Ben (14) when the score was 45. Both Pete Saliba (25) and myself (25) were out just as it looked like we were settling in. Undoubtedly the two stars of the innings were Paul Batten and Simon Wolfe. Paul constructed his innings of 62 perfectly, starting cautiously - when the team needed someone to build an innings, then accelerating in the final overs. When Wolfe's turn came to bat, a score of 180 was the most we could have hoped for. Wolfe changed that with an innings of 34 in 40 minutes, including the 6 hit out of the ground and into the backyard of a nearby house. Crackers contributed to the carnage with 17 in 20 minutes including a spectacular exhibition of running between wickets.

While 227 was way beyond even the most optimistic expectations halfway through our innings (we were 6 for 88 after 30 overs), it was still going to take some defending, particularly taking into consideration the short boundaries and the fact that Roseville were primarily a team of batsmen.

Batten (2/29), Roberts (3/40), Sweeney (1/27), Law (0/42) and Nicholas Edgerton (1/23) all bowled superbly particularly in the latter stages of the game when the pressure was intensewith 10 overs remaining, Roseville needed 48 to win with 5 wickets in hand. They were bowled out for 219 in 58.3 overs.

The most outstanding aspect of this win was the way in which the team lifted its performance in the field. The intense pressure applied to the batsmen, a result of both tight bowling and desperate fielding, was what led to the regular fall of wickets (3 Roseville run outs).

v South East Sydney 135 lost to South East Sydney 6/271.

This was always going to be a difficult match. The rain had ensured we had no chance of making the semis, in contrast South East Sydney were leading our pool. South East Sydney won the toss and decided to bat first. They proceeded to make 6 for 271. Their number 3 contributing 112 of their runs. Paul Sweeney was the pick of the bowlers, conceding only 38 runs from 12 overs, while Steven Davis bowled without luck early in his spell. We went about chasing this total aggressively. Unfortunately, this led to the rapid fall of wickets. At one stage it looked like we were going to have a very early end to the match. However, all this changed once Eddie and Paul Sweeney got together. They came together in the 39th over and were not separated until the 55th, creating an Under 24s record 10th wicket

partnership of 41 and enabling the team to reach a respectable 135. Crackers was finally dismissed for 38, leaving Eddie 16 not out.

This was an extraordinary Under 24 season in that 4 out of the scheduled 7 games were washed out. Had we played those games, particularly the ones immediately following the Roseville game, I've no doubt we would have enjoyed more victories. Nevertheless, it was a pleasure being involved with all the guys in the games we did play. I would like to thank Ken Dixon and Doug Latto for helping me select the team, Mark Hughes for his support on the field and Eddie Aphaiswongse and Dave Budge for their support and help with such things as covers and drinks.
