

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year was 1970 and the batsman was Peter Saunders, the first secretary of the Macquarie University Cricket Club.

Peter Miller, with the ball, produced another heroic performance in this year's A Grade semi-final against Lindfie It will never appear so dramatically in the record book but we who witnessed it know that no statistics could possibly record the effort and the will. Andrew Faulks, as Captain and wicket keeper, will know it to be one of the greatest days of the Club. We didn't win. The match was drawn, and Lindfield, the Minor Premiers, went automatically into the The Macquarie performance in the field, against final. impossible odds, was magnificient, and sustained beyond the point where an impossible situation was worse than impossible. Rain washed out the first day of the match. One day, against the Minor Premiers. Macquarie must win, to go on, while Lindfield needed only to draw. A wicket that gave no encouragement to bowlers, and a late start because the ground was occupied by hundreds of "Little Athletes". Nonetheless, Peter Miller bowled the opening batsman in the first over. All credit to Lindfield for the way they surmounted that blow. It was a bitter but proud day for an ageing President - well done boys.

We have yet to reach an A Grade final but it must come, if the spirit of that semi-final is maintained, and I know it will be.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - FIRST ELEVEN

The 1974/75 season was the best yet for Macquarie 'A' Shires. Although only our second season in the big time our all round performances augur well for a premiership win in the next few seasons.

The team's strength lay in its balanced bowling attack. Peter Miller showed consistency and intelligence, bowling to a plan that considered the batsman's talents and the field. Forty-one wickets speaks for itself.

Bernie Clifton instilled confidence whenever he bowled. He is undoubtedly the best spinner in Shires cricket. If he irons out his approach he will do still better.

The bowlers were well supported in the outfield. Geoff Frankish was always dynamic with Martin Denlow and 'Snow' Barlow consistently good. The same cannot be said closer in. Specialised slip fieldsmen are badly needed.

Weakness lay in the batting department. On the credit side, Geoff Frankish had a fine season scoring 350 runs. His all round performances earned him the M.R. Gwilliam Shield.

For the rest of us, our batting perforamnces were much less admirable. Again there were too many 20's and not enough 50's or better. Consideration must be made of 'sacrificing' one of our best batsmen as opener to lay the foundations of an innings and thereby ensuring our middle order bastmen perform under a better climate. 'Snow' Barlow was the season's find. With a full season ahead of him, he will be a great asset to our Club.

Canterbury - Won 1st innings.

A fine win with entertainment supplied by

Mick Denlow and Peter Foxall. 'Snow' Barlow

scored a creditable 52. John Slack bowled well

for 3/9. Andrew Faulks ended his opening career.

Ryde - Won 1st innings.
A critical match and our best performance.
Macquarie scored 251 with good batting throughout
the order. On the second, incredibly hot day
Peter Miller from the cool of the dressing shed
saw Ryde dismissed for 187 thanks to Clifton
4/28 and Graeme Bleus in the gully.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - SECOND ELEVEN

The statistics for the 1974/75 season disclose a slightly disappointing result. Overall the season concluded with the 'B's having three first innings wins, two draws and seven losses from the twelve games played. The result probably understates the actual worth of the team's performace somewhat, as there were two losses which could have easily been turned into wins, and a draw which saw Bexley 9/106 chasing 171.

The season began disastrously with an all-day game on a sodden pitch against Burwood, who had no trouble in scoring 5/212. The 'B's were quickly routed for 75 and this highlights the batting problem which we were to experience throughout the season. On a number of future occasions our bowlers were able to dismiss the opposition for less than 180 only to see batting failures undo their good work, with the side making 200 (exactly) only once during the season.

Following on from the opening loss to Burwood, the early part of the season was devoid of any success except that

against Roseville where Graeme Hargreaves turned in a superb display of spin bowling to rout Roseville for 142 taking a personal 8/34 from 13 overs. The real problem at this early part of the season was the inability of the early batsmen to lay a foundation for a long innings, and to allow a reasonable target to bowl at.

The middle to end of the season showed an improvement with a sequence of four reasonable first innings scores producing two first innings points, the unlucky draw and a loss. The final game in the re-drawn round was a further draw.

Apart from the batting weakness there were several other areas which contributed to the overall result. One of the major areas was fielding where, regularly, catches were dropped at critical times in the opposition innings with the resultant big scores being attained. Apart from the catching problem the other lack was in attention to the disciplines of detail such as backing-up the man fielding the ball, moving-in with the bowler, etc. More emphasis on a disciplined approach to fielding by all team members is required, and a number of games could have been decisively influenced by a better approach.

Overall whilst the results were not inspiring, the season was made worthwhile by the enthusiasm of some of the players, and by the lessons learnt in another year of our apprenticeship in Shires cricket. The lessons cover almost the complete spectrum of cricket decisions, but the major one appears to be that unless Macquarie can gain a suitable number of players who are able to play consistently, then the massive team fluctuations especially in B's and C's, will stop the attainment of results that the available talent is capable of. Once a base of players is established who are prepared to play out the complete season, then a more rigorous attitude to practice, and a better disciplined on-field approach will produce satisfactory results.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - THIRD ELEVEN

The 1974-75 season was one the "C" Shires side will look back on with mixed feelings. From a great start to the season in which the side had successive outright wins against Lane Cove and Burwood, we then slumped to lose the following three games.

A mid-season revival in which the side was able to register good wins against Lindfield and Epping II's, leaving us with a faint chance of making the semis, was followed by disaster after disaster and indeed the side was unable to record another victory during the remainder of the season.

MATCH BY MATCH

Round 1 - Canterbury I's - Washed Out.

Round 2 - Lane Cove II's - Lost 1st Innings; Won Outright.

The features of this match were undoubtedly the fine bowling of Mick Tiernan (4-26) in Lane Cove's 1st innings and the solid batting by Phil Johnstone (33) and Chris Hehir (22) in our second innings. Poor fielding was an unfortunate feature of our play and was to prove an insurmountable handicap in later matches.

Round 3 - Burwood - Lost 1st Innings; Won Outright.

Paul Korbel turned in a handy double for the side in the second innings of this match, the side having been completely outplayed in the 1st innings. Paul scored 25 very quick runs in our second dig and when given the new ball, took 6-22 off 10 overs to leave Burwood wondering what had happened to the team that they had played the previous week. Mick Stevens also hit up a fine 30 not out in our second innings, and Mal Prentis (3-21) provided solid support for Paul Korbel in winding up the game.

Round 4 - Pennant Hills - Lost Outright.

The only memorable feature of this match was the remarkable number of catches Macquarie managed to put down in the game. In all, we spilled at least 8 chances, 3 of which came from a batsman who went on to make 100. With fielding like that, we deserved to lose the game.

Round 5 - Canterbury I's - Lost 1st Innings.

Good knocks by Tony Zucconi (35), Mick McKerchar (31) and Mal Prentis (22) gave us our chance in this game, but Canterbury, aided by some of the worst fielding by our side yet, passed our score with 3 wickets in hand. Special mention must be made of Mick Tiernan's bowling effort of 5-12 from 7-3 overs - really guite magnificent!

Round 6 - Lane Cove I's - Lost 1st Innings.

A game in which the superior side won easily, although John Austin (25) in this match began to show the form which was to make him one of the side's most reliable batsmen. Mick Stevens continued his incredible run of not outs with an undefeated 23; and in the bowling department Mick McKerchar turned in a superhuman effort to concede only 25 runs from his 20 overs.

Round 7 - Lindfield - Lost 1st Innings - Won Outright.

Poor batting let us down in our 1st innings in this match, however a more determined effort in the second dig saw us leave ourselves with a fighting chance for an outright win. That we were able to pull this off was due solely to the bowling of Mick McKerchar who in 16 straight overs INTO a stiff breeze had the incredible figures of 8-39. From a personal viewpoint, it was nice to at last score a few runs and totals of 39 and 47 were very pleasing.

Round 8 - Epping II's - Won 1st Innings.

With most of the batsmen getting runs and all the bowlers getting wickets in this game it seemed that we might at last be starting to click and that we might still have an outside chance of making the semis.

Round 9 - Epping I's - Lost 1st Innings.

Despite a great 53 by Mick Tiernan the side then crumbled to be easily beaten on the 1st innings. The second innings produced a fine 54 by Peter Cavanagh which left us with a chance to save an outright defeat and good steady bowling by McKerchar and Prentis saw us through. However the game marked the end of our semi-final hopes.

Round 10 - Auburn-Lidcombe - Lost Outright.

A match in which we again fielded poorly and although John Austin (30) and Peter Cavanagh (44) gave us some hope, it seemed that the side was determined to put down every catch

that came our way. Our fielding will have to improve vastly if we are to mount a serious challenge for next year's premiership.

Round 11 - Wentworthville-Blacktown - Lost Outright.

Round 12 - Lane Cove I's - Lost 1st Innings.

For personal reasons I was unable to captain the side in the last two matches of the season, however I must say that I believe that the side will do much better next year, if only our fielding is worked on and improved.

We have the basis of a successful side and can be winners when we put our minds to it.

I would like to especially thank Mal Prentis, Mick Stevens and Mick McKerchar for their invaluable help over the season and wish the Club the best of luck for next year.

MANAGER'S REPORT

INTER-VARSITY CRICKET CARNIVAL

UNIVERSITY OF QUEENSLAND 1974/75

Inter-Varsity was hosted by the University of Queensland early in January this year. A total of 8 teams competed, and the eventual winners were University of N.S.W. The Macquarie team was a little short on numbers, but not on team spirit and enthusiasm, and in fact acquitted themselves very favourably for the most part.

In the first match Macquarie dismissed a fairly strong Queensland team for a meagre 129 (G. Hargreaves 3-8) but after losing our first wicket at 34 and our fourth at 81, could only manage 98.

New England walloped us on Tuesday. We wouldn't have beaten them that day if they'd let us bat twice each and given us a substitute for Bleus in the field. They made 196 and we didn't.

The match against the University of N.S.W. was a beauty. Just what limited over games are meant to be about. We batted first and made 9/140 in 36 overs. G. Bleus made a good 26 and B. Roebuck a tremendous 23 including one magnificient 6 on one of the longest grounds in Australia. That meant University of N.S.W. needed 4 runs per over to win, which considering their batting strength seemed more than reasonable. However the Macquarie boys bowled really well - M. Prentis took 2-5 in his first 3 overs, B. Roebuck had figures of 1-28 from 8 really good overs and they were struggling. Finally after 34 overs and 7 lost wickets, New South passed our score to end a really enjoyable game.

The highlight of the week was the tremendous spirit of the team both on and off the field - a factor due in no small part to the influence of our captain, Graeme Bleus, who also did well with the bat and showed good judgement in not attempting to bowl. Another encouraging sign was the form of some of our team who have not as yet played for the Club in Shires. These include Bernie Roebuck, Nev Castle and Mick Gaffney, all of whom will be big assets in the coming season.

The weather, ovals and other facilities in Brisbane were all great; the carnival was well organised and as a result, very successful. Everyone had a great time;

nevertheless, on no occasion did any of the chaps contravene the rather strict behaviour guidelines set down by the Manager. Which just goes to show
