PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The season 1998-99 was one of transition for the club. The stable, and highly effective executive which had existed for the past three seasons decided it was time to move on. This meant the whole executive and the majority of the committee were in their roles for the first time. We weren't helped by the long term absence, due to holidays, of our elected secretary, Glen McFadden. Furthermore, of the seven teams we fielded this year, five of the captains were on debut, and wet weather and the lack of ground availability pre-season meant it was very difficult to keep in touch with the rank and file on a regular basis. This impeded the organisation of social activities and fund raising.

Performance wise we failed to reach the heights of '97-'98. Only the women's team qualified for the semis. On a positive note, we fielded six men's teams, an increase of one from last year. We had an influx of many new young players, several of which made an impact in the higher grades. Hopefully these guys will be long term members and will become the cornerstones of the club. Jay Trevaskis gave his all to the coaching role, and there was a notable increase in the quality of training which was appreciated. Coaching was difficult however, when after Christmas we had poor weather which consistently closed our turf practice wickets. Without doubt, the lack of suitable pre-season and regular training during the season had a severe impact on the club's performances. This should not be a problem in future seasons, as our biggest achievement this year was the construction of two all weather wickets on the main oval. The construction of these wickets means that we can commence pre-season training at the ground significantly earlier than usual, as we will not interfere with Rugby or Aussie Rules matches, and clearly training throughout the season will be less affected by dodgy weather. These practice wickets will not replace the turf wickets, turf will continue to remain our primary training surface, however they will be an invaluable back-up. The cricket club thanks MUSA and Bob Lawton for their co-operation and enthusiasm with this project.

For the first time in several years we named four life-members to the cricket club for their services on and off the field. Congratulations to Dave Webb, Dave Folkard, Dave Budge and Jamie Breden, they join a distinguished list of existing life members.

A disappointing aspect of last season was the general apathy by the members towards contributing to fund raising. Maintaining a cricket club is very expensive, and when you consider that cricket balls alone cost \$3,000 per year, it is obvious we need to become more energetic when it comes to fund raising. Our fees are the cheapest in Shires cricket, and we should not take funding from MUSA for granted. It was clear, that cajoling and hassling members to assist in fund raising does not work, therefore, next season the committee will endeavour to introduce a more rigid policy for fund raising, which will compel members to contribute. Simply, if we can raise more funds, the more fun we can have.

Another area which needs improving is greater assistance in putting the covers down prior to game day and helping around the club on a Saturday afternoon and evening. Once again the committee will be looking to install procedures to make sure these burdens are shared equally.

I would like to thank the usual "suspects" for their help during the year - Webby with equipment, and advice, Toy, Tunza, Adrian Lulka and Phil Esrkin who were not on committee but were always prepared to lend a hand. Thanks also to the rest of the committee, particularly Andrew Slattery, who carried out the Treasurer's role with distinction.

Finally, regardless of the frustration that occurred during the season, Macquarie remains a fantastic club to be a part of, where you can enjoy playing hard competitive cricket in a team that invariably does more than hold its own. Socially it is a place where legends are made, and stories of achievements and conquests are embellished as the years go by, where friendships that are formed, remain for life. So let's all get stuck in and help each other to make the '99-'00 season one to remember.

Finally, I would like to thank my predecessor David Webb, who handed over a very well maintained set of records and a club that was in a very healthy financial position. It should be our aim in the coming season to *all* work together to make the Club's finances even healthier.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - 1st GRADE SHIRES

Prior to doing this report I reflected on my report from last year and can see a number of similarities between the 1997-98 season and the one just completed. Just as there were similarities, there were many differences. Some good, some bad.

The bare facts of the season are as follows. From the fifteen actual rounds we had seven wins, a washout and seven losses which meant we finished ninth, the same position as the previous year. This would suggest a side which was stagnant and not moving forward, but this was not the case. When compared to 1997-98, the 1998-99 season saw some advances in that we were able to beat several sides who beat us the previous season and several sides who finished ahead of us this season. These were Blacktown, Warringah, Holroyd and Bexley. Where we fell down this season is that we lost to the bottom three sides. This suggests that we lifted for the big games and then relaxed against supposedly lesser opposition.

Two games after Christmas the side was holding down a semi-final spot with a top three finish a possibility. However, we lost our final four games, three against bottom of the table opposition. The lessons are clear. There are no easy games in First Grade shires. Six points against poor opposition counts as much as six points against quality opposition. We must improve in this area if we are to be as successful as our ability suggests is possible.

As in the previous year the side was stronger in the bowling department than in batting. Several bowlers turned in good performances with Webby once again the most successful, although he carried injury throughout the season. Nasty was a strong performer with the ball but unfortunately had his season curtailed by injury. Jay, Roundsy and Stuey also turned in good performances with the ball.

On the batting side, our performance was not so good, only twice scoring more than 200. We were carried by some good innings from Nasty and Toy but unfortunately if neither of them contributed a good score we failed to make enough runs to be competitive. Stuey also played a few good knocks, but generally our batting was not of the required standard. I don't believe we lack ability in this department but need to apply ourselves more, especially when the circumstances are difficult. It must also be said that after Christmas the majority of the wickets we played on had been affected by rain and this made batting a difficult exercise.

The side was bolstered by two new regular acquisitions in Stuey and Harry, both of whom should prove to be very useful to the club into the future. It is important that the club continues to find, foster and develop young players to secure the club's future, especially as the Sydney cricket landscape is likely to change over the next few years.

The First Grade side is still on the development path. The talent is within our ranks to be successful but we must find the right combination of talent and application to realise our potential. I think this is true of the club as a whole.

I would like to commend Jay for his work as club coach, which he performed enthusiastically and thoughtfully during the season. Thanks go to the new committee for the work they put in to help us all enjoy our cricket. Once again, Macquarie was a great place to play cricket despite the weather making it hard for ground staff – so thanks to Jock and his team for their efforts.

Let's make next year a better one for the club in all respects.

MATCH REPORTS

v Blacktown 8/130 defeated Blacktown 128

As with last year the first day of the season was washed out and a one-dayer was played at home. Some good bowling had the defending premiers all out in just over half the allocated overs with our new Scottish quickie Michael Richardson taking 3/29. Michael proved to be very entertaining with the ball as he produced a wide variety of deliveries which kept everyone on their toes (this led to the nickname of "Breville" being applied to the genial Scot). Nasty (3/17) and Stuey (2/22) also chipped in with good performances.

Our batting was only ordinary but thanks to a fine (60 not out) by Nasty we managed to sneak home by two wickets. It was good to beat Blacktown after the debacle against them the previous season.

v Auburn 9/320 defeated Auburn 170

This was the best batting performance of the season. Batting first on a seaming wicket a very solid opening stand of 29 between Tubey and Harry blunted a strong new ball attack and gave us the platform to build a good score. Harry batted well for (42) and all batsmen contributed well with Nasty making a tremendous (84), Stuey (24), Neil (32), Toy a powerful (58) and Jay a rapid (33), meaning that a series of good partnerships were built. Unfortunately, this sort of batting effort was not repeated.

When we bowled we were always in control as the opposition could muster only one partnership over 50. Good bowling early on by Webby (3/46), was finished off by Jay (4/45) who polished off the tail with some good, accurate quick bowling. The fielding was also good and we were all confident after a good start to the season.

v South Sydney 165 lost to South Sydney 8/251

We were soon brought back to earth by this encounter with the quality side of the competition (at least on paper) who were eventual finalists. Having won the toss we batted on an even, but slow wicket but were soon in trouble at 3/20. On the strength of some good batting again by Toy (46) and contributions by Neil (29), Nasty (23) and Webby (44) the score became a little more respectable but was never going to be enough.

On the second week conditions were perfect for batting and while we had them 2/17 and 4/86 they were never in serious trouble. Our fielding was poor in this game with several dropped catches and misfields making the task more difficult. There was good bowling from Webby (2/21) and Nasty (3/39) but we were outplayed in all departments of the game, by a side who had at least five former first grade players in their ranks. I cannot let this game pass without reference to the well-flighted off-spin which was displayed to us from Stuey – at least we think it was off-spin!

v Lindfield 175 lost to Lindfield 293

A very poor game in most respects from our point of view. Having had the opposition in trouble at 3/53 we did not bowl or field with enough discipline to apply pressure to a couple of good batsmen. This game featured the best innings of the season by one of the Lindfield players who scored a century well before tea. Another Lindfield player also scored a hundred but was dropped four times. No other Lindfield batsman looked confident against our attack.

When we came to bat we were soon in all sorts of trouble at 5/60 against what can only be described as a pedestrian, but thoughtful attack. Toy again provided the backbone to the innings with a fine knock of (51) and this was typical of a number of good contributions he made during the season. Harry also contributed (32) and Webby (33) to make the score more favourable. The game was lost by a lack of concentration in the field and with our batting.

v Warringah 9/202 defeated Warringah 199

This was a very good win against a tough side who have one of the best bowling sides in the competition. We bowled first and should have rolled them for under 150 as we bowled without accuracy and let a couple of straightforward chances slip by. Roundsy was the pick of the bowlers chipping in with (3/31) and Stuey took (3/53).

When we batted we appeared to be coasting at 3/140. Thanks to a great century stand between Nasty (99) and Stuey (52). This was probably the best partnership of the season on an awkward wicket against good bowling. It was a real shame that Nasty did not get rewarded with his century after a fine knock. The middle order crumbled and it was left to Linus and Budgie to get the last 12 runs to complete the victory.

v Lane Cove 2/104 and 8/105 defeated Lane Cove 103 and 132

While this was a win it could, and should, have been a simple outright against a very poor side. This was undoubtedly the weakest batting side in the competition and we let ourselves down with some more dropped catches which delayed us in our quest for outright points.

On the bowling side Webby (2/28), Nasty (3/23) and Stuey (3/24) all bowled well as did Budgie in his new role as opening bowler. We secured first innings points on day 1 thanks to a hard hitting (31 not out) from Nasty and contributions from Harry (33 not out) and Stuey (25). In their second innings Webby (4/17) and Nasty (3/28) were the best of the bowlers. Chasing 135 of 32 overs in the second innings we slumped to 6/60 and then 8/100, Neil being the best with (30 not out).

This was a disappointing result and could have been a costly miss. However, in the final analysis it did not matter.

v Strathfield 115 lost to Strathfield 8/232

An unfortunate result against Strathfield. After the toss was lost we bowled on the hottest day of the season on a very slow, flat deck. Stuey was out which left us without a spinner and we struggled throughout but did well to have them 8/232 after the 85 overs. The bowling was good from all bowlers but particularly from Roundsy (2/38), Jason (2/31) and Webby (2/43). Roundsy in particular bowled an immaculate line and length.

When we batted it was wet and cloudy. The pitch was damp at both ends which made batting extraordinarily difficult. At one stage we were 6/57 but a good partnership between Neil (41) and Webby (26) made our total a little more respectable.

Unfortunately the game was also notable for the poor exhibition of the umpires. Whilst I don't believe in bagging umpires the lack of consistency in umpiring (especially within the one game) is something which is annoying to all cricketers. On day 1 of this game on a wicket with little deviation, LBW appeals were not considered. On day 2, with the ball seaming about and bouncing at irregular heights, there were five LBW decisions. It is not often that the opposition Captain apologises to you about the number of decisions which went against you.

v Holroyd 245 defeated Holroyd 192

This was a very fine all-round performance. We batted first on a pitch with a bit of movement and made 245 thanks to fine knocks by Nasty (57), Toy (65) and Webby (24 not out) and good partnerships between Nasty and Toy, and also Toy and Webby. Having reached 6/242 the innings finished with Webby helplessly watching a hat trick which featured a great long walk back (Ashley) and Jason padding up to the inswinger – good stuff!

The bowling was good the next week with Nasty (3/43) and Roundsy (3/43) performing well. This was a very good win.

v Hills Wash Out

v Canterbury Bexley 154 defeated Canterbury Bexley 89

This was one of the highlights of the season as we defeated the competition front-runners. We were assisted greatly by winning the toss and bowling on a rain-affected pitch and quickly had the opposition in trouble as all bowlers took advantage of the conditions. Webby (4/14) bowled particularly well along with Budgie (2/23). A notable performance was by stand-in keeper Clyne who took five catches including a great grab off Budgie, despite having a broken toe.

When we batted we were in trouble early (5/43) but another good innings from Toy (52) in partnership (40) with Jay (28) enabled us to win in good fashion. The game was also notable for the freakish collision in our warm-up between Jay and Clyne which saw Clyne with a broken toe. The team was also introduced to the world of frisby during this game and the frisby featured regularly thereafter.

v Pennant Hills 92 lost to Pennant Hills 7/95

This was a game that we should have won against one of the poorer sides in the competition and this, as much as anything else, was the cause of our downfall. This was a one day game following a period of extensive rain which made the toss even more crucial than usual. We batted first on a wicket which had a ridiculous amount of movement and despite getting away to a solid start (35) between Harry and Tube we could only manage 92 (Toy 20) against a moderate attack.

Despite this small score we still had a good chance of winning as the pitch was still providing ample encouragement to the bowlers. A couple of chances went down which was to prove costly and not one of their batsmen was comfortable at any stage. Jay (4/25) was the pick of the bowlers. In addition, Nasty suffered a torn hamstring which affectively finished his season. This was not a game to treasure as a good memory but is a game that we need to learn from if we are to improve as a team.

v Roseville 144 and 8/165 lost to Roseville 6/160 and 4/115

As if the Pennant Hills game wasn't bad enough, the Roseville game confirmed a slump from which we would not recover. Again conditions were damp in terms of a heavy outfield when we batted but we had a reasonable start and were 2/85 at tea. An unaccountable collapse after tea saw us lose 8/35 against a steady attack. Roundsy (32) and Stuey (45) being the main contributors.

We were in the hunt for a while when we bowled but two injuries (Nasty torn hamstring again and Neil dislocated finger) reduced the side to nine, effectively ended the contest. There was an attempt to get an outright result but this ended with neither side within sight of victory. This was again a poor game.

v Burwood 57 lost Burwood 68

Yet another wet game of cricket which was the only game played in first grade for the round. The victory helped Burwood secure top position and ultimately the premiership. As the scores indicate, the conditions were not up to standard for a game of cricket at this level. We bowled first and bowled quite well with Webby (3/10) and Jay (4/22) being the best. Unfortunately we gave away too many sundries (10 out of a score of 68!) and dropped a couple of chances which were also costly.

We were always going to struggle to get this small number against a very steady, if unspectacular, attack. The game would have been won if one batsman could have scored a thirty, but this was not to be, Roundsy (15) being the best. Burwood deserved to win as they bowled with slightly better control and discipline.

v Epping 114 lost to Epping 208 and 5/74

This completed a sad finish to a season which at one stage held great promise. Epping were near the foot of the ladder and this game was against a side we should have beaten easily. We bowled first but dropped at least six catches (one batsman five times) and even against poor opposition this makes winning games of cricket very hard especially in hot conditions, as these were. The bowling also suffered with Roundsy (2/30) being the best along with Jay (2/30). There was a farcical situation when Jason was barred from bowling because of two full tosses above waist high.

Our batting was disgraceful, Stuey scoring (36) was the best. Epping batted a second time and while we performed better we still managed to drop several catches.

It was a disappointing way to end the season but hopefully we can learn from the disappointment of the last four games and improve next year.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - 2nd GRADE SHIRES

Grand Finalists last year, competition also-rans this season. The reasons for this are fairly obvious. Last year there were three batsmen who had three hundred-plus aggregates, this season there was *one*. As a team we made only *four* individual half-centuries. As for our batting main strengths of '97-'98, Brett Cruden, our heaviest scoring batsman from last year did not play, and Clyne Fernandes suffered from injuries, promotion and 'second season syndrome'. The seconds made only *two* scores over two hundred, one of those being barely over two hundred (202) and the other a disappointment as the team felt it should have made three hundred as it was the only home 'road' for the season. In addition to our consistently low scoring, we were often very slow. We had no one who could successfully counter-attack our opponents' new-ball bowling. Because of this the side was under pressure continually.

The bowling was a different story. We were never out-bowled. Our few victories were almost entirely due to our bowlers. They also allowed us to compete in matches where we really had no right to be competitive. We had a varied, tight and well-disciplined attack. Before the start of the season I was sure that if we could hang on to both Jason Young and Dave Smith that we had the basis of a potentially trophy-winning team. Greg Brown was due for return mid-season, and with Slatts as back up, not to mention anyone we might unearth prior to the season, I was feeling confident. My confidence was quickly shaken. Dave was frustratingly hampered by injury after a terrific start to the season and Jason was elevated to the ones on a number of occasions. Despite these setbacks, we were still a good bowling side. The fielding in seconds was generally good and, at times, better than that. Special mention should be made here of Richard Cann. His athleticism, throwing from the out-field and efforts in the field generally, were an inspiration to the rest of the team.

A major element in the make-up of the seconds this year was the introduction of a number of new players. This first season was a tough one for a number of them but as long as we firstly, retain, and then develop their already latent talent, then the club will benefit in the long term. If this occurs then the pain of this season will have been worthwhile. Of the new recruits Phil Holmewood had the most success. Topping the batting averages, taking twelve wickets and pouching some good snares in the field earmark this baby-faced assassin as a player of the future. In retrospect, Chris Russell had quite a fair first-up season. Chris also emerged as a confident catcher in the slips, and we know what an asset to this club that is! Steve Gasser of the multi-coloured hair, and sometimes very little variety, showed glimpses of the ability I'm sure he'll reveal in coming seasons. Like Chris Russell, he was a real asset in the field, with a strong throwing arm, excellent catching ability and that most rare of second grade commodities, mobility. Tim Clough arrived late in the year but of the new players revealed the best batting technique. He also kept wickets quite competently, helping the side when we hit by the loss of our 'regular' keeper through injury, promotion or some other cataclysmic event. Daniel Sleeman enjoyed some fine moments behind the stumps but had problems with availability. When he gains a little more confidence in his stroke-play, he'll also make a big contribution in the batting. Christian Bova had a tough season but has major ability. Shot selection was his major problem area and this can be worked on.

A big thanks to all the second grade 'regulars' and the guys who came up from thirds -Toby, Anthony Hale (no pace!), Justin, Byron, Kenny and Nipper. I really enjoyed this season and everyone's company on Saturday 'arvos even though, result wise, it was a pretty frustrating season. Let's hope we don't feel the same levels next season! Hope to see you all in the coming season.

MATCH REPORTS

v Blacktown 171 lost to Blacktown 5-175

Day one was washed out but the team decided to make the trip to Joe McAleer Oval just to familiarise themselves with the ground and new team members. One team member was in deep shock when informed one new player was born in 1980! We won the toss and batted on a very slow first-game pitch, but with the usual quick out-field. We took too many overs to construct our foundation. At lunch we were *seemingly* well situated at 2-99 but we had chewed into 45 overs. Acceleration came after the break, 72 runs from 15 overs but 171 was still too few on this ground. Terry "Tunza" Dorrell (52) and Daniel "Darren" Sleeman (25) got us off to a season-high start of 80. Clyne was our most fluent player with (33). The placid nature of the pitch completely nullified our pace attack, Folkard picking up (3/33) when the damage had been done, especially by their openers, who put on 114.

v Auburn 145 defeated Auburn 112

A disappointing total built around Tunza's (40) and a vital seventh-wicket stand of 46 between Kenny Dixon (32) and Andrew Slattery (17). We fought back in the final session to have them 5/28 at the close. A leaking cover held us up for a frustrating few hours but when we did get on our bowling was straight and our catching good. Dave "the organ" Smith, (3/23) and second grade debutant Byron Stuart (3/31) were the pick.

v South Sydney 122 and 103 defeated South Sydney 9 dec. 124 and 65

An amazing game and ultimately very enjoyable! I won the toss and we batted on what looked like the traditional Macquarie "belter". Boy, did I get it wrong! Brendan Rounds was the best of our batting (26), caught via-rectum, and Slatts, yet again, chipped in with important runs (25). On a deck still very bowler-friendly we finished the day with Souths at 5/77. Our catching let us down badly, with Jason Young suffering three dropped catches in five overs. Our effort on day two was fantastic. On a much flatter pitch Souths passed our total nine wickets down and immediately declared, Rounds (4/40). The captain's instructions were to get some time in the middle. We were then dismissed for 103 in 39 overs! A target of 102 in 22 overs was very gettable. At 2/49 Souths were looking good but two three-wicket overs changed everything. Our fielding in the last half-hour was inspired. Dave Smith (4/22) broke their middle-order but Jason Young finished the game in real style *with a hat-trick*, the last wicket of which involved a sensational diving catch from Daniel Sleeman. This was a big win, especially against last year's premiers.

v Lindfield 144 lost to Lindfield 251 and 7 /141

On a strange, slowish wicket we had Lindfield 3-53 at one stage but they recovered to 4-177 and at too speedy a rate as far as we were concerned. Two quick wickets just before tea evened it up. Their total of 251 (Folkard 4/56 and Young 3/41) was, we felt, very gettable provided we batted well. We didn't. Apart from Tunza's (45) our batting was terrible. We suffered five lbw decisions. We felt we enjoyed the better of conditions but we didn't 'cash in'. The captain was so impressed with the effort that we went out and fielded for the duration of the match as penance.

v Warringah 110 and 0-79 lost to Warringah 9 dec.116

Probably the most impressive opposition new ball bowling of the season saw our top-order wither to be 3-9 in what seemed no time. Clyne and Eddo had just about turned it round when the innings went into another sharp decline. Again Slatts (34) gave us 'something' to bowl at and, yet again, the bowling kept us alive. At stumps the game was in the balance, Warringah 5-71. Warringah got there, nine down, after a terrific effort in the field. Slatts with (4/34) and Eddo (2/21) took the figures but everyone 'put in'. A potentially dangerous situation was averted by some pugnacious batting by Tube and Tunza. Interestingly enough this seemed to be inspired by some 'mutual admiration' from a frustrated opposition. We saw some fine counter-attacking shots from these two. Warringah wanted to come off early so we finished at four thirty and made our frustrated ways home.

v Lane Cove 273 drew with Lane Cove 9-192

This game was about as frustrating as it gets! For the captain, this wicket brought back memories of 'roads' from the seventies and early eighties. Tube and Tunza continued their good form of the previous innings, this time putting on 43 in nine overs. On a very warm day it was important to build on this start and Toby Duffin (44) and Tube (73) didn't let us down with a season-high stand of just over the ton. We lost some momentum, despite Eddo's (43), but still, at last we had a total to bowl to. Lane Cove had two players who made above ten. In the last thirty overs of the game they scored forty runs. As they made no effort to win the game in the latter stages of their innings, it was important that we took the chances when they came, especially on such a flat track. We didn't. Some players' frustration reflected in the 'verbals' they gave the opposition. This didn't work and was more galling when a catch or two hit the turf. Dave Smith (3/25) gave it everything despite the cartilage damage he did to himself in the warm-up. Jason Young, trying to deal with heart palpitations, took (2/21). Tunza took (2/0) from four. Steve Gasser took two great catches at bat-pad. The pitch was tailor made for an over-the-wrist spinner. We weren't to have one for another two rounds.

v Strathfield 202 and 1-72 defeated Strathfield 104 and 130

Chris Russell (48) was the mainstay of a first innings that never really took control, with Dorrell, Cann, Holmewood and Slattery all making twenties. Our average batting performance was more than made amends for with some great bowling. Phil 'Homer' Holmewood debuted impressively with the ball taking (4/39), Gasser, Slatts and Hale all grabbing a two-fa. The game plan was to see what we could do in the remaining time. Mick Walker took things into his own hands. After playing what was possibly the worst shot /non-shot I've ever seen for this club, his second innings was one of the best short innings the rest of the team could ever witness. On a pitch that had seemed impossible to score quickly on, Mick's 52 not out, three enormous zacs, allowed us to declare after eleven overs, 68 from the last 8, leaving Strathfield to make 170 from twenty-nine overs. At 1-54 from eight, the game was well and truly 'on'. Holmewood followed up his first innings four-fa with another (4/34) and received good support from Slatts (3/63). At nine down and the game beyond them, Strathfield put up the shutters. Slatts pouched a knick at first slip with one ball remaining and we had a welcome ten.

v Holroyd 198 lost to Holroyd 238

We were off to another ordinary start, 3/65, when Chris Russell (64) and Clyne Fernandes (28) came together in some of our best batting of the season. Ten minutes before the break we had worked ourselves into a promising position of 3/155 on a pitch that wasn't entirely flat. A solo-appeal lbw, catch at slip and suicidal run out saw us plummet to six fa just before tea. All the good early repair work which looked like it could / should have lead to a three hundred plus score at the 'stamp' came unstuck. Greg Brown was back, and despite having to bowl at the wrong end (that'll teach you to miss half the season!), kept us in the game with some fine seam bowling. At stumps, Holroyd 4-67 and, you guessed it, the game was 'on'. What can I say about day two! Our fielding fell to pieces under a burning sun, the 'highlight' of which was the captain falling over trying to get under a simple skied catch. Shots went through fielders, under fielders, beside fielders, around fielders, avoided fielders but in spite of all this -Holroyd eight down for 142. When you only make 198 at the 'stamp' you are *never* safe. They passed us eight down. Brownie took (6/84) and Grant Harcourt, a very welcome return, bowled better than (1/50). This really hurt.

v Canterbury-Bexley 179 lost to Canterbury-Bexley 272

A delayed start, a very wet outfield and a lost toss could have been a very dangerous mix, but we did incredibly well. Our major team asset again asserted itself as our bowlers, supported by some fine catching, reduced Canterbury-Bexley to 7-129, Holmewood with three, Brown and Slattery two apiece. They rallied well putting on another 112 without losing any more wickets. We finished off their innings fairly quickly the next day. The pitch would be better, the outfield faster. We just had to get through the new ball period. We didn't. They bowled well with the new ball-Macquarie 3 for 9. Eddo (31) and Brownie (39) tried to counter-attack later in the day but it was too big an assignment over a long period. We had sustained too much damage too early in the innings and that was the game.

v Pennant Hills 182 lost to Pennant Hills 209

If ever one player determined the outcome of a game this was it. This was a limited over game played on the best Pennant Hills pitch I'd seen for a long time. The bowling and fielding given to *ten* of their players was of the highest order on just about the hottest day of the season. Holmewood, Cann, Duffin and Harcourt all made great catches on the day. *Why did we drop the one batsman five times?* Some of the chances were embarrassingly simple. Whatever the reasons, he 'thanked' us one hundred and thirty four times! Harcourt (2/37) bowled very well in the cauldron of the last twenty overs. Maybe the heat was too much or something, but our reply could gain no momentum, we were 23 after 21 overs. Phil Holmewood drove powerfully for (44), Tunza made (32) but we simply ran out of overs and time. It had been quite some years since I had left Pennant Hills on the wrong side of the ledger.

v Roseville 122 and 7-116 lost to Roseville 7 dec.128 and 9-85

Rain all week meant very bowler-friendly conditions by Saturday. A lost toss meant a real challenge after a delayed start. Roseville, for their part, helped us no end by bowling atrociously for the first hour. If we had bowled as poorly I would have yelled the paint off the walls! Tube (27) and Tunza (20) were not separated for the first 16 overs and accumulated 38 in what turned out to be a very satisfactory start. We moved to 1/65 and then proceeded to lose *8 for 32!* Admittedly Roseville tightened up and conditions were not easy but our batting was feeble. Another twenty of more runs and we probably would have got first innings points but that had been the case all year not just this innings. Roseville struggled just as much as we did, Steve Gasser grabbing (4/27). We set a target without really dominating their attack taking 31 overs to amass an 110 run lead, Daniel Sleeman (27) and a vigorous Gasser (25 not out) were the main contributors. The bowling, yet again, was terrific in defending a target. Brownie (5/32) and Harcourt (3/28) should have been the toast of the side after the game, a missed bat-pad chance in the last over frustrating us once more.

v Epping 3 dec. 115 and 101/8 defeated Epping 99 and 132

To reward Richard Cann's fine fielding efforts during the season we decided to make him keeper for this game and he duly responded with snaring three. A disciplined, patient bowling performance limited Epping to under a hundred. Brown, Slattery, Gasser and Folkard all getting two-fas. We obtained six points by day one through a controlled, perfectly timed run-chase. We had 31 overs to reach the target, we never looked in any real trouble. Tube (40) and Homer (26 not out) never gave Epping a look in. Epping fought harder in their second innings but the bowlers still did their jobs. Grant Harcourt looked bound to take no wickets at one stage as he was literally bowling too well for the Epping batsmen but bowled 'badly' enough to finish with (3/34). Missing a few late chances cost us some time and overs and this was to be vital in our second innings' chase. A poor start and a sluggish run-rate, we were 34 after 15 overs, meant we were never in control although Holmewood (48) and Russell (21) put us in with a chance for a while. We had made all the running in the game and had received 26 fewer overs so I was not in the mood to present Epping with a consolation victory especially after the season we had enjoyed.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - 3rd GRADE SHIRES

Overall results in thirds were disappointing, but at the risk of trying to make excuses it is difficult to put together a competitive unit when 31 players pass through the ranks in any one season. This was further exemplified when the team slips started to become consistent through the second half of the season, the results and competitiveness improved remarkably.

This aside there were plenty of positives to come from the season and the most important was that most enjoyed their cricket win, loose or draw. There also was good mix of players who demonstrated youthful energy with promising ability and not so youthful hard heads contributing bulk, experience and tactical input. This mix of old and new hopefully will benefit the club's future as there were some young blokes moving through our ranks with a lot of ability who gained some good experience on turf decks and by watching the older heads handling varying conditions and match situations.

Whilst we were not the best in the competition, I reckon we qualified for the fairest. Whilst having only six LBW decisions going our bowlers way all season, we gave twenty to our opposition. One notable game against South Sydney had 5 in one innings. It was at about this point we realized some of us might have had a batting technique problem on decks that kept low.

Throughout the season most contributed with a good performance or two but we did lack consistency, especially in our batting. I felt our bowling was good as we showed we could bowl teams out for reasonable totals, however rarely did we have a sizable total to defend or bowl to. This aside, notable contributions came from the following:

- Anthony Hale was voted the team's player's player. He had an excellent season with the ball consistently getting 3 and 4 wickets an innings. One great performance realized a return of 6/38 against the then competition leaders Holroyd.
- Justin Newbury was our most consistent batsman with plenty of 30's and 40's. Too often he was left batting with the tail and could not build an innings in a controlled manner. He will benefit in the future with his first season on turf now behind him.
- Paul Chew's (82no) against Roseville was special. He opened the innings and ran out of partners on his way to a certain hundred.
- Toby Duffin's (101no) in the last game finally showed his potential after an indifferent start to the year. Now he knows he can do it he should look forward to a successful 1999/2000 season.
- Allan Mahoney captained the side for the 1st half of the season until family commitments shortened his season. Through this period there was a large turnover of players going through the team which made life difficult. Allan handled it in his usual calm professional manner.
- Jason De Souza at the ripe old age of 16 opened the bowling and demonstrated to all he is a great talent. His careful development both physically and mentally over the next few years will ensure he becomes a player of the future in the higher grades.
- Doug Skipper contributed with all round ability. Player unavailability demonstrated Doug's skill at bowling, batting, wicketkeeping and fielding.
- Whilst by their usual standards Ken Dixon and Bruce Hort had a lean season, their contribution of experience in a young side cannot be understated. Ken's bowling missed official umpires and LBW decisions, but it was as tight as ever, which created opportunities at the other end. Bruce's continual contribution to strategy made the captain's life a lot easier.

In summing up I would like to thank the committee and fellow captain's for their help and support. Don't take me hanging up on you Wick on Friday nights personally, I just didn't go for team changes at the eleventh hour too much. See you all next season.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 4th GRADE SHIRES

This season was one of rebuilding for the future and in that sense was most promising and thus gratifying. Hardly a player from the previous season took the field and indeed perhaps most of the players were entirely new to the grade or the club. Many were young and for the first time since coaching junior teams I was regularly dealing with the mums and dads of players, who provided the valuable support off the field, which the club desperately needs, but has usually lacked.

Despite our inexperience, we were the best performing male team in the club throughout the season, with 6 wins, 5 losses, 3 draws & 1 bye. With an enjoyable and mutually supportive approach to our game, the team pulled together in victory and adversity. Without official umpires and thus dependent upon the honesty and fair play of each side, such conduct strikes at the very heart of our competition. It is disappointing, that the SCA Committee of Management did not see the importance of the task assigned to them, originally purporting to deal with our protest in just 5 minutes after spending 2&1/2 hours on a technical 1st grade protest, then leaving a final decision to the last round. But after 3 meetings forced upon them, numerous letters explaining the situation and representations continuing even now, the message does seem to be seeping through and if our suggestions are followed, a reliable protest system and a better competition may result.

Thanks go to all the players, mums and dads and committee members, who provided good cheer and 100% support, commitment and enthusiasm throughout the season. Numerous players and our Club President, Craig Edwards (from Canberra) took time off and travelled far to attend the SCA meetings, Adrian Lulka travelled from Port Macquarie and back and Darren Bull came from Bathurst to avoid missing a game. Phil Erskine kept putting down and taking off our covers even after a temporary slump in form saw him dropped from the side. Mark Hughes kept our statistics up-to-date, so we could see how each of us was performing. And 5th grade kept coming up with players at the last minute to fill in or stay as required, despite the difficulty of transferring from the local competition to M&S conditions.

MATCH REPORTS

v Blacktown 241 defeated Blacktown 231

The first day of the season was washed out and although the fields were too wet for serious play, it was encouraging to see a full turn out for an impromptu 4th grade practice session on the main oval; a good way to get to know each other. The following week the early start before daylight saving so far from home further tested the enthusiasm of the side.

Sent in on a green wicket Beard (17) and Wolfson (18) steadied a shaky start and with their loss in quick succession the two new and youngest players, De Souza (27) and Lulka (22) pushed the score from 55 to 99. Skipper (92) replaced Lulka and immediately increased the scoring rate by lofting the bowlers to all parts of the ground with surprising early season confidence.

With 4 overs remaining J.Ford came on the field, not to bat (of course!), but to query why a bowler had exceeded the 12 over limit. After consulting the book, it was agreed, that the rule applied and Blacktown apparently thought they'd forfeited; allowing 31 runs off the last overs to have us 7 for 239. In the interval phone calls revealed not even the Association could decipher whether the rule applied, but amongst growing acrimony (just the thing for a first-time captain) it was agreed, that we would play the rule with the exception of one bowler per team.

Wolfson (1-47) bowled a tight line from the start and De Souza (2-39) coming on first change immediately took a wicket (his first of many for the Club) and kept pressure on the batsmen. The removal of the opening bats by 45 gave us heart, but Blacktown's number 3 and 4 scored steadily to 123, when we struck back with two quick wickets, Lulka's break-through being his well-deserved first for the Club. However their numbers 3 and 6 scored steadily and at 4 for 223 with 17 overs to go our chances were fading fast. The 16 year old debutante, De Souza made the breakthrough with help from Skipper, who took 3 catches in all. Enter the previously wayward opening bowler Chesson, brought on for his second spell because he had to leave early for work. After 6 overs for 25, the next set of 4 overs could not be more contrasting: 4 for 6. Blacktown's batting collapsed, losing 6 wickets for 8 runs and the game. A great escape, but one well deserved by a side, that stuck to its task, supported its bowlers and took the chances, when they finally came.

v Auburn 7 dec. 302 drew with Auburn

On a hot day the Gwilliam pitch looked like hard-baked flat clay; but somehow a blade of grass must have survived to lodge firmly in the Auburn captain's eye. He won the toss and I had to ask him to repeat his decision, which was to bowl! 302 runs later with 3 wickets remaining he probably regretted the decision, but I was a little disappointed a good start (2 for 220) was not fully capitalised upon. Jurd (64) started the run-feast, followed by Burchett (87) showing his weakness to the full-toss once again, and Wolfson (66) tragically run-out in an attempt to keep the score ticking over. With the opposition utterly despondent, every ball could be pushed for an easy single interspersed with boundaries. But the middle order appeared too intent on big hitting, which while being spectacular, regularly lost wickets and kept the run rate down to 5 off each of the last 20 overs. 350 was a real possibility, nonetheless 302 was a good all-round effort.

On day 2 overnight and morning rain seeped through the covers and hasty removal of the covers before all had arrived to assist served to supply the square with yet more water. Nevertheless after 2 hours of sun it was not the moisture, which caused Jock to refuse to release the ground, but the drying of the rolled mud into a moonscape of curled-up "platelets". It was agreed, that the pitch was dangerous and we were the only match called off in the round; a costly loss of points. Despite 302 runs, we were glad not to be playing on the Gwilliam pitch next week.

v South Sydney 241 lost to South Sydney 8/266

An important game against one of the top sides, which might well have been won if not for a first breach of team discipline as our number 3 bat and opening bowler, Wolfson failed to tell anyone he was going to a hastily-called wedding. Even if he was the groom and she was about to give birth, no excuses would be acceptable (I played the round of my wedding; & scored!).

Winning the toss we batted and after a cameo (16) by Cearns, Burchett (54), Beard (9) and Hook (26) gradually turned a sharp attack to reach 3 for 147. Newbury (55) and Lulka (50) capitalised on the good start with the type of pressure scoring missing from the last round. But the second half of the order, all playing up a place for the missing batsman, failed to provide the support needed. Ultimately a competitive 241 was posted on the pitch firsts and seconds had failed to exceed 200 on in previous weeks, but with Wolfson "out absent" with 3.3 overs remaining in the day the chance to make a really threatening score was lost.

Day 2 saw half the team overcome with a lack of discipline, failing to turn up until immediately prior to the start, causing spectators to be pressed into old whites in readiness to take the field. Chesson (0-46) opened, where he left off, swinging the ball sharply at pace, but without luck. Wolfson (3-77) tried hard to make up for his previous week's indiscretion, bowling tightly and finally breaking through (at 55) with 3 wickets in steady succession after a solid start by South's openers. With another wicket from the spin of Hook (2-47), Souths were looking precarious at 4 for 96. But a partnership of 54 swung the pendulum back their way, finally broken by Blackman (1-16).

Blackman's introduction was unfortunately delayed by his indifferent fielding, but from his first 5 hostile overs just 3 runs were scored at the cost of several chances. Ironically he and the rest of the bowlers were let down by a spate of poor fielding. With such help Souths survived with a further 67 run partnership, giving them a strong position at 6 for 217, after Hook clawed another wicket with consistent line and length.

Debut spin from Beard (1-0 off 2) grabbed a last chance wicket at 7-231 with only bowlers left at bat. But powerful tail-end hitting and another dropped chance saw Souths over the line only to lose another wicket immediately thereafter to the very part-time spin of Burchett (1-20 off 2). A close match, in which we showed we could match the best in batting and bowling, but let ourselves down with a lack of discipline on and off the field. Twenty to thirty more runs from our bats or less from theirs would have been very useful and very achievable.

v Lindfield 7/245 defeated Lindfield 241

After the previous game's disappointment (and the captain's first dummy-spit) a strong showing was required and the team rose to the occasion. Everyone arrived on time ready to play and the captain responded by sending the opposition in to bat on a flat wicket. Steady opening spells from Hale (1 for 68) and Wolfson (1 for 22) were unrewarded and after Halfnights (1 for 22) broke through, then broke down, a score of 1 for 112 was looking ominous. But sustained pressure from all bowlers, safely supported by the field, slowly turned the innings our way. Hook (4 for 61) cut the heart out of the batting, while Lulka (1 for 22) and Payne (2 for 40) tied them down at the other end. Ironically we left the field confident of passing our losing score the previous game, however discretion was applied as the clouds moved in on our openers and we decided to wait till next week.

The chase started in spectacular fashion as newcomer, Phil Lenard (38) renewed his acquaintance with the bat by opening up. Dogged innings by Burchett (37) and Payne (34) were followed by relaxed stroke-making from Erskine (65); a stand-out performance by him, which left us all bewildered by the rest of his season. A couple of unnecessary wickets at the end failed to take the gloss off a solid, well-paced win with 4 overs and 3 wickets in hand.

v Warringah 166 lost to Warringah 188

A largely makeshift side was required through disappointing unavailabilities to meet one of the two sides vying for top spot and we fell just short.

Beginning to wonder whether the spirit of "Captain Greentop" had returned, another toss was won and the opposition were again asked to bat, on a moist wicket. Blackman (3 for 34) and Lulka (3 for 40) used the conditions to great advantage keeping the ball up; Blackman seaming and sharply rearing up at the opposition, while Lulka swung, lured and baffled them. Three quick wickets saw the middle order respond with powerful hitting, but sharp work by Hughes filling in (we thought) as keeper removed the steadfast opener, while a rock-solid stinging catch by Erskine off Hook (3 for 41) removed the pacesetter. Stolid middle-lower order batting got them to 7 for 176 with the makeshift side holding firm in the field and making hard work of every run. Finally Blackman and further smart work from Hughes and Hook cleaned up the tail to finish off a bowling and fielding performance to encourage us for many games to come.

With the pitch still moist and Warringah smarting from the loss of a batting line up, that the previous week had humiliated a lesser team, Cearns (22) and Faure-Brac (38), opening for the first time, were fully tested for 22 overs, but remained unbeaten with 45 on the board at the end of one of our best days of the season.

On the second day both teams arrived believing the game was won and lost; unfortunately ours arrived a long time after theirs and the lack of discipline carried over into our batting. Both openers fell at 67 and thereafter only Lulka (31) put his head down to make a fight of it with the stragglers. Warringah never gave up and turned us around from 4 for 144 (with just 44 to win) to be all out for 166; an abject lesson, that a game is not over, until it is won. It was also a lesson about commitment required from all players, who were unavailable and left us short.

v Lane Cove 115 and 0/112 lost to Lane Cove 234

At the toss Lane Cove had nine players and their Captain asked to delay exchange of team sheets with the excuse, that he didn't know the names of his players yet to come. At this point the SCA committee suggests we by implication consented to the tactics subsequently employed by the opposition amounting to the use of an interchange bench of batsmen, bowlers or fielders and should have refused to play (although we are not entitled to do so, unless the refusal to exchange teamsheets is known to be deliberate).

Lane Cove won the toss and elected to bat. Soon thereafter the delinquent two players arrived, but further requests for a teamsheet throughout the innings were met with further excuses. Surprisingly for a team humiliated in all previous games, Lane Cove had a batsman, who after a half-chance on next to nothing, despatched our reinforced bowling attack for 145. His opening partner scratched around with great luck for 36 and the rest of their team collapsed for another 36. Bull finished with impressive figures of (3 for 6), but apart from the one good wicket, deservedly taken by Lulka (2 for 29), the bowlers hardly stretched.

At nine down for more than twice their previous top score, with a "batsman" padded up, Lane Cove chose to "declare" and as we reached the scorers we were told he was a sub, with another player to arrive next week (a bowler perhaps?). Despite being warned of the possibility of a protest, if the mystery player was to bowl, no team sheet was produced. Stunned, that a side 9/10ths a shambles could have a score worth considering, the loss of Cearns for 0 ended a deplorable day.

The second day began as bewilderingly as the first with Lane Cove again missing players and with different faces taking the field in place of the century-maker and another bat, as if entitled. A solid opening of 45 from Miller (11) and Burchett (32) went unsupported and with the departure of our captain, the phantom 11th man began to bowl despite complaints and took five of the next six wickets to leave us well short of the target. Invited to bat again, Miller (52no) and Hughes (50no) restored some pride with an unbeaten opening of 112, showing, that even against ring-ins, we should have been able to win. If we were to seriously consider ourselves premierships contenders and the fact, that we had to rely on the protest right to the last round, suggested we were not.

v Strathfield 7/283 defeated Strathfield 221

Winning the toss gave our batting the chance to redcm itself further from the embarrassment of the previous game and without the pressure of a run-chase the side batted steadily around a fine anchor role played by Payne (92 not out). Solid support was provided by all with a cameo devil-may-care knock at

the end by Pathinatie (32). However again it was a concern, that so many starts did not proceed to higher individual scores with too much emphasis on big-hitting, rather than steady compilation of runs.

A wet pitch delayed the start of the second day, although Strathfield, to their credit, were keen to start and minimise loss of time. However their anxiety was increased soon after the start of their innings with Wolfson (3 for 30) and Chesson (1 for 26) bowling with precision despite savage swing and explosion off the pitch. Bull (1 for 19) and Payne (0 for 51) kept up the pressure, which finally cracked open the innings with Lulka's deceptive change of pace (3 for 43). At 4 for 45 the Strathfield innings was badly behind the run and wicket rates and a brief middle order revival was snuffed out by the return of Wolfson and Chesson. We were always in control and finished with plenty in reserve, even if a little assisted by the conditions.

v Holroyd 238 lost to Holroyd 246

A disappointing return to ill-disciplined batting and loose bowling in the face of inferior opposition and again a bitter taste left by the antics of the opposition and officialdom.

With our opponents vying with Lane Cove for most often humiliated team status, I won the toss and again in the shoes of "Captain Greentop" sent them in. And at 2 for 190 I began to wonder whether anyone should ever take the opposition for granted. But really a brilliant return to form by the opposition captain (a former first grader of many years) was assisted by some wild early bowling. Fortunately we discovered in desperation a new off-spinner in young Miller (3 for 41) and behind his removal of the dangermen, an awesomely accurate second spell by Byron Stuart (5 for 25) redeemed the innings. Indeed the innings collapsed so abruptly, that another 42 runs could be scored in the day by us for the loss of Miller's wicket thrown away attempting yet another audacious shot, better left for the same time on day two.

The second day began with more surprises for the team with the hide to be led by a barrister; the pitch had miraculously moved from the dirty, flat side to the opposite grassy and moist side of the square. Of course without yet receiving the benefit of the SCA committee's recommendation to avoid playing cricket whenever possible, we agreed to play, under protest yet again.

An innocuous attack was promptly despatched for the second time in the match as Hughes (79) and Payne (63) relished the extra bounce in the pitch. However the loss of both their wickets in quick succession saw us tumble from 3 for 184 to all out for 238, as the following batsmen failed to respect the bowling on a wicket, that continued to allow movement off the seam and required tight technique to the end. Once again we lowered ourselves to the standard of the opposition, rather than maintaining a consistent performance, despite the desire for rapid and spectacular success.

Our protest was pursued in this case to obtain an explanation for the switch of wickets, which was always likely to be just a mistake by the groundsman as asserted by Holroyd, but also to require a home-club to take responsibility for ensuring the playing conditions provided by it are fair, are seen to be fair and do not arouse suspicion of an attempt to obtain an unfair advantage. The response of the SCA committee to refuse to hear a protest over a breach of playing conditions in the face of a dispute as to whether it was a disadvantage, is simply, in the words of the Chairman himself: "a cop-out".

v Canterbury Bexley 84 lost to Canterbury Bexley 3/85

A return to the diabolical, ever-changing Gwilliam pitch, where the loss of the toss proved the loss of the game. After initially brave resistance from Cearns (8) in particular facing awful popping, jagged deliveries of real pace and an opening stand with Burchett (30) of 45, the team wilted at the onslaught to be all out for 84; our lowest total, yet by no means our worst performance considering the condition of the pitch.

Stuart (2 for 16) and Wolfson (1 for 38) gave us real hope at the start of the Canterbury - Bexley innings with an awesome display of venomous bowling, sending them scurrying for cover at 3 for 13. However several lucky escapes, some generous umpiring and extremely tentative batting saw them through the last of the devils in the pitch and strong supporting bowling from Lulka and Bull as they managed to struggle past our meagre total.

The Canterbury - Bexley the skipper's magnanimous comment after winning with only 3 wickets down was nonetheless, that our bowling was the best in the competition, including his own. If only he had faced it first!

v Pennant Hills 191 defeated Pennant Hills 177

A convincing all-round team effort, which belied the close score line.

Finding my double-headed coin again I chose to bat first on yet another inscrutable Gwilliam pitch. The decision confirmed that playing on a pitch for almost 20 years doesn't mean you know it, as even the wayward Pennant Hills bowling leapt off the seam early in the day. Our scratchy start was propped up by another gutsy opening effort by Cearns (27) and followed by a watchful upper-middle order of Hughes (18), Wolfson (17), Jurd (19) and Miller (31). Unfortunately no-one was likely to get more than a start in the conditions and we were fortunate to have the opposition supply us with our top-scorer, Mr. Sundries (54).

Stuart (3 for 35) and Wolfson (0 for 29) soon again set the opposition on their heels, despite the very much improved batting conditions. Bull (3 for 26) followed the early despatch of the openers with 3 quick and miserly wickets, leaving the suicidal Pennant Hills captain marooned at the wicket chancing his luck and our patience with every second, fourth and sixth ball (and cursing our bowlers the rest of the over!). Fittingly the target of much of this mouth with a bat, his former team-mate, Lulka (3 for 31) silenced him and then proceeded to snuff out a late rally from the tail end with the support of the return of Stuart.

v Roseville 215 defeated Roseville 95 and 5/166

A thrashing victory to remind ourselves and all the contenders what we could do, if we made the semi-finals. Ironically our biggest win was against the side to take the last spot ahead of us.

A damp pitch was no concern for the Roseville team brimming with confidence and bragging of recent wins. Sent in again by Captain Greentop, their smiles quickly evaporated as Gus Hook ran out no.1 for a duck and Byron (3 for 31) shattered the other opener's stumps without either bat touching a ball in his first 4 overs. Coming off consecutive big scores (as they hastily told us) bemused batsmen swung vainly at the air as if the ball had vanished after it left the bowler's hand. Wolfson (1 for 24) again bowled hard, straight and giving away nothing, but with little luck. Bull (2 for 25) continued the drip-feed, until in frustration they hit out. Responding to a 14 run over Darren showed how far he has matured this season by taking 2 wickets for 2 runs off the next 2 overs.

When Byron was replaced by Lulka (2 for 8 off 8), the Roseville players looked visibly relieved, but soon gave up hope of a respite as the ball hardly left the wicket square and every time they hit in the air, it was safely caught (7 sharp catches, no fumbles). Wolfson returned to take a wicket and then showed Roseville how to score runs; the snick over slips being particularly favoured. As Byron returned to efficiently clean up the tail, our fifth bowler, Payne, took 1 for 1 off 3 overs. An innings totally dominated by Macquarie and wrapped up in 2 hours.

Roseville rallied with the thought of redeeming themselves in the second session, but were unaware of the speciality of our openers, Cearns (41) and Faure-Brac (57) of batting out the day. Having practised this feat at Warringah, they took the first innings points without loss of a wicket, despite an unrelenting attack. Unfortunately the day was extended to 7pm for the late start and we lost their wickets and another in the fading light to be 3 for 121 at stumps. This day was the highlight of the season.

The second day revealed a very different, hot and hard wicket. Trusting the word of Roseville's secretary of the SCA, that our Lane Cove protest was uncontested and accepted by the Committee, we assumed they needed to force a win to keep us out of the finals. Consequently we batted on for another 20 overs, losing wickets in pushing the pace with Burchett (58) and Hughes (17) anchoring the innings. In Roseville's second innings Stuart (1 for 31) again got an early break, but dogged batting from the start on what became a belter of a wicket prevented any real chance of an outright. Had we known not to trust the SCA, the chance of an immediate declaration might have seen a different result.

v Epping 8/145 defeated Epping 144 and 3/93

After a washout the week before and news of the loss of our Holroyd protest, we needed an outright to make the finals, if Roseville won first innings and we obtained the promised points from Lane Cove. But first innings alone would do, if Lindfield and Roseville lost.

Epping were a side of children supervised by grandparents, who had lost games and, it seemed, players regularly. To maximise the chance of an outright, we had to send them in and results were immediate. A fiery start from Sweeney (1 for 22), relishing the new ball, blasted out the first opener and scared the other into a suicide run. But with Sweeney and Stuart (2 for 22) too good to be nicked, Payne (2 for 28) came on and took their first drop for 0. Lulka (1 for 40) took another wicket in his first over and Epping were wilting fast. However their old timers rallied to the task of self-preservation, if not scoring runs, and managed to delay the inevitable for 55 valuable overs. With 30 overs to play we needed to make a good start on getting the runs and briefly looked like getting it until Cearns (10) and Jurd (12) fell to over-ambitious shots. Burchett (26) steadied until making the same mistake and it was left to our youngest, Miller (24) to calm the nerves. Two further wickets were then thrown away to the "LBW" and the swing respectively of the season to have us shaky at stumps on 5 for 63.

During the week our Lane Cove protest was finally "determined" by the committee and consequently we had to get an outright to have any chance, although Roseville looked like getting one themselves and robbing us. Epping's wily skipper offered to make a game of it, if we threw the bat, but threatened to close shop if we dragged it out. That pressure once again broke a promising start by Lulka (9) and Miller, with Erskine (0) following. But old experienced hands put their heads down with the ever reliable Hughes (25 not out) and the rediscovered batsman in Hook (28 not out) taking us from 8 for 94 to the win. However with 45 overs to play, we would need to blast Epping's second innings out of the trenches.

Stuart (1 for 5 off 7) again got the early break, but with Sweeney (0 for 8 off 5) bowling skyrockets, they were both too good to get the edge. Quick changes saw Epping get behind Miller's offies, as if they were ticking and only Burchett's (1 for 29 off 5) trash brought them out of their shell briefly. An anti-climactic end to the season (even if I did love hitting Kightley's stumps!).
