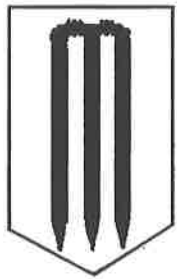

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Season 1995/96 has shown that Macquarie University is one of the strongest cricket clubs in the Sydney Shires competition, winning the First Grade Premiership for the first time. Macquarie Uni is the only club to have won a premiership in each of the four grades and a club championship in Shires cricket over the last six years and one of only three clubs to win all five trophies in the last ten years.

Congratulations to Tony and the rest of the team on their performance in winning the First Grade R.B. Clark Trophy for the first time. PREMIERS!!! Season 1995/96 was the accumulation of hard work started by Greg Gavin in 1990/91 and continued by Tony Monaghan in making the cricket club one of the most successful clubs at the university. I don't think too many other clubs within the university can boast a record of seven different premiership and championship trophies in six seasons!

The Women's side continued with a great effort in 95/96, moving up another grade into Third Grade. They finished fifth, just missing out on a semi-final spot. Mike Carter joined the club as the coach of the women's team. Mike has been a great acquisition to the club having coached successfully in Women's First Grade cricket.

The stand-out performance in 95/96 was David Webb in winning his fourth straight M.R. Gwilliam Shield. Who can stop this man! David took the second most wickets (67) in the First Grade competition and finished third in the Shires Player of the Year. Bruce Hort took the most fielding catches (14) in Second Grade and Simon Burchett scored the most runs (450) in the Fourth Grade competition. Congratulations to all three on their achievements.

I would like to thank our President David Folkard and Treasurer David Budge for their hard work and support during 95/96 and look forward to working closely with both again in 96/97. I would like to thank David Webb for ensuring that each team had a full kit during the season and to Jason Ford for putting the cricket club on "the net", the first team in NSW to be on the internet.

A number of players finished their careers at the end of 95/96. Barry Brien moved to Leeton after being a big part of the club over the years. Doug Latto, who has been Fourth Grade captain for a number of seasons, playing more than a 100 games for the club and captaining the premiership winning Fourth Grade in 1993-94, retired. His leadership will surely be missed.

Season 1995/96 has been the most challenging and rewarding for me so far with the expectations of season 1996/97 being even bigger and better for the club. The club will host the biggest, and hopefully the best, Shires 7's tournament in recent years in 96/97. There will be a possible addition of another women's side to the club taking the number of sides to seven. A big social calendar is also planned.

As season 1996/97 approaches I encourage all members of the cricket club to play an active role in the club not just on the field but off the field. Get involved in the social activities and the future planning of the club. What you put in is what you will get from the club. I am looking forward to serving another year as secretary.

We WON, we're the CHAMPIONS, we're the PREMIERS, get out of our WAY!

We did it the hard way. We did it!

We tried to self-destruct with three straight losses from 1st place, in rounds 11, 12 and 13. We picked ourselves up.

We snuck into the semis from 5th. We dominated the finals.

We're the team who won Macquarie's first First Grade premiership. We deserve it.

What was it Gavo wrote three years ago, in this same publication?

"Oh but for one big hit"?.... Well!

No one... was hitting our bowling in the semis and final. Webb and Notaras are still keeping Holroyd awake!!

The last six years have been tremendous years for us. The Club Championship, along with consecutive B, D, C grades and now A grade / 1st grade, and the Women's two premierships in 5th and 4th grades.

We needed to win, just to get all the gloaters off our backs! The Presentation night was a great thrill for Gavo and I to lift the Cup to the Club. What a tremendous effort from this Club!

It was a record breaking season!

First of course we broke the 1st grade premiership duck. But individuals broke records too.

"Webby" - David Webb - 67 wickets, included 3 x 10-wickets-in-a-match and 4 x 5-wickets in an innings performances.

"Linus" - Glen McFadden - 33 dismissals (32+1) from only 9 games as keeper.

Other performances stand out as well.

"Nasty" - Paul Notaras - available only from round 6 - gave us an all-round performance not equalled in the competition.

"Toy" - Jamie Breden - promoted to the critical No. 3 spot made 500 for the year, monstered the ball and took the most catches in the field, including 5 in the final.

"Wick" - 250 wickets in all grades and 200 wickets in 1st grade, "Budgie" / "Nasty" 100 wickets in 1st grade, "Dermie" 100 wickets for the club, "Brownie", 100 games and 2000 runs for the Club.

Thanks for contributions through the year to:

- Phil Lenard, "Slats", Col Kendall, "Horty", "Smithy", "Wolfie" and Dave Broadfield all played games with us and helped us to victories.

- the lower grade skippers for their support and their tireless commitment to the club.

- Jock and his staff for the fine practice and centre wickets - and for the Saturday work that helped us get on in difficult weather.

- Lizzie, Steph, Monika, Kim, Vicki, Frank, Amanda, Sue and Jessica who all supported us.

- everyone who turned up at the finals to watch us win and drink our champagne and beer.

To THE TEAM itself, thanks for your commitment, loyalty and enthusiasm. To Webby as Vice-Captain, and all the players who at some time offered suggestions and ideas, the premiership is a great team effort, and tribute to our desire to win. It's just great to finish a season this way!

The Season:

We lived in the top four most of the season, held the lead for four games around Christmas, slumped to 6th with two rounds to go, but clawed our way back to take 4th by 6 points - a clear margin!

It was nevertheless a nervous last few weeks. To be dependent on other results at the end was unnerving and would have made for a long, cold winter. I may even have whispered to Ken Dixon

that "that may well be it", after our third loss in a row dropped us to 6th, two rounds to play, with Strathfield in 5th position facing easy games. It was depressing at the time, but to our credit, we stood up and stayed focussed, making sure we still did all we could do.

We could have looked back and cursed how our two washouts were at home in one-dayers against lowly placed sides - how we only played 5 games at home all year - how we got some bad decisions - how we dropped our bundle from time to time.

Some players struggled with form, but never threw it in. Others didn't get the chances they hoped for, and might reasonably have expected. Opposition innings rarely lasted a whole day, meaning we didn't use all our bowlers. Blame Webby and Notaras. Mind you, it also affected batsmen who had frequent, awkward sessions to face at day's end, or quick run chases..... the trials of winning. Thank-you to those players.

The only useful way to play is forward. Several things went our way.

We beat the reigning premiers Canterbury outright in the last over in round 2, Auburn, round 3, just ahead of the rain at tea, Epping round 5 through heavy rain, 8 down and 30 runs to get. We lost 4 of the first 5 tosses, but then won *all* the rest, 10 straight. The move to play Linus as opening bat worked, Toy at 3 and Edo at 6 all worked. Budgie at 10 then 9, then 8, and as pinch-hitter, was a revelation!

We must have learned to play better on poorer pitches. We had a team to do it - straight, accurate bowlers (sorry Wick!) and batsmen who belted the ball - in particular Toy, Nast, Budgie and Edo who hit the ball out of the ground consistently.

After the semi, Lindfield congratulated us, acknowledging that we wanted to win more than they did. We had learned how short blackouts hurt us during the rounds- Lindfield, Holroyd, Lane Cove, Blacktown, Bexley all contained periods of one hour or less where we just played terribly to lose or nearly lose the game. We clawed our way back in 3 of these.

We also learned how one blistering hour can melt an opposition: Toy v Canterbury, Webby v Penno, Budgie/ Mono v Lane Cove, Wick v Lindfield, and Webby/ Nast v Holroyd. We really wanted to do it!!

A *first* premiership means more than any other - it's the premiership other clubs remember - and it's for all the players who have tried over the years, and who watch players they played with step up now - the likes of Horty, Legs, Ivan, Al Mahoney, Grizzle, Gavvo, Murph, and Phantom, who have all put in to win it in seasons past.

There was a strong mythology surrounding our recent, failed finals attempts, the legends of semis and finals:

- how a Lindfield semi was washed out in '91, when we had 280 on the board;
- how we got spanked by Roseville in another semi in '92, and then they batted some more;
- how Lindfield beat us by 5 in the final of '93;
- how the covers were dodgy;
- how everyone saw Daly's arm ball except Toy, whose valiant 41 was not enough, how the ump got it wrong;
- how Budgie didn't quite hit it hard enough.

Then we missed the finals of '94 while we rebuilt after losing Gavvo, Nasty, Edo and then Phantom the year after;

Then we lost to Holroyd in '95 - our middle order collapsed, I dropped Curtis, the ump was blind... and so it goes.... And so it will now stop - overtaken by newer, better stories.

You will notice the detail in the match reports, largely copies of the newsletters written by each of the players during the year - let no-one forget the legends and the stories that go with this premiership.

With nothing to play for except PRIDE on day two, we collected some time in the middle (as Wick would say - repeatedly) and at the end of the day had stolidly collected 7 for 168 (Webby 30, Toy 31, Col 21, Brownie 23). In fact, Budgie, Brownie and Derm all "threw their wickets away". After all Holroyd's bowling, they caught brilliantly at the end. By that time though we were 170 and out of reach with 290 in the lead.

Nast was our most valuable player of the finals - he valued his wicket each time he batted and was "the man" who mastered the leggies. He took critical wickets and intimidated the opposition with his determination.

They batted, but it was futile - 290 off 24 overs. CAPTAIN'S REPORT - "3rd Grade" Shires

He, Damian Roberts and Jon Shwabsky had excellent seasons and all are ready to play Second Grade. Shwabsky in particular had a fine season taking over 30 wickets in 9 games. Our bowlers were certainly lucky to have the likes of Paul Morosin and Ben Bradley in the field. Both took many fine catches throughout the year. With the bat, Richard Mather stood alone showing the type of discipline needed, culminating in an excellent century against Warringah on a wet wicket. He was also an excellent source of advice in the field. Dave Richardson and Matt Goddard were excellent finds and hopefully we can get them to play all season next year. They, together with Morosin and Vella, are all capable of scoring many more runs than they did this year.

Finally, I would like to thank my players for what was still a most enjoyable season. We enjoyed excellent team spirit and looked forward to Saturdays - both for cricket and the frequent games of "golf". Cricketers have always enjoyed golf and no where was this more evident than in Third Grade this year.

I am looking forward to next season and hope that all Third Graders share with me a strong desire to improve both personal and team results.
