PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Season 2005/06 was one of vast contrasts for MUCC. From outstanding on-field performances across most of the grades, highlighted by our first Shires premiership in 10 years, to a troubled relationship with Macquarie University Sports and Recreation (MUSR), it certainly was a season of highs and lows. However, looking back at the year that was, I am certain that these experiences can only help in making MUCC a better place to play cricket in the seasons to come.

From an 'off-field' point of view, the season was unfortunately one where a lot of energy was expended dealing with a number of issues with our parent body, MUSR. Central to these was the change in the Cricket Club constitution. This issue cumulated in an Extraordinary General Meeting in January following the astonishing threatened shut-down of the Cricket Club by MUSR. Here, a motion of initiating legal action against MUSR to prevent it closing the Cricket Club was proposed, but failed to carry in a very close vote by the Cricket Club members. With a subsequent motion then passed to adopt the new MUSR Club Constitution, cricket survived at Macquarie University.

Some hard work since by representatives from both organisations have gone a long way to bridging the gap that remained between us. Season 2006/07 will require our administration to be focused on ensuring a respectful and productive working relationship with MUSR continues to evolve.

Now, to the on-field efforts, and what a great turn-around for a club which has at times struggled to be competitive in past seasons. 2005/06 saw 5 of our 8 teams play finals cricket, with 1st grade missing out by the smallest of margins. The stand-out of course, was the tremendous efforts of the 4th grade team. Captained by Paul McInnes, the boys lost only one game all season and went on to claim our first Shires Premiership in 10 years with a dominant performance in the final. Congratulations also to 5th and 6th Grade, who finished in the top 4 of their competitions, while the 24's made the qualifying final. 3rd grade, for the 4th consecutive season, made the finals before a dramatic semi-final batting collapse ended their season. These results saw us improve from 10th to 6th (out of 14) in the Club Championship - a great effort and a terrific launching pad for season 2006/07.

Individually, congratulations to new recruit Kris Griffiths-Jones, who won the Gwilliam Shield in his first season at the club. Well done to Warren Montford, who was justly awarded the Ivan Blyth Memorial Clubman of the Year for the tremendous assistance he provided within the committee and to the club in general. Tim Spencer (Mahony-Folkard Rookie of the Year), Paul Chapman (Most Improved), and Chris Anstiss (Greg Gavin Fielding Award) were recognised for their outstanding efforts during season 2005/06. Warm congratulations also to Steve O'Reilly, who reached the 200 game milestone- a great achievement.

My presidents report from last year stated that for our on field performances to improve, we needed to focus on both recruitment and training attendance. Now, to the report card, and strong off season recruitment with the addition of some great new talent certainly improved our general playing strength across the club. However, the fact that our top two teams failed to play finals this season could be attributed, in large part, to the general poor attitude to training held by the 'elite' players at our club. As I mentioned last year, training needs to be almost compulsory for anyone looking at playing 1st grade- the standard of play in this competition is now so strong that it's no longer possible to cruise through the season just playing on Saturdays and training sporadically.

With the aid of other senior players and a greater focus on our coaching structures, I will be looking at redressing this problem for the new season.

From an outsiders perspective, MUCC is blessed with amazing facilities and infrastructure. However, as demonstrated with the now permanent loss of the Gwilliam Field, the introduction of VSU and the demands on limited resources means it is crucial for the Cricket Club to work closely with MUSR to ensure the on-going viability of this traditional, resource intensive, sport.

The Cricket Club has much in its favour- an alliance with Gordon District Cricket Club, while still in its infancy, will no doubt greatly assist our club in terms of access to coaching and additional players to help with our lower grade strength. The return of the Club House during the past season was an enormous plus for the Cricket Club, and hopefully increased patronage during next season will ensure this once again becomes a central piece of the MUCC culture. However, it is critical that these things are not taken for granted by our members, and we continue to work hard to ensure that Cricket remains a critical centre piece for competitive sport at Macquarie University.

The quality of our two grounds and practice pitches, which are among the best in the competition, are a great credit to the work done by Jock Milward, Kevin Loubser and the rest of the grounds team. The new season will hopefully see us continue to work closely with the grounds team to ensure pitches are prepared which consistently suit the Macquarie style of play.

Finally, on a personal note, I would like to express my appreciation for the efforts of the Committee and Captains throughout the season. There is much work done week in and week out to ensure we have up to 8 teams on the field every weekend, and the club owes much to the work done by these few members. In particular, Warren Montford and Derek Couper were both terrific additions to the committee and made significant contributions. In his first year in the role, Paul Chapman displayed the makings of a top quality secretary. As always, Ross McIntyre was outstanding in his work with managing training and general 'troubleshooting', while Steve Rose continued to ensure the ongoing financial strength and viability of the Cricket Club. My thanks also go out to Danny McVey for all his support during some difficult times over the past 12 months. As well, Mark Hughes and his web site contributions- namely the magnificent competition table updates, are also appreciated by all members.

I look forward to tackling the challenges detailed above in the upcoming season and continue to take the steps which will make MUCC a powerhouse in Sydney Shires Cricket again.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

My first year as Secretary presented many challenges but was at the same time a very rewarding experience. The season started on a positive note with a large influx of new players. This was due in part to the Committee's focused approach to recruiting high-level players during the off-season. The addition of Nick Walker, Louis Hanna, Kris Griffith-Jones and Michael Gordon, the retention of Peter Procopis and the return of David Webb not only strengthened our First Grade team but also had positive flow-on effects in the lower grades.

Many others joined the club for the first time, adding further strength to the lower grades. This made the Committee's choice for the Mahoney-Folkard Rookie of the Year Award very difficult. Leading contenders were Nathan Alexander, who completed the *grand slam* of playing every non-age grade in a single season, Andrew Jessop, Tim Spencer and Andrew Tosolini, who all had a major impact in their initial season.

During pre-season training and into the early rounds of competition there was a new vibe within the club. I sensed a greater level of enthusiasm and involvement across the whole club than at any other time in the last nine years. I believe that this culture of participation is the foundation of a successful cricket club. The challenge is to develop and sustain it from round one to the finals and from season to season.

2005-2006 was a very successful year for the club on the field. The undoubted highlight was the Fourth Grade team capturing our first Shires' premiership since 1995-96. Fourth Grade, superbly led by rookie skipper, Paul McInnes, amassed a staggering 85 competition points losing only to minor premiers Burwood in a one-day match in which the club was ravaged by the usual pre-Christmas unavailabilities. We exacted sweet revenge on Burwood and maybe put to rest the ghosts of "Sprinkler Park" in 2003-04 by comprehensively beating the Briars in the Final.

Another on-field highlight was our sixth placing in the Shires Club Championship, a huge improvement on our tenth placing in 2004-05 and twelfth placing in 2003-04. Third Grade had a strong season, only going down to Warringah in a hard fought semi-final. The Frank Gray Shield team followed up their success from last season with another finals' appearance. Our Fifth and Sixth Grade sides competed in the Northern Suburbs Cricket Association competition and performed well to reach the semi-finals. The First Grade team also had a successful season, missing out on a finals' berth by less than one competition point.

The past twelve months also presented many off-field challenges. We faced the loss of our third turf oval late in season 2004-05 as the Sports Association struggled to manage its scarce resources in the face of voluntary student unionism. Whilst the loss of the Gwilliam Oval, named after the Club's founding president, is very regrettable, particularly the suddenness with which it was taken away and the lack of consultation, we have to accept it and move on. Hopefully the Sports Association will take note of our concerns regarding the process by which the Gwilliam field was converted into a baseball field so that we can continue to work together with the Sports Association in good faith for the mutual benefit of our two organisations.

Voluntary Student Unionism is now a fact of life. The Treasurer will no doubt allude to the immediate impact of VSU on our finances. The challenge for next year's committee is to take advantage of the opportunities that VSU indirectly offers. Through a focused, integrated approach to fundraising, sponsorship and fees, the club can become more financially self-reliant. It *may* cost more to play cricket for MUCC in the future, though our fees are still comparatively very low by Shires' standards. However, this will provide an incentive to improve on-field performance (to get more value for money) and also to

get involved in fundraising (to reduce fees), which are both obvious positives for the club and should make us more attractive to potential sponsors, and players from other clubs.

I would like to thank the President, David Smith, for his tireless efforts in making this club run and ensuring that we can get on the park each week and enjoy the success we have enjoyed this year. The committee has also had a lot to deal with this year and have done a terrific job. In particular, newcomers Warren Montford and Derek Couper really led the way. Whilst people like Monty don't go on committee to be rewarded, he truly deserved his award as Clubman of the Year. Congratulations!

The next committee faces a heavy workload in the season ahead. It is our club's 40th season and already a number of events to commemorate the occasion are in the pipeline. As indicated above, the committee must, as a top priority, position the club to deal with the reduction in funding from the Sports Association as a result of VSU. The committee also needs to develop strategies to increase our student membership and to increase student representation on the committee. This will be particularly difficult given the incongruity between the time span of the typical university degree (i.e. 3-5 years) and a cricket-playing career (upwards of 10 years). However, I am confident that we will have more than enough talent on the committee in 2006-2007 to deal with all of these issues successfully.

Finally I would like to mention two great stalwarts of the club in Al Mahoney and Warrick Folkard. Unfortunately, Al Mahoney's work has taken him to Melbourne and he played his last game for the club, hopefully only for the time being, during the season. Al narrowly beat Warrick Folkard to become the first person to play 350 matches for Macquarie University Cricket Club. Al has made an outstanding contribution to club over countless years. We wish Al all the best in Melbourne and hope this is not the end of his association with Macquarie University Cricket Club.

The Fourth Grade side were certainly fortunate to have the opportunity to recline in a comfortable seat and hear tales of the 1978/79 Second Grade premiership win, and countless other *pearls* of wisdom from the great man. Wick still has much to offer as a player and, as they say, 361 brings ... well, hopefully plenty more matches for the club in the years to come.

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the year ended 31 December 2005

The financial reports for the Macquarie University Cricket Club for the year ended 31 December 2005 are presented on the following pages.

2005 saw the Club make a reasonable surplus and thus increase its cash reserves to around the \$29,500 mark. Whilst this puts the Club in a reasonably healthy position, this must be put in the context of:

- the requirement for the Club, within the next handful of years, to restock its clothing supplies that the Club is attempting to run down in light of re-badging requirements being directed by MUSR,
- dwindling direct support from MUSR, which has only been exacerbated by the introduction of Voluntary Student Unionism (VSU); and
- the need to continue and extend the attraction of quality players and coaches to the club.

Financial Administration

The integration of the Clubs finances into that of MUSR's that was imposed in 2003 continued into 2005. MUSR's introduction of an on-line member registration and payment system continues to have its teething problems.

2005 saw MUSR impose the GST levy on funds (including membership fees) deposited into the Clubs trust fund.

2005 Financial Report - Features of Note

MUSR Cash Support: \$18,277 – A decrease from the \$20,500 allotted in 2004. It is envisaged that this figure will be significantly lower in 2006, with a view to it being removed altogether in 2007.

Clothing Expenses: \$761 – Well down on the \$9,642 spent in 2004, this is indicative of the large restocking of Club clothing undertaken in that year.

Cricket Equipment: \$6,569 – Likewise, well down on the \$13,777 spent in 2004 which saw the club invested in a new cover (\$3.2k).

Coaching and Scholarships: \$13,073 – A significant increase (\$8.1k in 2004) that saw the employment of the services of a 1st Class player from England, a couple of Sydney 1st grade players and the continuation of the support of the Clubs 1st grade captain.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 1ST GRADE SHIRES

Our performance as a team this season was markedly better than our efforts in 04-05. Despite falling into a mid-season slump, we played well at either end of the season, finishing on a very respectable 37 points.

After picking up a few good players in the off-season, along with the return of probably the best player the Club has produced, David Webb, we were certainly better prepared once Round One arrived.

Throughout the summer we bowled well. At times I think we were the best bowling side in the competition.

If there was a weak point in our game it was our batting. A measure of the problem is that at season's end only Griffith-Jones had managed to score over 300 runs. In contrast, four of our bowlers averaged below 20, an outstanding performance.

Of our new recruits, Griffith-Jones and Hanna were the standouts. Griff kept well and finished the season with 454 runs at 45.40, scoring his maiden century in the process. Louis finished with the lowest bowling average (16.3) and scored over 200 runs.

David Webb and Tim Hopkins also had very good seasons. Webby claimed 26 wickets at 17.23 with a remarkable economy rate of 2.41. Hoppa picked up 25 at 19.76. Both contributed vital runs at various points throughout the season as well. Webby finished with a batting average of 21.20. Hoppa proved very difficult to dismiss, notching up five not-outs on his way to a season average of 19.

There were many other notable performances during the year but if the truth be told the rest of the team was not consistent enough. I've no doubt that slightly stronger performances from the rest of us would have secured us a spot in the finals. To perform even better next year we need to improve in two areas: our defensive batting and our catching.

We scored rapidly throughout the season; four runs an over in two-day matches was par for the course. We let ourselves down; however, at times by playing loose shots and not battling hard enough through the inevitable tough periods against the better bowling teams. To my mind, the way to fix this problem is two-fold: first, there needs to be more pressure coming from Second Grade and second, players' training sessions need to be consciously set-up to simulate match situations.

Our catching improved as the season progressed. The second half was pretty good. The first half was, however, somewhat dire. This problem is probably just a function of how much we practise and could be remedied to an acceptable level with a bit of discipline.

I'd like to take this opportunity to put on the record my sincere thanks to Club President David Smith, who once again provided much assistance throughout the year. Smithy's Committee also deserves praise for the work behind the scenes that ensures the Club remains a great place to play cricket.

MATCH REPORTS

v Epping 8 dec. for 254 defeated Epping 217

After winning the toss and electing to bat, memories of 04-05 came flooding back when a batting collapse saw us reeling at 7 for 107. Unlike last season, however, we fought back brilliantly to end day one in a strong position at 8 for 255. Club President, David Smith, was the chief architect of the fight-back, finishing unbeaten on a career-best (79 not out). He was well supported by Saliba (40), who played a disciplined, controlled knock and Hopkins (39 not out), who once again proved he has an old head on those young shoulders. Day 2, and three wickets apiece to Hopkins, Hanna and Webb; a strong ground fielding effort; and the discipline to stick to our miserly game plan secured us victory. To Epping's credit, they remained focussed on the job at hand for the entire first session and an hour thereafter. We sensed, though, that if we just hung in there the match would eventually change. That's exactly what ended up happening. With eight wickets in hand and under one hundred runs, at about four an over, to get,

Epping needed to keep their cool. Once a couple of wickets fell, however, it was game on. As wounds were opened, Hanna (3/38) first, and then Webb (3/39) and Hopkins (3/44) went in for the kill. By the time the last wicket fell we had secured a memorable win. In the wash-up, it was convincing: a 38 run victory with time to spare after making what could be regarded as an aggressive declaration.

v South Sydney 172 lost to South Sydney 7 for 189

Winning the toss, our top-order batsmen struggled to come to grips with the conditions and before long we were reeling at four for not many. An inspired, even-time, partnership between Rounds (44) and Hanna (68) vaulted us back into the game. However, a few inappropriate shots and a couple of questionable decisions later, we were rolled for 172: a very disappointing score on what was a 250-280 deck. Day 2, and although we applied pressure through tight bowling we failed to take our chances. Against a team like Souths, you can't expect to win unless catches are held. Hopkins (4/46) was again the best of the bowlers. His rhythm was superb and consequently the ball was smoking into Griffith-Jones' gloves.

After an absurd washout day 1, day 2 meant we had 120 overs to play, and after winning the toss on a pitch that was even drier than last week, I elected to bat first. At

4-59 we had the shakes and needed something special from Rounds and Griffith-Jones. They delivered, compiling a classy 73 run partnership in even time. Rounds (71) looked in fine touch, playing some trademark lofted drives and cut shots, while Griffith-Jones (46) stunned on-lookers with a couple of sublime, Gower-like flicks to leg. However, we were again reeling at 8-153 when the affable Ying (27 not out) was joined by Hopkins (22 not out). This match-winning partnership enabled me to declare at 8-207 after 58 overs, leaving our south-western friends with a sizeable 62 overs to score the required runs. To their credit, SDs chased the entire way but eventually fell 26 runs short. It was a magnificent win for us; a game that could well have got away on any number of occasions had we not

remained dedicated to the task at hand. Nick Walker (3/46) bowled much better in this match. His line was more consistent and he bowled fuller and straighter to the more mediocre batsmen- a necessary adjustment when playing down a level or two. Webby (3/52) once again played the anchor role, frustrating and out-thinking the opposition batsmen. Hopkins (3/26) came good at the death when we needed him most to demolish the tail with a couple of rip-snorters.

v Roseville 7 dec. for 304 defeated Roseville 213

A brilliant innings by our English import, Nick Walker, was the highlight on day one of our clash with Roseville. In a brutal display of sustained hitting Walker (157 not out) monstered the visitors' attack. It is no mean feat to strike six 6's in a career at Roger Sheeran: Walker achieved that in one innings on Saturday. Some of his pick-up shots over mid-wicket and wide mid-on were devastating. From the pavilion you could sense the deep despair of each bowler, as the young tyro treated one after the other with contempt. Were it not for his skipper declaring the innings closed after only 57 overs, he may well have gone on to break the all-time highest score for the Club. Nick was supported by his tag-team partner, Kris Griffith-Jones, who played a crucial, measured knock of (65). Together, the dynamic duo took our total from a shaky 5 for 55 to a commanding 6 for 235. Three dropped chances in the first 40 minutes of play on day 2 effectively ruled out any chance of MUCC making a charge towards an outright win. Roseville battled hard all day, but really, were never in with a shot of picking up 6 points. Instead, it was just a matter of how many chances we would need to create to get 10 wickets and 6 points. In the end, we had to create some 15 or 16 chances to dismiss Roseville and claim our third win for the season. With the ball, wickets were shared around. The miserly Webby was the best, (3/17) off 18 overs, while Hoppa worked hard to grab (3/65) off 22 overs. Hanna and Walker also took 2 wickets each.

v Auburn 2 for 91 drew with Auburn 270

After an hour and a half of play Auburn had raced to 0/134 off only 23 overs. Brett Collison smashed us to all parts, posting a magnificent century. For a while there we really seemed to have no answers. However, the last forty-five minutes before Tea saw us begin what was to become a comprehensive fight-back. Once we'd removed Collison we got onto one of our bowling rolls, gaining in confidence as the afternoon went on. The bowlers applied themselves to the task at hand and we held our chances. Walker bowled his best spell since arrival immediately after the tea break. Hanna showed that his off-spinners were more than useful. Hopkins, lacking in rhythm early in the day, came back strongly and finished with (3/26). Webby was his usual, miserly self. Of all the bowlers he is the one with the most flexibility and therefore suffers the

least when we are taken to. Perhaps, the most pleasing aspect of our day in the field was Smithy's triumphant return to the bowling crease. The President claimed three important wickets and showed that he's still got the knack of hitting the seam. When the last wicket fell Auburn had reached 270. After staring down the barrel early in the day we felt like we dodged a bullet. This left us 19 overs to bat. After a re-shaping of our batting order during the week it was your correspondent who took to the field with Shrek. We felt the best way to approach things was to take it up to the Eagles. We looked to score whenever possible and applied the pressure to the opposition bowlers. By the end of play we had reached 2 for 91, losing Shrek around the

v Lane Cove 155 lost to Lane Cove 191

A reluctance bordering on refusal to make ugly runs led to our unacceptably low score against a workman-like Lane Cove attack. It was one of those wickets that continued to ask batsmen questions regardless of how long it was occupied. Disappointingly, some of our batsmen weren't prepared to seek answers for any substantial period of time. Peter Saliba was the standout performer for us. His defence was sound and his attack measured. He remained (32 not out) when all was said and done; his innings was a lesson in disciplined batting. When our innings was concluded on the fifth ball of the 58th over we'd only managed to reach 155. We fought the good fight on day 2, but our paltry batting total meant that we were always going to be up against it. Despite a spirited bowling performance, which created a small window of opportunity early in the afternoon when the home side found itself floundering at 7 for 129, we couldn't quite gain the upper hand. Each bowler claimed two wickets and at various times presented the Cove batsmen with more than a few problems. Webby gave a tutorial in accurate, miserly medium-paced bowling, claiming (2/31) off 15. Walker troubled every batsman, hitting the seam more often than previous weeks. Hanna, Smith and Hopkins also bowled well, constantly applying pressure to the opposition. We again dropped a few catches, but also managed to hold some tough ones. Griffith-Jones was in good form behind the stumps, Yinga took a great outfield catch and Smithy held on to a scorching caught and bowled chance.

v Burwood 187 lost to Burwood 9 for 211

After sending the Briars in, superb spells from both Walker and Webb had us in the box seat with the visitors reeling at 5-47. By the second drinks break the Briars had fought back, but remained vulnerable at 7 for 138. Disappointingly, we never quite finished them off and they went on to post a very competitive 9-211. We dropped off in the field over the last ten to fifteen overs and our back-up bowlers couldn't quite match the earlier efforts of Walker (3/27) and Webb (3/40). Our turn to bat, and it was one of those days when your team is always in the hunt, but never quite on top. Every time we looked as if we might seize the high ground we'd lose a wicket or they'd string together a set of tight overs. Walker (21) played an entertaining cameo while Rounds (21) also contributed, but it was the partnership between Griffith-Jones (83) and Saliba (24) that seemed the most likely to wrest the match away from the visitors. Griffith-Jones played superbly, mixing technically correct defence with devastating lofted drives and pick-up shots to leg. Saliba again looked the part, playing straight in defence and attacking judiciously. Following Saliba's departure, Griffith-Jones cleverly held the innings together, at times surging forward with brief, blistering attacks, and then, upon losing a partner, dropping down a gear or two and re-building. Unfortunately, he eventually picked out a fieldsman with one of those leg-side pick-up shots and it was all over.

v Georges River 169 lost to Georges River 194

There are very few honourable mentions from this match. They are as follows: Nick Walker was our best, taking (2/24) and compiling a well-made (49); Louis Hanna topped the bowling figures, picking up (4/20) off his allotment; Pete Saliba batted well again, posting (33); and Shrek Moran showed glimpses of his old batting style, making an even (20). Sadly, that's about it. We had by far the better of the conditions against one of the weaker clubs in the competition. Georges River amassed 194 on a pitch that was extremely difficult to bat on. Apart from occasional disciplined passages of play, we were pathetic both in the field and with the ball. In both facets of the game we played dumb cricket.

1/7...2/8...3/16...4/18...5/19....a traditional MUCC start! From 5/19 it was always going to be difficult to post a competitive score, but thanks to some solid batting from Webby (33), debutant Gordon (25), and Hanna (20), we reached 119. With 35 overs left on day 1, we put aside some initial indifferent fielding to back up the terrific MUCC bowling. Hoppa and Hanna (2 wickets) led the way, but all the bowlers helped pile on

Having won the toss and elected to bat we began shakily, finding ourselves 2 for 14 after five overs. Moran and Griffith-Jones did the hard yards early in their partnership, playing very judiciously. Their stroke repertoires expanded as the shine slowly left the ball and they settled. When Moran departed for (55) the team-total had reached 99 and we were set to make the 200-plus target we'd set earlier in the day. Griffith-Jones again batted well for his (52), as did Hanna, who made a breezy (28). A dynamic partnership by Webb (31 not out) and Ying (39 not out) enabled us to make an aggressive declaration at 6 for 237, leaving us fifteen overs at the Lindfield top-order. Our bowlers were again more than up to the challenge, claiming three vital wickets in the short period of play leading up to stumps. We took the field on the second morning with high hopes of an outright victory after a dominant performance the previous week. CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 2ND GRADE SHIRES

The 2005-2006 cricket season has been one of the toughest seasons I have encountered. Taking on the Captaincy of Second Grade was nothing new but was my first season as a skipper at Macquarie University. The season had its highs and unfortunately a lot of low points. Our outlook was to play good competitive cricket and more than anything, try and be consistent and look to be somewhere around the top six, or just outside the top six, at the end of the season. This was not to be, in fact, we were a long way from it.

We recorded 2 wins, along with 2 wash outs, 1 draw and 8 losses. It was a very disappointing and frustrating season. It felt at times the team was not playing together as a side but rather eleven players just taking the oval as individuals, though at other times we looked as though we could defeat any side in the competition. Something I tried to instill early on, and hopefully this will carry on into next season, was to try to get us and play as a team, a side that would pull together when things were not going well and to keep our heads up. We kept reminding ourselves, that it is not the best eleven players on paper that were going to win games, but rather the eleven players who pulled together and played good cricket as a team. This is something to remember for next season.

The best way to describe the season is inconsistent. We started well. In the first couple of games, we hit over 320 and 250 runs respectively. It looked as though the batting was going to be our strong point this year but as time went on we became less consistent. We hit scores of 200 plus 5 times but after the new year's break, our scores diminished. Our lowest total was against Holroyd-Hills in the last game of the season. We were all out for 112. We showed at times, such as Round 2, against South Sydney, that we were more than capable of mixing it with the best. Remembering South Sydney made it through to the finals, we chased 259 only to be 3 runs shy of a big upset. We lost 7 wickets that game for 59 runs and gave away a victory.

The bowling was more frustrating. We had a reasonable attack all season but could not finish off sides. This seems to be the way at Macquarie. We bowled some very good spells throughout the season, only to let ourselves down at times. A perfect example was against Lane Cove who won the Second Grade final this season. Chasing our small target of 195, Lane Cove, was struggling to reach our score. The lower-order put on a partnership of over 60 runs that took the game away from us. This seemed to happen on more than one occasion this season.

The fielding was probably the most noticeable problem in the side. I would hate to think of how many catches went down in the entire season. It would not be a pretty statistic. It's the old adage. Catches win matches. Something we struggled to do.

These three examples with the bat and ball, along with the fielding, show how inconsistent our game was this season. If we can show some more patience with the bat, hit the required areas with the ball and get to the nets and practise our fielding, I think the results will show next season. All this said...it was not all bad. We can take a lot out of the season. We showed glimpses of magic with the willow. Wickets were regularly taken early and there were some good catches taken.

On the bowling side of things, we had Alexander Gibson, Warren Montford opening our attack, followed by Mark Fairlie and for half the season, Derek Couper. To back this up we had Ross McIntyre bowling his leg-spin. Brett Kent and Martyn Payne were our seamers. Alexander Gibson, known around the traps as JC, bowled very

well this season. JC was our leading wicket taker with 17 wickets in eleven games. I know JC will improve on this next season and is very capable of taking 30 plus wickets for his disciples! Ross McIntyre also took 17 scalps. Ross would admit this was not one of his better seasons with the ball but look forward to next season for bigger and better things from him. Warren Montford ended up with 16 wickets in 10 games. With a better line and length, Warren will have a more successful 2006-07 season. Mark Fairlie looked the goods at times and in particular against Pennant Hills where he took 10 wickets in a match. I think also, that Mark will have a more successful season in 2006-07 as he has learnt a lot from this season. Our seamers shared the rest of the wickets. Couper showed at times why he was selected in Second Grade and when Derek puts the ball on the spot, he is a handful. Brett Kent also took a number of wickets and was also unlucky not to take more. If only the skipper was awake at first slip! Marty Payne at times bowled well and had that knack of breaking partnerships.

The batting looked to be our strong point with some good innings played throughout the season. Runs were flowing well at the beginning of the season but dried towards the last part of the season. Brent Roasty McNee hit the Second Grade record with 580 runs for the season. Roasty hit 128 in the first game of the season against Epping. Still more room for improvement. Kieran Mahony also looked the goods in the first half of the season until he went overseas to study. Kieran hit 181 runs in 7 games and looked the goods at times. Not only is he a very good fielder but also a terrific young lad with a great attitude. The veteran Steve Rose was the other run getter who had a good season but also would admit that he is capable of scoring a lot more. Needless to say I thought Steve played well this season scoring 352 in 11 games. Ross McIntyre played well down the order with 292 valuable runs in 11 games. It's always handy to have someone down the order who can score runs for you. Brett Kent hit 169 runs and Marty Payne also chipped in with 126 runs for the season.

Well...as it shows, there is a lot of room for improvement in all areas. Overall it was a disappointing season but we got to see some of the younger players step up, in particular Andrew Tosolini and Nathan Alexander. These two young men hopefully will play plenty of Second Eleven cricket next season as we need some of the younger brigade to come through and show the older boys how to play and how to have a positive attitude towards our cricket.

I would like to thank the 25 plus players who played seconds this year. It was a tough season and everybody stuck to the job at hand. Thanks to Brett Kent who played most of the season and did the vice-skippering and assisted me greatly. Also thanks to the President and the other captains from the various grades for their help with the selection nightmares that we encountered throughout this season. It's always a tough job, selecting players from all the grades to get the teams balanced properly. Hopefully this process will improve next season.

A big thanks to Warren Montford and Ross McIntyre as well as Paul McInnes for constantly doing the covers each home game and, of course, all others involved. Lastly I would like to say well done to 4th Grade on winning the Premiership. This should inspire all of us to have a successful 2006-07 campaign.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT - 5th GRADE (N.S.C.A. – B Grade)

The Fifth Grade team was faced with many new challenges this season. Firstly, we were in a new league, playing in the B Grade of the NSCA Leagues. Then there was the change from turf and learning how to play on astro turf. We were faced with shorter games with a guaranteed result in each round (no draws). All games had to be played at neutral venues (no home and away fixtures). Tony Barnes and I were faced with a large intake of new players all needing to be placed at the right level. Finally, there was a 'new' captain in me, taking the duties on again after an 11-year break.

Despite all this we made the semi-finals, which was pleasing, but lost badly, which was not. Looking through the season we won the games against lower placed teams (with one exception late in the season) and lost to the other three teams that made the semi finals. Our victories were usually comprehensive, with three outright. Our defeats highlighted our weaknesses. In most matches we showed a high quality of bowling. This is a skill greatly needed in this league due to a large number of one-dayers and no draws in two-dayers. Despite all this, our season had many highlights.

On a team basis it is hard to go past the win over the Bears. Chasing 300 we made 9/301 in a rare performance of strong batting. We found two promising quickies in Ross Yabsley and Chris Hole. Ross started the season with plenty of wickets including a 7/30 against North Shore. Wickets dried up a bit late in the season and this coincided with him not being able to make training. His length suffered slightly. Ross put in some valuable batting performances later in the innings, showing both defensive and aggressive skills. Chris showed some great pace and determination. He missed the middle part of the season due to an overseas trip but he is a quality bowler with a promising future. In the batting, Abishak Sharma showed promise with a number of good knocks at the top of the order. He has an excellent temperament and needs to build on these skills to be able to accelerate later in an innings. Eddie Aphaiwongse was consistent throughout and peaked in the last two rounds with 78 and 80 not out. He showed great awareness of match situations, accelerating when necessary. He stood in well as keeper when Jonny Bird was away and always gave one hundred percent. Our MVP without doubt was Angat Sandhu. With the bat he is an instinctive cricketer. He has a good eye and can score quickly. He bowled accurate medium pace, always moving the ball of the seam. He ended with a batting average of 32.29 and 12 wickets at 22.58 each. His outfield catching was flawless. We had some good young cricketers pass through our side on the way to higher grades. This included Nathan Alexander, Tim Spencer and Jarryd Watters who all performed well for us. In summary, we deserved to be in the semi-finals but our batting was not good enough to go further.

A special thanks to Tony Barnes for his tireless assistance and advice and help with his knowledge of these leagues. A pleasing side of the season was the number of new and young guys doing well ensuring a good future for the club.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – 6th GRADE (N.S.C.A. – C Grade)

Sixth Grade built on the progress made in 2004-05 to return to semi-final action after a two-year break. A spirited performance against minor premiers, the Gnomes, fell short of an upset victory and we settled for fourth place overall. A number of talented and enthusiastic players came to the club this year and their positive approach made this an interesting and enjoyable season. With no star performers in the side we relied on teamwork, depth and consistency. We regularly used seven bowlers with everyone chipping in. While it would have been nice to see more batters play lengthy innings we managed to get by with middling totals and backing our bowling. Only our catching prevented us from doing better in key matches, our failure to hone this basic but crucial skill costing us dearly. It's definitely an area we need to improve before we can match the top teams. Overall our efforts allowed us to post a number of hard fought wins in tight matches. One-day matches again proved a weakness with a number of poorly constructed run chases.

Of the players starting the year in 6th grade Tim Spencer, Jarryd Watters and Ash Singh were quickly promoted and had a significant impact in higher grades. Nathan Alexander had the unique distinction of playing in all six grades; scoring 10 not out in Sixth grade and 14 in First grade. Sixth grade Rookie of the Year was undoubtedly Anik Zuhair (21 wickets overall). Anik had an uncanny knack for breakthroughs, taking a wicket in the first 3 overs of his spell on 12 occasions. Anik also showed good application while batting and finished the season with 207 runs. The bowling was uniformly strong with Tony Barnes (24 wickets), Adrian Lulka (22 wickets), Wayne Travers (22 wickets) and Ash Singh (21 wickets) recording solid hauls. Adrian had three wickets at Christmas but was clearly our best late in the season. His 5 wickets against Gnomes was the bowling performance of the year. Ash took 7-37 to set up an outright win against North Sydney to add another pewter to his collection. Working in conditions unfavourable to spin Mark McGoldrick (12 wickets) and Tom Hollings (11 wickets) demonstrated fine skills. Virun Sahni (8 wickets) and Edward Cooke (9 wickets) were welcome members of the side during short visits to Sydney.

On the batting front Clay Finnemore (179) posted the best figures, while individual innings of note came from Tim Spencer (67 not out) against Kirribilli, Mark Schaafsma (60) against Wanders, Greg Lane (76) against Wanderers and Jarryd Watters (64 not out) against Gnomes. Tony Barnes (225 runs) and Wayne Dean (184) were steady while the inimitable Dave Bijlsma (171) always backed his eye. Apart from his batting Wayne's keeping provided quality where it was most needed and for this he is a deserving Sixth grade MVP.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT – MASTERS

Having won the premiership in undefeated style the previous year, the pressure was on to continue our winning streak. We were able to continue our run for the first three games of the season but, alas, when the streak ended, the floodgates opened and we lost four of the next five games. These were the only games we lost during the year and we came back strongly to record an overall 7-4 win-loss record to take fifth place in the competition. During the season we had a number of debutants including Robbie Walker, Mick Weaver, Clay Finnemore, John Sutton and Mick Dries, who all performed well and will ensure that we remain very competitive in the Masters competition for many years to come.

The loss of regular skipper Al Mahoney, posted to Melbourne mid-season, was also a telling blow. Having amassed an unfathomable 352 games for MUCC, Al has been a wonderful team-mate and leader for many seasons, a person who plays cricket for all the right reasons and a gentleman who upholds the finest traditions of the game.

Congratulations to Kenthurst Cricket Club, who recorded a 10-1 win-loss ratio and were the worthy winners of the premiership. Kenthurst has now won the Masters title 4 times in 14 seasons to be the most successful club in the competition's history.

A huge thank you to MUCC President David Smith who continues to lead by example and who works tirelessly and passionately for the benefit of the club. Absolutely nothing is ever too much trouble for Dave and his commitment to the Club is nothing short of staggering.

Although we were unable to defend our premiership, the season was thoroughly enjoyable and games were generally played in true Masters spirit, with our only sledging being squarely directed at our own players. Let's do it all again next season!

Although we were defending a moderate total of 164, all bowlers put in a good performance and were assisted by an *almost* athletic fielding display. The pick of the bowlers was MOM Brownie with 3/19 (10 overs and 4 maidens). Clay ("Cassius") Finnemore provided the killer blow by picking up two wickets in one over (the old 1-2) and then the knockout blow in his next over to take three

wickets in the space of 8 balls. Danny picked up a wily (2/20) off 7 and Forest, (John Sutton), came on late in the innings, popped and mopped, picking up an impressive (2/11). Parramatta was all out for 96 off 33 overs and our winning streak, despite an early scare, continues.

With skipper Mahoney back at the helm, MUCC got back in the winning circle after two close losses. Invited to field first after Mahoney lost yet another toss we started very poorly, none for 27 off 4 had us looking at a very long day given the perfect batting conditions. However, a couple of quick wickets from Brown got us going. With a skinny bowling line up Mahoney (fresh from a two game break) replaced Brown after 6 and bowled the longest spell of his career, 7 overs (2/16). At the half way mark they were 2/77. Brown returned to finish his 10 and picked up another couple to finish with 4/30, certainly the pick of the bowlers. 167 to chase for a win was a good outcome given how poorly we started and the batsman-friendly conditions. We soon put ourselves under pressure, Burchett ran Walker out and then got out himself, 2/26 off 10. However, Phantom (41 not out), Clyne (41 not out) and Howlett (26) made batting look easy. A mini collapse at the end caused a few heart flutters but Brown and McVey got us home with a couple of overs to spare. We remained strongly in contention for another Premiership, despite our losses.

v Manly 147 lost to Manly 9 for 185

After a mighty 352 games for MUCC, this was shaping up as potentially Al's last game for the Club due to his "posting" to Melbourne. On a hot and humid day where all 22 players were longing for Manly Oval for its sea breeze and *other attractions*, Manly elected to give their strong batting line up first use of the pitch. Manly went on to post a very competitive total of 9/185 on the surprisingly slow Northern outfield. Wickets were generally shared with Clay and Danny picking up two. Brownny was the most economical with (1/26) off his full complement having claimed another international wicket (this time Trevor Chappell). In reply we were reasonably poised at 2/70 off 16 but failed to capitalise. In the first 15 overs we failed to reach the boundary once and the running between wickets was starting to make us regret our over indulgence at Christmas. In fact, the first person to reach the boundary was actually a Manly fieldsman who contributed four overthrows, on top of the three runs scored, for Schaafs' first ever 7 in his long career. I can guarantee you that you would never see a Macquarie Masters team give away four overthrows! Eventually we were dismissed for 147 with about five overs left. The Manly bowling and fielding was excellent. Trevor Chappell (1/35 off 10) was especially difficult to score against and bowled a wide variety of deliveries, although not the delivery for which he is most remembered. For the first time since I don't know when, we didn't get a single batsman retired at 40. Main contributors were O'Reilly (35), Fernandes (25) who was the only batsman to find the boundary regularly, and Schaafsma (21). After the game, Kenny and Smithy made a touching presentation to Al in recognition of his outstanding service to the Club since 1977 both on and off the field.

Superb innings from Szabo and Best (including 3 zacs) saw Lane Cove accelerate towards the target, and Lane Cove brought up victory with 3 overs to spare. Best of the bowlers were Brown (3/34 for 10), Finnemore (2/32 off 8) and Dixon (2/36 off 7).
