

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Season 1988-89 was a memorable one for Macquarie University Cricket Club for a number of reasons. Most memorable was the consistently falling rain which easily exceeded the tremendous downpours of the previous year. If ever the necessity for finishing in the top two positions needed to be made apparent, it has certainly been shown in the last two seasons. If global climatic conditions are undergoing such radical change then this state of affairs may indeed become the norm. Early matches, particularly at home, cannot be surrendered.

Some outstanding personal performances made the season particularly satisfying for those club members. Greg Brown was a worthy winner of the Gwilliam Shield. In his first full year in A Grade, Greg made 370 runs (with two 'tons') and took over twenty wickets at an average of just over fifteen. Maybe we may have to re-name him 'Both' or 'Guy the Gorilla' but I hope that's where the comparison with Botham ends. Phil Lenard most certainly would have broken the existing A Grade wicket-keeping record in a less rain-affected season. Centuries were also recorded by Graham Lego, in B Grade, and Colin Cole (welcome back Col!) in D Grade. Paul Wyllie registered D Grade's first hat-trick while Ivan Blyth, Simon Burchett and Graham Lego all joined the '100 Club' during the season.

Macquarie North, our new ground, made enormous improvements this season and holds promise to only get better. The outfield this year was much faster and as the wicket becomes fully established it will become a great cricket facility. One suggestion may be to set up viewing facilities on the western side of the oval to enjoy some relief from the sun. The shade from the housing units and the trees may stop some players being frazzled late in the afternoon. Charlie Seaton's pitches generally played to their usual standard. It's very easy to take such fantastic facilities for granted. Hopefully the majority of our club don't. When confronted with less than satisfactory playing conditions the contrast becomes very evident.

The prospect of a club tour to the U.K. in 1990 provides the club with a great challenge. Club members have a tremendous incentive to perform not only on the field but in supporting the club off the field. The Committee will seek and demand your support if this endeavour is to succeed. If motivation has ever been a problem surely the prospect of playing in and touring England will solve this. In the end it will get down to each individual member of this club and their attitude.

In presenting my final report as President, I would like to make a few observations. We <u>are</u> a University club. We must always remember to maximise our possible playing personnel from the campus. Recent committees have been very aware of this as a major priority. We, as a club, have a great deal to offer particularly to those students who are keen on their cricket, of reasonable ability and may be playing in what may be termed a 'park' level. Those students <u>must</u> be made aware of our existence.

On the playing arena, I feel we must ensure that we must become home-ground 'specialists'. This means, particularly for A and B Graders playing on the main ground, that we adapt to the demands of winning on our wickets. We know how our pitches play, so no more grumblings or excuses! Scores of over 250 are not necessarily safe. Most, if not all, home matches are first innings decisions so the team who generally bats the better, wins. We cannot afford to drop points at home, especially early in the season. Chances for outright points are nearly always confined to 'away' matches. Batsmen who play consistently across the line or who are impatient do not succeed.

I have been slightly disappointed at times by some players giving in too readily. The ability to fight through the tough times both as individual player or as a team makes you a better and harder player. I appeal to players not to take the easy option - persevere through difficulties. There is enough know-how and experience to help you. Use the human resources in this club to their fullest.

The club has benefited greatly from having a hard-working and stable executive for nearly a decade now. To Al Mahoney and Grizzle Welsby thanks for the largely un-acknowledged but greatly appreciated work.

Finally, on behalf of the club, congratulations to Warringah, Lane Cove, Bexley and Wentworthville for their premiership victories in the respective grades.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Gentlemen, I have pleasure in presenting my eighth report as Honorary Secretary of Macquarie University Cricket Club.

Season 1988/89 will not be remembered as one of the great ones from a performance viewpoint.

The respective finishing positions of each team was as follows:

A Division	7th
B Division	8th
C Division	13th
D Division	12th

The Club finished a disappointing 12th in the Club Championships, down from equal 4th the previous season.

A, B and C Divisions all finished further down the premiership table than in the previous season. C Division slumped alarmingly from being runners-up in, season 1987/88 to 2nd last in season 1988/89. D Division improved its placing marginally from the previous season.

Our Club's failure to capitalize on the gains made during the previous season can be attributed, in my view, to three causes. Firstly the loss of a number of quality players from the higher grades, secondly, an injury toll which was the worst in the Club's history and thirdly a lack of application to basic skills training.

Whilst the injury situation is largely a matter of luck, the issue of player retention, recruitment and training must be addressed by the Committee as a matter of urgency. It is imperative that the Club establish a higher profile on the University campus to attract undergraduates to our Club in large numbers.

With the changes being mooted to reduce the number of teams in the Sydney grade cricket competition the potential to recruit cricketers to Macquarie will be increased considerably. Also we have the prospect of our overseas tour at the end of the season and increased awareness of the game itself with the Ashes tour taking place at the present time.

It is essential that M.U.C.C. take advantage of these factors and market ourselves on campus so that the entire student body is made aware of the many benefits we have to offer.

Once players are recruited a commitment to skills training is fundamental to success. Too often, for those who do attend, our training sessions deteriorate into a social event rather than being used as a means of improving Saturday performances. This matter must be rectified. You will read elsewhere in this report the effect rain had on our season, I will not report further on that matter except to say that everybody at the Club should be congratulated for keeping their spirits up despite spending week after week indoors watching the rain come down.

On a dry weekend early in the season Macquarie played host to the Newcastle University for two one-day fixtures. We won both matches though it must be recorded that Newcastle tired visibly as a consequence of their hectic social calendar. We also won the drinking contest despite claims that some of our members 'spillage' was unacceptable. This was an enjoyable weekend for all concerned.

Off the field the Committee continued to go about its business in a diligent manner. The focus of our attention is of course preparations of the tour of the United Kingdom at the end of the 1989/90 season. A large number of social functions have been held with more planned.

The Annual Dinner was again held in the University Union, attendance was the highest for many years and the catering, as usual, excellent. Also I would like to record the Club's appreciation for the continuing support provided by the Macquarie University Sports Association. The facilities that we enjoy are first class and members should reflect from time to time on the privileges which we all too often take for granted.

Finally I see the need to offer my thoughts on one aspect of the way the game of cricket is being played in our competition. You will read in my D Grade match reports two references to what I have called 'conservative' umpiring. I view with considerable concern an apparent unwillingness amongst some players of some opposition Clubs to apply the rules of the games in a fair and consistent manner. Whilst I can only record my dismay at these players' actions I would like to remind members of Macquarie University Cricket Club of their obligation to uphold the spirit and the law of this great game.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the beginning of the 1989/90 season.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

THE UNDER 24 COMPETITION

The Under 24's competition was a disappointing one for Macquarie. We played two matches and were defeated in both. Unfortunately, our game against Epping was washed out and this was a match I am certain we would have won.

Our performance in both games was identical on both occasions. We batted first, and proceeded to bat poorly. Against Wentworthville only three players made double figures: David Folkard 22, Chris Hook 18 and Steven Bateman 18. We were dismissed for just over one hundred runs. However, in this game we bowled and fielded quite well. At one stage we had the very strong Wentworthville side 5 for 50, but just did not have enough runs, and they passed us five down. Alan Davies, Craig Edwards, Trevor Lockett and Warrick Folkard all bowled well and ensured our bowling attack was the equal of any in the competition.

The batting lacked consistency with only Greg, Ken Dixon and Phil Lenard scoring runs regularly. Col Kendall did however, find form and played two great knocks of 70 later in the season.

The bowlers found plenty of edges allowing the wicket keeper to take 22 catches and 4 stumpings for the year.

The future for A Grade does appear bright with the return of some players and the addition of new players of ability next year. The Tour to the UK in 1990 should further develop player skills provided greater effort is put into training and punctuality to matches.

If our Club is to develop the depth to win competitions we must support all Club functions, attend training throughout the year and make ourselves available for selection on a regular basis.

The development of a greater depth in players will ensure that the Club becomes a threat to not just A Grade, but all competitions.

MATCH REPORT - A SHIRES

VS ROSEVILLE 58 & 4 for 240 lost to Roseville 5 for 103

A disappointing start to the season with Macquarie all out for a paltry 58. Although the wicket was two paced and under prepared, the batsmen failed to adjust to the conditions and by the end of the first week we had already lost on first innings.

With little to play for but pride after Roseville batted on, Macquarie showed a lot of spirit in amassing 4/240. This session of batting produced a fine century from Greg Brown and a determined 50 from 'Grizzle' Welsby. With the wicket still not playing truely, having been rolled when wet, our previous innings' effort remains a mystery. Still this game has taught us what can be achieved from disciplined batting.

VS WARRINGAH 7 for 186 lost to Warringah 7 for 214

The first one-day match of the year because of rain and everyone turned up at 10.00 am except for the Official Umpires.

Warringah batted first and compiled 214 for 7 off 53 overs. Despite a confident appeal for caught behind, the Warringah opener took advantage of the umpiring absence and added another 110 runs before being dismissed.

The umpire now having arrived, Macquarie were always going to have trouble chasing over 4 runs an over. The loss of an early wicket and some tight bowling from Warringah bogged us down and some tragic run outs and wild slogging saw the demise of the middle order.

Macquarie finished the 53 overs still 28 runs short of the target. Again Greg Brown batted well for 59 and Steve O'Reilly and Grizzle made solid knocks.

An overall and reasonable effort against one of the strongest teams, but our batting still needs more direction and aggression in the early stages if we are to be competitive against the top teams.

VS LINDFIELD 213 lost to Lindfield 227

Macquarie batted first and after a solid start again from Grizzle 65, Macquarie slumped from 1 for 78 to 7 for 115. Only a 75 run stand from Ken Dixon 68 and Phil Lenard 30 enabled Macquarie to reach 213 on a fast small field. With Lindfield fielding a very strong batting lineup including Peter Toohey and Dave Colley, we had the job ahead of us. After an opening stand of 121, the situation looked hopeless but some dogged bowling and fielding almost brought victory with Lindfield passing our score 8 wickets down.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT 'C' SHIRES

To drop from 2nd to 13th in the space of one season would suggest that this year could only be regarded as a failure. All respects of our game were below a standard that would have made us competitive. This not only included batting, fielding and wicket-keeping but other areas of the game such as training attendance, captaincy and attitude towards availability and getting to matches on time. These deficiencies in commitment inevitably contributed to our performance on the field. Admittedly the loss of key players from the year before, a number of serious injuries during the season, three washed out games and long periods without playing did not help although all Clubs should expect these problems.

Of the ten games we played eight were lost on the first innings. Three washed-out draws and two good first innings wins made up our 18 points for the season. There were fifteen days play during the season and seven wash-out days. Better use of covers may have saved some of these days.

Most games were played at the Northern Macquarie ground. There was a marked improvement in the standard of the pitches this year so that scores of above 200 were much more common. This highlighted the need for batsmen capable of making big scores. While the pitches were good, the well-grassed out-fields were superb, being a true and fast surface. They were a pleasure to play on, congratulations to the Macquarie University Groundstaff.

A big drawback to playing at home was the lack of shade at the ground. On a hot day it can be a grim experience watching your side bat. On the hottest day the Wentworthville players took cover under the young trees on the far side of the oval. This is one possible solution to the problem. Thirty-one players went through C Grade during the season, although three of these played nine or more of the ten games. Injuries to Des Brown (knee), Craig Anderson (finger), Paul Oslington (knee), Glen Foster (shoulder) and Doug Latto (ribs) prevented a stable core being formed for the team.

One pleasing feature of the year was the number of batsmen able to score half centuries. Doug Latto, Tony Barnes, Colin Cole, Stephen Campbell and Greg Hobbs all made fifties, while Steve Bateman displayed undoubted ability in making two at crucial stages of our innings. Congratulations to Steve on setting C Grade partnerships for the seventh and eighth wickets with Chris Hubbard and Greg Hobbs respectively. Best of the batsmen however was Dave 'Test Tube' Folkard who made 210 runs from nine innings. With 70 runs or so in B Grade and another 70 runs from two under 24's Games Dave made 350 runs for the Club overall second only to Greg Brown. His confident approach to batting indicated great skill and concentration. If Chris 'The Factor' Hubbard (153 runs), Doug Latto (173 runs) and Tony Barnes (155 runs) could add fifty runs to these totals next season and players such as Chris Hook, Reg Carney and Sam Byrne can continue to improve within the Club then C Grade should become a competitive batting force. Dave Folkard, Colin Cole and Steve Bateman should all do well at a higher level of Cricket.

Only one bowler took more than ten wickets this year which indicated a lack of depth and support from the field. Mick Cashman took 15 for 385 from 141 overs. These figures do not really indicate Mick's value to the side as both a strike and stock bowler. A number of catches went down off his bowling, undoing the pressure he applied to opposing batsmen. Even so, he continued to bowl with great heart. Steve Bateman and Richard Najdzion took eight wickets from limited appearances with sharp bowling while Chris Hubbard showed potential in between the no balls. Of the spinners Doug Latto (6 for 163) bowled solidly while Chris Hook (3 for 83) and Mutlu Ercelenk showed how hours of training had improved their bowling by season's end. Dave Folkard's left arm bowling (6 for 147) could also prove useful if developed.

As fielders, Chris Hook, John Gumbley and Dave Scotter gave the team good value. Reg Carney took eight wickets behind the stumps and was neat down leg side. Greg Hobbs, Stephen Campbell and Dave Scotter all proved dependable with the gloves. Craig Anderson's efforts will go unmentioned.

Finally, I would like to thank Craig for his commitment to C Grade despite his injury, and also Chris Hook and Mick Cashman for their on-field and off-field assistance and advice in tough circumstances. I would particularly like to acknowledge Al Mahoney's efforts and resourcefulness with player's availability. I am sure he looked forward to my Friday evening phone calls. Thanks also to Phil Lenard and Bill Yeo and the Committee for their concern over C Grade 'dwahl'. But especially important were the players who were there to take witch's hats, stumps and kit to the ground and who trained regularly. I would also like to mention the enthusiasm of players such as Reg Carney, Glen Foster and Dave Folkard and all those who played for the enjoyment and satisfaction. In a losing year that is what made it worthwhile playing.

MATCH REPORTS 'C' SHIRES

VS_ROSEVILLE 157 and 7 for 154 lost to Roseville 7 dec 153

Playing at home we were soon in trouble at 2 for 8 before Glen Foster (8) and Stephen Campbell (62) put on 40 for the third wicket and Campbell and Dave Folkard (23) added 53 for the fourth. 3 for 101 became all out for 137, the damage being done by an elderly gentleman bowling on a length. This was a very rusty start to the season. Despite Steve Bateman's lone hand bowling performance (4 for 38), Roseville recovered from 4 for 78 to declare at tea on the second day at 7 for 153. Campbell managed to get some turn, bowling 9 overs for 2 for 23.

A number of double failures saw us slump to 6 for 56 (Campbell 23) before Bateman (71 n.o.) and Chris Hubbard (16) applied their solid techniques to avoid outright defeat. With that accomplished, Bateman rewarded himself with four largish sixes, through mid wicket. 98 for the seventh wicket was a C Grade record.

Poor batting on the opening day and a lack of bowling depth meant losing to only an average side.

VS WARINGAH 161 lost to Warringah 7 dec 195

This one-day rematch of last seasons' final was played on the Northern Oval. Unlike the final we won the toss and bowled. Warringah batted slowly throughout but with wickets in hand accelerated to 7 for 195 from 58 overs. Mick Cashman opened his season with 2 for 45 and Doug Latto bowled tightly for 0 for 19 off 10 overs. Best performed was Dave Folkard (3 for 51) with his left-arm medium pacers.

In reply, Dave Folkard (31), Hubbard (25), Craig Anderson (24), Tony Barnes (20) and Stephen Campbell (19) proved that the failure to make a big score after getting set cost us this match. Dismissed for 161 in the 54th over, we were a frustrating 34 runs short of the target. This left a long walk back to the bar. Des Brown damaged his knee during the week and was the first player to be outed for the season through injury.

VS LINDFIELD 257 defeated Lindfield 177 and 0 for 10

An away game played at Acron Oval in St. Ives. A good toss to win, batting conditions were perfect and Lindfield took the field with only nine. We did not offer to substitute field for them. After Doug Latto let the third ball of the day hit his off-stump we set about making our largest score for the season. Tony Barnes (63) anchored the first half of the innings while Glen Foster (39) did the same for the second half. In between Dave Scotter (27), Craig Anderson (40) and Hunter Leonard (31) hit up quick runs with plenty of style. Three partnerships of around 50 were the key to our total of 257. Latto snared a vital wicket (caught and bowled) before stumps to round off our best day of the season.

With Craig Anderson distinguishing himself as a wicketkeeper during the week (one finger, two breaks) Quinton Piper stepped in as a sub-fielder. Latto (4 for 46) bowled the other opener in the third over of the day, much to the delight of the incapacitated skippers watching from the sidelines. Lindfield fought back to 3 for 118 before Mick Cashman (4 for 38) crashed through the middle order with some menacing in-swing bowling. Steve Le Bas extracted pace and bounce for 2 for 21. Other highlights were Dave Scotter's out-fielding and Quinton Piper's superb diving catch in the covers.

This was to be our last win until February. Lindfield went on to make the semis. It was interesting that after the match they spent half an hour at the ground going over the game and nutting out where they went wrong. This obviously paid off in later games.

VS WENTWORTHVILLE 227 lost to Wentworthville 271

This was a bad toss to lose. A heat-baked desert wind swept across the shaved out-field and the cloudless sky sent down 35 degree rays. While the Wenty players went searching for tree shade we chased leather for five miserable hours. The pitch was lifeless and any ball that beat the in-field usually made the boundary. The Wenty batters played very well and took the score to 2 for 212 at more than four runs an over. It was in these conditions that Carlo Pedavoli took 7 for 80 from 18.5 overs. Mixing accuracy with hostility he kept Wenty to 271. It was a remarkable display of sustained high quality bowling. Chris Hubbard gave good support with 1 for 29 from 12 overs. A terrific relay throw by Dave Folkard and Glen Foster ended one threatening innings. We began the long chase on a cool, cloudy day, on a lush out-field. After losing two quick wickets Dave Scotter (25) and Doug Latto added 77 for the third wicket. Latto (74) was dismissed with the score at 150. His application against a persistent attack made this the highest innings of the season and the best. Dave Folkard made an enterprising 35 before losing concentration. Hubbard (21 n.o.) and Sam Bryne (3) hung on grimly at the end of the day but the tenth wicket fell at 227, 44 runs short, a gutsy and unlucky effort against a side that eventually made the final.

VS PENNANT HILLS 177 lost to Pennant Hills 205

This was also played at home. We won the toss and batted. Before long we were 7 for 41. Barnes, Foster, Scotter, Folkard, Oslington, Hubbard and Gilling failed to make double figures. Greg Hobbs and Steve Bateman came together and by lunch time had added fifty. Hobbs used gritty defence and deft placement while Bateman applied his faultless defensive technique with a series of strong drive. They took the total to 152 before Bateman was caught for 69. The eighth wicket partnership of 111 was a C Grade record and the highest of the season. Hobbs was last out, having made 56. The doggedness of those two players set us to 177 (By stumps Pennant Hills were 3 for 22, Bateman and Richard Najdzion doing the damage.)

The following week the bowlers did all that was asked of them. Bateman attacked the stumps for 4 for 57. After a disheartening first spell Najdzion came back late in the day with some dangerous fast bowling to take 3 for 63. Cashman bowled tight for 1 for 44 from 20 overs. Folkard managed 2 for 25. Dropping six catches meant losing to a poor side. The fielding seemed to indicate a lack of concentration generally and a lack of practice specifically. Worse, it set the standard for the rest of the season so that bowlers could not expect any support from the field. This took a lot of pressure off opposing batsmen.

I made the mistake of letting the game follow its own course and not insisting on a better level of effort in the field. The team as a whole suffered because of this in the games that followed.

VS AUBURN 126 lost to Auburn 7 dec 202

After nine weeks of uninterrupted cricket Sydney settled into its typical rain-drenched summer. During the hours and hours of lost match-time words like 'ozone-layers', 'greenhouse' and 'wet' filtered into the conversation of moping cricketers. Players began to take up trumpet playing and golf. Occasionally, they would take their whites out of moth-balls and drive to the saturated grounds. All this seemed to highlight the importance of covers, the super-sopper, grounds that drained well and being prepared to play cricket whenever possible in less that perfect conditions. With the first week washed out this one-day match was played at Macquarie. We won the toss and bowled. Auburn scored a robust 7 for 202 from 51 overs. Best of the bowlers was Mick Cashman 2 for 46 from 15 overs. Najdzion (4 for 71) and Le Bas (0 for 31) bowled far too short and went at 5 and 4 per over respectively. Even so, Najdzion managed at times to be a very impressive pace bowler, usually in the second spell.

Our batting reply was not really competitive. 'The Tubster' Dave Folkard (43) showed his usual mix of mental toughness and ability but lacked support. Foster (11), Oslington (12) and Hook (13 n.o.) tried hard, but overall we did not have it in us to make the runs. All out for 126. Glen Foster showed plenty of pluck to return to the crease with a runner later in the innings after being floored by an ankle crusher. Self-inflicted injury during the week, (a nasty fall from his bike) meant this was Glen's last game for the season. Paul Oslington's dodgy knee also gave out in this game thus ending the year for the last player to make a century in C Grade.

VS BURWOOD No play.

A complete wash-out. Sometimes I wonder if it is even worth trying to play Cricket in Sydney. Rain and Saturday seem to mean the same thing. The cover proved ineffective and the first week it appeared to trap the water on the wicket.

VS BEXLEY 117 lost to Bexley 190

A one-day match played on New Year's Eve at the Brighton Memorial Playing Fields in Bexley. We got to the ground and found ourselves locked out. The ground was in a shambles. No wicket had been prepared and the out-field look like an extemely successful lucerne crop. There were little piles of horse manure ringing the pitch. I suppose you could say it had character. The groundsman had gone fishing and who could think of a better way to see out the old year!

After prolonged negotiations, the Bexley players set about cutting and rolling a makeshift strip. For flattened grass it played quite well, with just a touch of spring in it. Bexley won the toss and to my surprise and relief decided to bat. Bexley showed the form that would eventually make them premiers. Mick Cashman led the attack with his usual dependability, finishing with 2 for 59. Best of the bowlers was Jamie Wiblin who trundled a nagging line for 1 for 18 from 8 overs. After this game he disappeared back into D Grade and picked-up a swag of wickets. Our fielding was again patchy and a number of catches went to ground. Chasing 190, openers Latto and Hook set off confidently, putting on 30 before a long decline set in. The 'Tubester' had a rare failure, making only 11. Stephen Campbell (0) was out of touch in his return from injury. Steve Bateman damaged his C Grade average by making only 13. Gilling (11), Cashman (8) and Wiblin (10 n.o) rallied the late order to put on 38 for the last two wickets.

We were out-played in all departments, Bexley seemed to have mastered the intracacies of their home ground.

VS BAULKHAM HILLS 99 and 4 for 111 lost to Baulkham Hills 5 dec 125

The first week was washed out, setting up another 60 over per side match. Playing at home we won the toss and batted. Early wicket liveliness suggested this was the lesser of the possible choices. The Baulkham Hills spinners extracted bounce and bite to really test our techniques. As usual Dave Folkard (23) was best equipped although Barnes (13), Hubbard (12) and Carney (15) tried hard. Statisticians searched the record books for an instance where spinners had taken all ten wickets .

Defending 99 we had early success. 'Sticks' Lewis (1 for 28 from 10) taking a wicket in his second over. Colin Cole did likewise leaving Baulkham Hills 2 for 12. Funny how a dropped catch can change the complexion of a game if you let it. Baulkham Hills declared at 5 for 125, Chris Hubbard had the figures of 1 for 5.

Our second innings finished at 4 for 111, Latto (20) and Lewis (16) played solid early, then Dave Scotter (22 n.o) and Dave Folkard (34 n.o) added an undefeated 60 for the fifth wicket. The 'Tubester' looked particularly sound in this innings, his last before embarking on what should be a successful stint in higher grades.

VS EPPING Washed out - no play

This was a washed-out one-day match on the third Macquarie ground. The Epping Captain was determined to play, which is usual when a team is in contention for the semis. That was not something we had to take in to consideration. An understandable lack of interest in playing by Macquarie was the dominating factor in calling the game off at 11.30 am.

VS STRATHFIELD 99 and 4 for 90 lost to Strathfield 2 dec 148

Played at Macquarie Northern Oval. Playing time was lost due to rain. The coin went up, spun, fell to earth and consigned us to bat first. We made 92. Good points were Craig Anderson's return to C Grade, 15 runs to the good and the season best tenth wicket partnership of 18 between Cashman (11 n.o) and Mutlu Encelenk (3). We took 47 overs to get 92 runs and perhaps it would have been better to score runs quickly and get Strathfield onto the soft wicket. Occupation of the crease for its own sake did not get us very far. To prove a point we had Strathfield 2 for 18 by stumps, yet on the hard wicket of the following week they were able to take their score to 2 for 148 declared. Najdzion bowled strongly throughout both days, but Mick Cashman led the way with (1 for 20) from 19 overs, this being the sort of workmanlike analysis he would produce each game. Doug Latto bowled 12 overs of probing leg spin, adding a nascent leg-break to his repetoire.

Our second innings ended at 4 for 90. Latto compiled a dogged 34 before being dismissed with the last ball of the day. This was the last innings Doug played for the season, as one of the numeous blows he had taken to the body had cracked a rib. Chris Hubbard played well for 26 and Col Cole remained 12 n.o.

VS CANTERBURY 5 dec 182 defeated Canterbury 156

Again at home; this turned out to be the game that decided who would be wooden spooners, Canterbury won the toss and soon displayed a lack of batting talent. We went a long way to evening things up by showing an alarming inability to catch. By day's end eight had gone down. Tony Barnes put in an all round display by dropping catches at second slip, short leg and deep That the bowlers restricted Canterbury to 156 mid on. regardless is testimony to true perserverance. Mick Cashman in his opening spell watched three catches being dropped behind the wicket and finally understood what was required and bowled the batsman. He eventually finished with 2 for 43, Chris Hubbard, the smiling assassin, used his enigmatic bowling style to its fullest and took 3 for 20 (ten of these being no balls). Chris Hook showed his leg spin had come on with figures of 2 for 44, while Colin Cole picked up 2 for 17 with outswing, outfield catches being taken by Hook, Mutlu Encelenk and John Gumbley who was the pick of the fielders.

By stumps Hook (23) and Barnes (33) had put on 45 for the first wicket with some fortuitous edges and positive running between wickets. They carried on to 56 on the second day. Fall of wickets were well spaced throughout the day, never giving Canterbury a look in. Cole (55 n.o) showed the form that had got him a hundred in D Grade to lead the side to 5 for 182 declared. Sam Byrne (24) hit the ball powerfully and Reg Carney batted with his usual enthusiasm for 10 n.o. In the hour and a half prior to close of play, the spin twins, Hook (1 for 10) and Encelenk (0 for 7) put Canterbury under the hammer before stumps were drawn at 1 for 38. Although our standard of play was nowhere near what we showed against Lindfield it was a satisfying win anyway. Interestingly only three players remained from the Lindfield game which shows the sort of turn-over the side had during a season.

VS LANE COVE Wash out - no play.

A great way to finish the season. Both days were washed out. The drive to Tantallon was enjoyable and it was a nice looking ground. CAPTAIN'S REPORT 'D' SHIRES

In reporting on the performance of the D Grade team in season 1988/89 one should firstly consider the facts. We played 9 games of a scheduled 13 resulting in 1 outright win (after trailling on the first innings)), 2 first innings wins, 5 first innings losses and 1 outright loss. We finished 12th in a 14 team competition.

Whilst on a superficial basis our performance was poor, it should be kept in perspective. In the final analysis the D Grade competition was unusual in that the four semi-finalists finished some way in front of the remaining teams in the minor premiership, in fact there was an 18 point gap between the 4th and 5th place teams. Given that we played all 4 semi-finalists and due the the rained-out fixtures did not play the 2 teams that finished immediately in front of us and the 2 teams which finished behind us. Our final position on the table did not reflect the quality of our team.

Our bowlers, led by Jamie Wiblin, performed creditably. Jamie broke his own record for the highest number of wickets in D Grade in a season with 27 dismissals at 13.81, he achieved this in only 8 games. He was well supported by Mark Warren with 19 wickets at 19.63 and Colin Cole 13 at 9.69. Another bowling highlight was Paul Wyllie's hat-trick against Wentworthville.

Unfortunately our batting was poor, inadequate technique and inability to build an innings saw D Grade struggle for runs all season. Only 4 batsmen scored more than 100 runs for the season, Allan Mahoney 237 at 18.23, Jamie Wiblin 162 at 14.73, Colin Cole 146 at 29.2 and Steve Jurd 113 at 10.27. Too often the bowlers were left with targets that were simply too small to successfully defend. On a positive note the batting highlight of the season was undoubtably Colin Cole's 102 not out against Pennant Hills.

The fielding overall was good as was our level of enthusiasm. This was particularly pleasing given the stop start nature of our season with so many games washed out. In my initial season as Captain it was gratifying to have a nucleus of committed players. My sincere thanks go to Jamie Wiblin, Mark Warren, Bill Monger, Steve Jurd, Paull Wyllie, Richard Quan and Peter Bayliss for consistently being available for selection, for their good company and for sharing my ambition to make Macquarie University D Grade a competitive team.

Whilst it was good to have a nucleus for the team, filling the remaining 3 or 4 places to field a team each match required the use of 20 players during the season. From a Captain's viewpoint this is a most unsatisfactory situation that requires immediate attention by our Club.

However, it would be remiss of me not to thank those ex-players whom I woke on Saturday morning imploring them to have a game of cricket that afternoon. In most cases a greater commitment was shown to the Club by these ex-players than by those higher grade players who it seemed would regularly make themselves unavailable at the shortest possible notice. It is my view that such players, albeit talented, have no place in our Club and should be told they are no longer welcome.

In conclusion 1988/89 saw D Grade establish a nucleus on which to build for the future. It is imperative that appropriate recruitment of students take place and proper guidance provided in respect of technique and application. If both of these matters are addressed then the prospects for D Grade for the coming season are good.

At 3 for 15 and 8 for 109 the run chase was always beyond us, however a record 9th wicket partnership between Dave Baker, 25 and Colin Cole, 32 gave us brief hope, but in the end, no joy. This was our first experience of what one might describe as conserative umpiring. However one should not detract from the quality of the opposition. Warringah was ultimately runners up and whilst we did not play well, coming as close as we did was promising for the games ahead.

VS LINDFIELD 159 and 2 for 50 defeated Lindfield 142

Our first victory and one full of character and perserverance. Won the toss and batted on a perfect Macquarie North wicket. At 2 for 81 with Allan Mahoney finally finding form a considerable score should have been made. However with Mahoney's departure for 51 caught on the boundary seeking the units beyond the wire fence the last 7 wickets fell cheaply.

The visitors were 1 for 42 overnight and given equal conditions a Macquarie victory looked unlikely. On the second week Lindfield seemed assured of victory at 5 for 130. However, a superb bowling performance from Jamie Wiblin with 5 for 43 and support from Mark Warren 2 for 8 coupled with good fielding saw Lindfield lose 5 for 12 and Macquarie secure a morale boosting victory.

As Captain I was particularly pleased with this victory as nobody gave up despite the seeming hopelessness of the position.

VS WENTWORTHVILLE 60 and 117 lost to Wentworthville 110 and 5 for 71

The joy of our victory in Round 3 soon soured with our journey to Westmead Hospital to play Wentworthville. Losing the toss and being sent in to bat on the hottest day of the season set the alarm bells ringing. The Wenty Captain obviously knew something that I did not. Two hours later the reason was obvious, we had been dismissed for 60 by an ordinary attack on a wicket that was a disgrace to cricket.

The opposition passed our score, seven wickets down with the highlight being Paul Wyllie's hat-trick from the first three balls he bowled in the innings.

Week two was little different, this time we compiled 117 with Martyn Gilling displaying considerable courage to compile 45 worth a lot more anywhere else. Eventually defeated outright by 5 wickets.

It is appropriate that this ground is within the grounds of a hospital as eventually the services provided at Westmead will be required if cricket is continued to be played on this potentially lethal and obviously underprepared wicket. Furthermore, Wenty's second place in the minor premiership and eventual premiership, with minor premiers Auburn's defeat in the semi, came about as a direct consequence of the 'sporting' nature of this wicket and Wenty's ability to obtain maximum points every home game.

<u>VS PENNANT HILLS</u> 9 for 241 defeated Pennant Hills 104 and 3 for 65

A welcome return to Macquarie and a fair wicket. This match belonged to Colin Cole. Won the toss and batted and with Colin's D Grade record undefeated 102 a total of 241 was always going to be enough. Not merely being satisfied with scoring most runs Colin then took most of the wickets with 6 for 21 off 18 mostly unplayable overs with 8 maidens. Unfortunately for D Grade this performance saw Colin deservedly promoted for the ramaider of the season.

VS AUBURN 63 and 5 for 110 lost to Auburn 148 and 1 for 64

This game marked to beginning of 'The Big Wet'. Every match from this one to the end of the season was affected in some way by rain. Travelled to Mona Park, won the toss and sent Auburn in on a wet and difficult wicket, they batted well to socre 148 with one of their opening batsmen remaining undefeated. Jamie Wiblin, 3 for 27 and Steve Jurd, 4 for 33 made good use of the conditions. At 2 for 37 overnight a Macquarie victory looked a possibility.

However, week two saw Auburn display the qualities that took them to the minor premiership and Macquarie capitulate to lose 8 for 26 on a good fast wicket and thus be dismissed for 63.

Auburn generously did not enforce the follow-on preferring to set us a target of 150 in even time. Batting with 9 due to players needing to leave early and losing a wicket in the first over saw us effectively 3 or 0 and never looking like victors. We did however manage to bat out the rest of the day.

This was without a doubt our blackest day of the season, Auburn's failure to enforce the follow-on was the only reason we avoided an outright loss.

VS BAULKHAM HILLS 117 lost to Baulkham Hills 6 for 118

A two day game reduced to one due to rain the first week. Playing on Macquarie, we lost the toss and were invited to bat on a wicket that had plenty of life.

We batted poorly against a mediocre attack and were dismissed for 117 in 43 overs with Jamie wiblin top-scoring with 25.

The opposition passed our score with the loss of 6 wickets, Steve Jurd was the best of the bowlers with 3 for 37.

Our loss here was a direct result of poor batting and a conscious decision by the opposition to implement 'conservative' umpiring to the maximum benefit. That a team of teenage cricketers should decide to umpire in such a way prior to an innings commencing to my mind is disgraceful, made more so by the concurrence of a middle-aged and experienced captain.

VS EPPING Washed out.

VS STRATHFIELD 89 and 6 for 219 lost to Strathfield 153

Made the journey to St. Patricks on an overcast day, won the toss and batted on a wicket that was well grassed and turned out to be slightly soft. Our poor batting form continued and we were dismissed for 89 with Malcolm Patterson, 25 and Sam Byrne, 29 n.o. the only players to make double figures.

Strathfield passed our score on the first day with the loss of only 5 wickets. They batted on into the second week and were ultimately dismissed for 158. Jamie Wiblin was the best bowler with 4 for 35 and Mark Warren lending good support with 3 for 37.

Given Strathfield's decision to bat on we used the remainder of the day for some much needed batting practice with Mahoney finally coming good with 82 and Sam Byrne getting 38 n.o.

Another disappointing performance against average opposition.

VS CANTERBURY 82 and 122 defeated Canterbury 4 for 87 and 110 outright.

Made the journey to Bland, won the toss and elected to bat on a wicket that looked full of runs.

One could only say that as the season progressed our batting worsened, this time we managed only 82 against a steady but not threatening attack, Mahoney top scored with 20. Canterbury showed us how it should be done by passing our score on the first day with the loss of 4 wickets, they then declared.

On the second Saturday our batting, if possible, was even worse at 6 for 42. The match was headed for an outright result before tea. However, Jamie Wiblin played a fine innings of 60 n.o. to rescue the situation and we finished with 122.

A tense finish was thus guaranteed with Canterbury requiring 118 to win in 30 minutes plus 20 overs. This was without doubt the most exciting afternoon of the season.

Canterbury to their credit continued to persue runs despite regularly losing wickets and ultimately failed by 8 runs to reach their target. The tenth wicket fell in the second last over of the day to a fine outfield catch by Richard Quan. James Wiblin bowled superbly to finish with 6 for 58.

As this day turned out to be the last day of the season it was very pleasing to finish up as winners in a close and exciting match.
